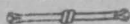

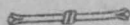

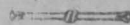
The Mona Watson Recital.

Mr. Ferdinand Saunders has been responsible for many musical evenings of pleasure and delight, but seldom has he presented a singer to a Johannesburg audience who has been so artistic in her renderings as was Miss Watson on Tuesday evening last. Professor of vocalism at the Stellenbosch Conservatorium of Music, Miss Watson is herself the possessor of a particularly beautiful soprano voice which she uses with remarkable ability. Seldom have we heard words so clearly enunciated and if she succeeds in inducing her pupils to follow her example, we shall soon see an immense improvement in vocalism and a corresponding cessation of that ridiculous mouthing and mumbling to which we are getting so unfortunately accustomed. Her programme had been carefully selected to show off the light and shade of her voice and with every piece she was entirely at home, so much so that we are looking forward to her next recital with interested anticipation. Mr. Guy Lanham gave interesting pianoforte solos with considerable ability and distinct precision though there was a tendency on his part to unnecessarily belabour the instrument.

THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

Mr. Kaplan's Candidature.

On another page we publish the manifesto of Mr. Peter Kaplan, the Independent candidate for ward 9 who, in response to the request of a large number of voters in the constituency, has consented to stand as their representative at the forthcoming election. While he is receiving the enthusiastic support of the Citizens' Party, Mr. Kaplan is of the opinion that party politics should not enter into Municipal government and consequently he has not associated himself with any particular political party. He considers that it is the duty of members of the Town Council to study the interests of the rate-payers and by that means manage the town for the welfare of every section of its population. Mr. Kaplan holds strong views upon the question of running municipal trading concerns at a loss and thus throwing the burden of unfair taxation upon the rate-payers, while he considers the question of the health of the town to be one of the most important duties which falls to the lot of a Town Councillor. There is no doubt that the would be member for ward 9 has proved by his own advancement in life that he is possessed of those abilities that used in the interests of the town, must make for its advance. It is an old saying that those who have something to conserve take a greater interest in conservatism than those who have nothing to look after and who, when they are supporting taxation, have the knowledge that they will not be called upon to pay any proportion of it. Mr. Kaplan has taken a prominent part in the management of many communal institutions and therein shown his administrative ability and the experience there gained should be of service to him in the event of his election which we anticipate.
