Jewish Ministers Leave the Board

WE have received from the Rev. M. Altshuler and the Rev. B. D. Glass, in their capacity as joint secretaries of the S.A. Jewish Ministers' Association, a letter asking us to publish the undermentioned communication, under the heading

"Ministers' Association Leaves the S.A. Jewish Board of Education.

At a meeting of the Council of the Jewish Ministers' Association of South Africa, held at Johannesburg on the 15th inst., it was decided that the Association sever its connection with the S.A. Board of Jewish Education. course was adopted as a result of the Board's attitude to Rabbi Kossowsky, the Chairman of the Association, and in view of the Board's failure to take satisfactory steps to rectify the matter."

It has been known for some time that owing to a certain incident which occurred at a reent meeting of the Executive ouncil of the Board of Jewish Education, the Rav of the Federated Synagogues of the Witwatersrand, left the meet-ing and was followed by the Rabbinical members of the Rabbinical members of Council. Since then efforts have been made to effect a reconciliation so that the important

work of the Board, in the interests of Jewish Education, could continue.

On approaching Chief Rabbi Dr. J. L. Landau, who is President of the Ministers' Association, we have learnt that a meeting of members is being called on Monday next when the whole subject will be discussed.

Before publishing the above announcement, we considered it advisable to approach Adv. Rosenstein, the Chairman of the S.A. Jewish Board of Education. He would not, however, commit himself in any way.

"I am unable to make a statement at this stage," he replied, "as it is the policy of the Board that no individual member make any communication to the press without the full approval of the whole Board."

Mr. Rosenstein indicated that the matter would be raised at the next meeting of the Council of his organisation when no doubt a statement to the press would then be issued.

Information has now reached us from good authority that Rabbi Kossowsky has tendered his resignation from the Executive Council of the Board of Jewish Education.

A Pioneer of Zionism

LEO PINSKER was in reality a Russian physician. He was born in Poland in 1821, graduated in medicine at Moscow University, held public appointments and in course of time became one of the leading physicians of Odessa. His father was Simchah Pinsker, a well-known Hebrew scholar and archaeologist. Side by side with Leo Pinsker's professional activities were his Jewish communal ones. He contributed to Jewish periodicals, advocated secular education for the Jews and the grant of wider liberties to them. In 1881 his "Auto-Emancipation" appeared. In this he advocated a Lewish perional home for the his "Auto-Emancipation" appeared. In this he advocated a Jewish national home for the Jews, a land in which they would be at home, not strangers. Out of this pamphlet arose the Choveve Zion Movement to which Pinster devoted the remainder of his life. He died on December 24, 1891.
