There is an all-vaudeville bill at the Tivoli again this week. Heading the programme is that exhilarating dance act by Marrone & Da Costa. They have changed their turn and have put on some very fine dances characteristic of various nations. They are assisted by a very clever dancer, whose name is not mentioned, and who is a very competent classical danseuse.

Raymond Newell has a very fine baritone voice and one never tires of listening to his excellent voice. This week he is singing that old favourite song "Shipmates of Mine," which particularly suits him. Vera Budd and partner and Jean Florian both remain over from last week's bill, while the new-comers are Fisher & Ariani, who present a number of popular melodies in real opera style. Billy and Lilian Rutt are a fine comedy pair, whilst Steppin' & Sea complete a good all-round bill.

I.C.A.'s Work in Bessarabia.

The general meeting of delegates of the Jewish Co-operative Union, held recently at Kishineff, after hearing a report from Mr. Trachtman, the Director of the Ica's work in Bessarabia, on the achievements of the Ica in promoting agricultural work in the country, unanimously decided to express the most cordial thanks to the Ica for its services.

It was in 1923 that the Ica resumed its agricultural aid activities in Bessarabia, which is now Roumanian, the work having been carried on before the war by its office in Russia. The field was extended considerably in 1928, when in the course of the last twelve months it spent more than 20 million lei in agricultural credits and advances.

Two thousand five hundred and fifteen Jewish families, numbering 13,000 persons, benefited in 1928 by the work of the Ica. These Jewish workers cultivated an area of 27,162 hectares (5,967 hectares of maize, 5,289 hectares of ploughed land, 4,877 hectares of winter wheat, etc.); 1,612 hectares were used for pasturage.

These agriculturists have been given aid by the Ica in many directions. The Ica gave them the necessary advances, and procured for them 157,472 kilos of grain for sowing, machines and agricultural implements, such as ploughs, winnowing machines, sowing machines, etc. The Ica assisted the colonies in cattle-breeding, viticulture, etc. It gave them nine advances, to a total sum of 1,098,567 lei for constructive work. The cultivators who were not so well endowed were given 681 hectares of supplementary ground, expressly for their benefit. Their cattle consisted of 389 cows, 268 horses, 750 sheep, 6 bulls, etc. The Ica, which, since the war, has retained the reserves for tobacco plantations started last year, with the encouragement of the Government to place 127 planters in the region of Rozina on an area of 307 hectares to develop tobacco cultivation. The same holds good in regard to viticulture, in promoting which 150,000 vine-grafts imported from France were distributed among the Jewish vine-growers in 16 places.

The value of the lots distributed after the agricultural reform ought to have been returned by the Roumanian State. The American Joint Reconstruction Foundation formed by the Distribution Committee and the Ica advanced the necessary credits for this; 3,129 hectares have already been bought back, and the Jews received in 1928 the necessary credits to buy back the balance of 1,060 hectares.

The co-operative dairies of the Colonies of Dombroveni, Alexandreni and Petrovea were functioning normally in 1928, being enabled to do this by the aid of several millions of lei granted by the Ica to the Jewish cultivators. Many cows were bought in the Bukovina and Transylvania to be sent to the districts where the co-operative dairies are situated.

The agronomes of the Ica assisted them further with advice, by arrang-

ing demonstrations for them, providing stations for the housing of machinery, the threshing of the grain, etc.

The work was resumed in 1923. It has been carried on therefore for a period of five and a half years. It is well known what a state the Jewish colonies were in at the end of the war. Since then, the Ica has distributed among the Jewish agriculturists machinery and agricultural implements to the value of three million lei, seed for six million lei, 3,420 heads of cattle, 800 sheep and 24 bulls. They have secured for them 4,000 hectares of additional land, brought them from France a million or more of vine-grafts, laying out 120 hectares of new vineyards, besides 95 hectares already prepared and fenced off. For the less endowed cultivators, the Ica bought 700 hectares of more fertile ground.

The Ica was also engaged in these five and a half years in making new installations, as, for instance, in the new colony of Serbeshti, where the

colonists received everything they needed—houses, sheds, horses, one waggon, one cow of the Simmenthal breed, about 10 sheep—for little groups, enclosures and orchards, and for the entire colony two wells, a ritual bath, a school, and a communal building.

The colony has also been provided with medical aid, a library, beehives, poultry yards, a lucerne field, plantations, etc.

The other colonies have also made progress. The colony of Liublin, which had been completely ruined, has been reorganised. The colony of Dombroveni is also to-day larger and richer. In five years the Ica has also created, as in Alexandreni, a herd of cows such as no other village in the districts of Soroki and Deltzi possesses.

The old vineyards are restored and new vineyards have been laid out at Vertiujeni, Rumanovca, and Magchkautz. All this work has been carried on with the intermediary aid of the Jewish Co-operative Union with the funds of the Ica.
