DORSHEI ZION ASSOCIATION.

The Dorshei Zioni Association has remitted to the Zionist Federation the handsome amount of £785 16s. \$d., the result of its recent activities for the Jewish National Fund. Full details will be found in our

The amount is made up as follows: -General collections, £460 0s. 10d.; Golden Book, £172; box clearances £105 2s. 7d.; tree fund, £23 8s. 6d.; Golden Book open account, £25 5s. 3d. Amongst other noteworthy items are: -£112 collected at the barmitzvah of Master Lazarus Salber, to inscribe his name; three other collections of £20 each at functions and Simchas for Golden Book inscriptions; £212 16s. 9d., haif nett proceeds of the annual Capetown National Fund ball (the other half having reached the Federation per the Bnoth Zion Association); £24 18s. 1d., half share of nett proceeds of balloon carnival held by the Capetown Maccabeans; a large number of collections at Simchas and special donations, as well as general collections at synagogues; and Yom Kippur offerings by the members of the Woodstock-Salt River Hebrew Congregation (headed by a donation of 35 guineas by Mr. I. Morduchowitz) totalling £99 14s. 6d. By these efforts the Cape Peninsula again proves itself the backbone of the National Fund work in South Africa, the volume of its support during the year just past having been out of all proportion to the numbers of the Jewish community in that area.

The Capetown Maccabean Society, which was started about seven months ago, is doing excellent work, and promises to supply a long felt want in the life of the Jewish youth in Capetown.

Under the presidency of Advocate J. Herbstein, the society has done much to interest the general public in matters of Jewish concern. An exhibition of Jewish objets d'art was held in October, and proved a tremendous success. Unique in character, this novel experiment helped to show that just as in other branches of learning, so in the realm of Art, a new spirit of intense nationalism was pervading the rising generation. So great was the interest that steps are being taken to hold another exhibition on a larger scale.

A series of lectures on "Modern Jewish Problems," by Messrs. Mirvish, Lange, Turtledove, and Miss Jaches drew large audiences and roused keen discussion. Dr. Olsvanger spoke on "The Jewish elements in the Kalewala," and Mr. A. Z. Berman on "Jewish Art," while Mr. Shein, a recent arrival from Palestine, spoke on "Nationalism and Assimilation." To all these, thanks go out for their public spirit and great kindness.

As far as the purely social side of the work is concerned, Misses Gitlin and Levinsohn are to be heartily congratulated on the success of a "Balloon Carnival," organised by them in aid of the National and other funds. In every respect this function proved a huge success, and the funds will benefit to quite an appreciable extent. Rambles, picnics, moonlight walks, have been organised, and have helped towards inculcating a corporate origin amongst the mambles.

Durban.

A special Chanucah festival was held in St. Andrew Street Synagogue on Sunday, the 17th December, 1922, at 4 p.m., the main feature being the distribution of prizes by Mrs. F. C. Hollander to the pupils of the Talmud Torah, whose headmaster is the Rev. N. Menachemson. Mr. F. C. Hollander, in addressing the crowded synagogue, drew an able parallel between the event of the fatal attack by Dingaan's men upon the defenceless Dutch and that of Antiochus' men upon the zealous Jews in the cave on a Sabbath Day. He went on to describe the heroic fights of the Maccabeans and emphasised how, with the return of the Jews to their homeland, they will bring to light again the deeds of the Maccabeans, and thus add to the glory of Israel. Rev. N. Menachemson conducted the service. Mr. Rothstein rendered a violin solo, accompanied by Miss Rothstein. Mr. Meyerson sang two songs which were accompanied by Miss R. Ware. Miss Moshal sang "Eli," and the school children sang "Mooz Zur," with instrumental accompaniment. Refreshments were provided in the Talmud Torah Hall, where gramaphone recitals were given. The festival concluded with the singing of "God Save the King" and "Hatikvah."

East London.

The distribution of prizes to the pupils of the Hebrew School took place in the School Chambers on Sunday evening, 17th December, the third day of Chanucah. There was a large gathering, and Rev. Altshuler conducted the evening service and performed the ceremony of setting up the lights. Mr. A.
