SUCCESSFUL A.P.O. EFFORTS

Northern Suburbs Get Better Transport Services

A.P.O. and UNO

As a result of the efforts of the African People's Organisation, several improvements will be made in the bus services in the Metropolitan and Northern areas.

At a meeting of trade union and other organisations under the auspices of the African People's Organisation in Cape Town last week, it was decided in view of the fact that the Industrial Conciliation Commission, 1947 was contrary to the accepted principles of the Commission to reject the Bill and ask for full recognition of the African workers under the Industrial Conciliation Act, 1947. The South African Transport and Labour Council has already taken the lead in opposing the Bill.

It was decided to call upon all A.P.O. and those immediately involved with the Parliament to oppose the Industrial Conciliation Act.

Through the medium of the Press all workers would be kept advised to the exact implications of the Bill.

A mass meeting to co-ordinate with other bodies of all workers would be called as soon as possible to discuss and demonstrate against the proposed Act.

It was further resolved to lobby I.C.C. so as to the furtherance of racial discrimination against workers by the Government on grounds of colour.

Old Zonns Gain Another Sweeping Victory
