### Bulawayo Activities

**New Cantor for Bulawayo.**—Mr. M. Kamionsky has been appointed First Reader of the Bulawayo Hebrew Congregation as from the 1st of June. He succeeds Mr. A. Weinberg, who has now retired after 28 years of service in the Bulawayo Synagogue.

Cantor Kamionsky arrived in South Africa some eight years ago, and for several years occupied the post of Cantor of the Griqualand West Hebrew Congregation, Kimberley. Last year he received a call to Rhodesia from the Salisbury Hebrew Congregation. The induction of the new Cantor took place on the first day of Shevuoth and after the service a reception was held in the Guild Hall in his honour. Speeches of welcome were delivered by Mr. P. Landau, President of the Congregation, Mrs. Rabinowitz, and Rev. M. I. Cohen.

**National Fund Evening.**—The local W.I.Z.O. made a departure from its usual custom of holding afternoon functions and arranged its June function for the evening of Wednesday, the 8th. The meeting was devoted to an elucidation of the work of the National Fund. Speeches on various aspects of National Fund activity were delivered by Mesdames M. I. Cohen, D. A. Blumberg; the Misses H. Radowsky and A. Aberman, and Messrs. B. Baron, J. Cohen, S. Pines, and C. Landau. Mrs. Jack Cohen was in the chair and Rev. M. I. Cohen proposed a vote of thanks to the speakers. During the evening Mrs. I. Isaacson rendered a number of piano-forte solos which received hearty applause.

**Literary Circle.**—There was an unusually large attendance at the Guild Hall on the 16th ult., when the Circle arranged a debate with members of the local Magistrate's Court. The subject chosen was "That the Criminal is a Product of His Environment." The Magistrate's Court was represented by Messrs. W. C. Robertson, A. D. Lloyd and F. Willmore, Messrs. N. Jacobson, A. Sariff and B. Baron spoke on behalf of the Literary Circle against the motion.

The discussion was of a high standard, and several members of the audience participated in the debate. The motion was won by the Magistrate's Court. Miss R. Rabinowitz, President of the Circle who welcomed the visitors, asked Dr. W. Cunningham to take the chair.

**A Lecture.**—On Wednesday, June 1, Dr. Phil Baron gave an interesting talk to members of the Circle on his experiences in post-graduate work overseas. Miss R. Rabinowitz was in the chair, and Rev. M. I. Cohen proposed a vote of thanks to the speaker.

### Zionist Youth Activities

**S.A. Youth Council.**—The preliminary arrangements for the Youth Keren Hayesod Campaign have already borne fruit and the Campaign on Johannesburg and the Reef is now in full swing.

The official delegation will attend a special Youth Reception in Johannesburg on Saturday, July 9th, at which the local Youth Campaign will be inaugurated. From the contributions already received the total figure is likely to be an appreciable sum.

The Council has also made arrangements for Campaigns to be conducted in various other centres and is co-operating actively with its local representatives.

The further progress of the Campaign will be reported next week.

### PIETERSBURG AND DISTRICT

#### Meeting of Women Zionists

**THE** second quarterly general meeting of the Pietersburg and District Women's Zionist League was held on 23rd May at the residence of Mrs. B. Palte, who presided over a good attendance.

In her opening remarks, Mrs. Palte pointed out that these quarterly meetings were held to stimulate interest and to keep all members in touch with the activities of the Society.

It was reported that the Purim Carnival had realised £24 and J.N.F. Box collections about £20—not all the district boxes having been cleared as yet. Several new boxes have been placed. Eighteen new members have joined the League since November.

The Chairwoman reported that she had visited the Zoekmakaar, Duivelskloof and Tzaneen members and found them very keen, and they all promised to work for the J.N.F. The members in Zoekmakaar are already busy raising funds. The members in Duivelskloof and Tzaneen had asked for cultural material, with which they are being supplied.

The formation of a cultural group was discussed, and decided upon, and arrangements for its first meeting were made.

The date for the annual Ball was fixed for 7th September, and the Chair once again made an appeal on behalf of the Sefer Hayaed.

**Cultural Group.**—On 9th June, the cultural group held its first meeting at Mrs. Palte's residence, when Miss S. Levy read a paper on Shmarya Levin, and Mrs. Joseph Hirschmann and Mrs. Palte read papers on Nahum Sokolow. It was decided that the group should meet on the third Wednesday of every month.

**Keren Hayesod.**—The League in conjunction with the Pietersburg and Zoutpansberg Zionist Society is busy making preparations for the forthcoming Keren Hayesod Campaign.

### Mr. Englesberg in Springbok

Mr. D. Gelb, President of the Hebrew Congregation, expressed the appreciation of the community to Mr. Englesberg and thanked him heartily for the visit.

Mr. Englesberg was due to proceed to Port Nolloth on the following day, but owing to a breakdown of the car, he was unable to complete the journey.

### Durban Activities

#### Keren Hayesod Campaign

Representatives of Durban bodies met and extended a warm welcome to Rev. M. L. Perlzweig, Mrs. Rosa Ginzberg on their arrival in South Africa on Sunday, 19th. These two members of the Keren Hayesod delegation proceeded to Johannesburg on the following day to the S.A. Campaign. Preliminary arrangements for the local campaign have been started and a strong committee will be appointed this week.

#### Council of Natal Jewry.

A general meeting of the Council was held at the Jewish Club on the evening of the 7th June. Mr. S. Shal presided over a large and representative audience. The Chairwoman delivered a report on the work of the Council during the past two months which dealt fully with several important matters. Further reports were read by Advocate Henochsberg, Myerowitz (Polish Jewry Campaign), Mr. A. Levy (Meshullochim), and Ogus (Youth Activities). General discussion on these reports followed. Resolutions to be moved at the Provincial Executive Meeting of the Board of Deputies at Johannesburg were read and discussed. Before the meeting adjourned, the Chair heartily congratulated Mr. A. Berg on his success in the recent elections.

#### Durban Zionist Youth.

An important Zionist Youth meeting at which were present Messrs. Segal and D. Dunsky (member of the S.A. Zionist Youth Council, former being the Durban Representative on the Council), took place on the 17th to the 19th June. On the evening of Friday 17th, a large gathering met at the residence of Mrs. Moss-Morris, where an evening Shabbat was held. Mr. D. Dunsky delivered an interesting address on "Eretz Israel and Jewish Yearning for Palestine in 1937." A most enjoyable evening was spent, the singing of Hebrew songs being a feature of the function.

Stirring addresses were delivered by Messrs. Segal and Dunsky at a Youth mass meeting held on the 19th June. Mr. Ogus presided and Mr. W. Cranko welcomed the guests on behalf of the Club. An interesting discussion, during which several questions were put, Mr. Goldberg proposed a vote of thanks to the speakers.

Discussion on important questions and Youth problems, including the forthcoming Youth Keren Hayesod Campaign, took place both in an afternoon of committee, between Messrs. Dunsky and Segal and the local Youth League throughout the week-end, and a Rally served to strengthen the ties of the branch of the Movement.
