**Football in Palestine**

**A.B.C. Symphony Concert**

The A.B.C. Symphony Orchestra presented one of its best concerts at the Jewish Guild Hall, Johannesburg, on Tuesday evening last. The programme consisted of three brilliant items, Beethoven's famous "Leonore" Overture, Bach's Fourth Brandenburg Concerto and Cesar Franck's Symphony in D Minor.

Despite the undoubted merit of the Symphony, "Leonore" was the plum of the evening. The piece performed was the third, and best, of the Overtures Beethoven composed to his opera "Fidelio." It is among Beethoven's greatest compositions, and it serves as an excellent example of his supremacy over all the composers. The purity and the strength of the music, no less than the clarity and uncomplicated statement of the themes are things of perfect artistry. The dominating impression of a master is stamped on every movement. The orchestra, under the baton of Mr. Jerry Schulman, rendered the composition ably and were warmly applauded.

The Fourth Brandenburg Concerto, a fine example of Bach's art, was also well performed, the solo playing of Bram Verhoef being a notable feature. The two flutes, played by H. Gardner and J. Dodds Miller, also emerged to advantage.

The orchestra's rendering of Cesar

**Casuals Cricket Club vs. Regents Park Cricket Club**

**Atlas Beats Oswald**

**SATURDAY NIGHT'S FIGHT.**

Jim Atlas, the "Continental Tiger," met Hank Oswald, the "Bad Red Demon," at the City Hall, Johannesburg, last Saturday night, and after a hectic contest won the fight by two falls to one. The bout was of the "non-stop" variety, lasting for two hours; there was some good wrestling here and there. One of the high moments of the match occurred in the second session when, fighting up against the ropes, Oswald seized Atlas and neatly entangled him in the ropes so that his neck came between the two upper ropes and his arms through all three. The crowd rocked with laughter when they saw the unfortunate Oswald hanging for a couple of moments like a bundle of washing.

Oswald once more put across some of those little tricks that have not made him particularly popular with a Johannesburg sporting crowd. He ran round the ring and jumped the ropes when danger threatened from Atlas. On one occasion, when Atlas hurled Oswald over the ropes, the "Bad Red Demon" grabbed a chair and tried to get at Atlas with that, but the officials hastily disarmed him.

Oswald secured the first fall with a back slam and a body press. Atlas equalised some time later by shooting out his legs when Oswald attempted to pounce upon him, knocking him almost breathless. Finally Atlas secured the winning fall with an elbow punch and a body press.

Franck's Symphony is to be highly commended. One might differ from Mr. Schulman in one or two points of interpretation, but in general he carried out a sound piece of work. The Symphony is one of Cesar Franck's best and, as in practically all this composer's music, requires great care and control in rendition. The orchestra gave it this careful attention and the result was well worth hearing.
