I have been a security guard for six years now and I have seen enough of crime and criminals to know that much of the trouble we have comes from this. And I blame the ANC for it.

If you don't have law and order, you have nothing left in this world. I don't think the ANC realise what the damage they have done – especially to their own people.

It has got so bad now that most people have had enough. They want an end to all the stealing and the violence and the intimidation.

And that is why people of all races are turning to the NP. They believe that only the NP can end the violence. And I think they are right.

That is what drew me to the NP. When I realised we were going to have the elections I sat down and thought what were the most important issues to me.
