#### Farewell to Dr. A. Rosenfeld

Dr. Rosenfeld said he would bring regards from the South African move-ment to the Hebrew movement in the Argentine and North America. He also delivered an address on the sub-ject "Thoughts on Self-Respect."

Mr. J. Mizrachi of Port Elizabeth, delivered a short talk entitled "Science and Art."

## Lecture on Lowdermilk

A N instructive survey of the Low-dermilk scheme as applied to practical Zionism in its political, economic and social aspects was given by Mr. M. Schneider at a public function organised by the Johannes-burg Zionist Socialist Party last week.

Mr. Schneider's talk was illustrated by a film of the Tenessee Valley in the United States which, before its development under the T.V.A., had many similar features to the Jordan valley.

The speaker stressed the importance of co-operative undertakings in reintegrating a flagging community, and gave a practical and comprehensive outline of the absorptive capacity of the country. Many people, he said, are of the opinion that Palestine is economically incapable of absorbing large numbers of Jews, but the well-reasoned belief of a non-Jewish, unbiased scientist who advocates the settlement of over 4,000,000 Jews refutes this argument. The influx of Jewry, instead of threatening the well-being of the Arabs, would not only afford them economic security but would raise their standard of living.

Dr. Lowdermilk appeared before the Anglo-American Committee of Inquiry, and it was hoped that his ideas for the reclamation of the wasted Jordan valley would bear fruition, concluded the speaker.

Mr. L. Meyerhof, convener of the Central Area Branch, presided.
