Jazz lovers throughout the country were wooed to attend the Divas' Concert at the Ugu Sports Grounds on Friday night, organisers Cyassound promis-ing that at least four 'big names' would

entertain the expected crowds.

The Herald team putting the pre-publicity together even debated whether 'Divas' should have the apostrophe before or after the 's'.

Those who braved a rather chilly night had to be satisfied with Sibongile Khumalo on her own, except

"The main problem we had was with the transportation for the artists. Secondly, the idea of two stages was new and now we realise we still have a lot to learn," he said.
