## Mr. S. M. Kuper's Lecture at Jewish Guild

"WHILE the White Paper is considered by Jews all over the world, and by a considerable section of the non-Jewish world, as a repudiation and betrayal of the Balfour Declaration and the Mandate, it is important to know the facts on which the White Paper is based, in order to understand exactly why it constitutes such a repudiation," said Mr. S. Kuper, a member of the S.A. Zionist Federation, in the course of an address on the White Paper to a well-attended meeting of the cultural section of the Jewish Guild on Tuesday night. Mr. I. Isaacs presided over the gathering and the audience listened with the utmost attention to Mr. Kuper's comprehensive survey of the history of Zionist politics from the publication of the Balfour Declaration to the present day.

Examining the terms of the Bal-

Examining the terms of the Balfour Declaration, Mr. Kuper showed that the document, despite the various interpretations to which it had been subjected during the past twenty years, had contemplated the eventual establishment of a Jewish State in Palestine, and many prominent English statesmen, including Lloyd George, supported this contention. In three main aspects, therefore, the George, supported this contention. In three main aspects, therefore, the present White Paper repudiated the terms of the Balfour Declaration, namely, by restricting Jewish immigration and land-sales and envisaging the eventual establishment of an independent state in Palestine, in which the Jews could only be a minority. Such an independent

state, with an Arab majority, could only be, in effect, an Arab state.

Nevertheless, said Mr. Kuper, the reaction of the non-Jewish world to the White Paper showed that there was considerable recognition of the Jewish right to Palestine. In the meantime, the Jews in the Diaspora, had a two-fold duty, to educate public opinion in the right direction in regard to the White Paper, and to stand four-square behind the Yishuv. The Yishuv itself was prepared to react to the White Paper by passive resistance, by a policy of non-cooperation with the Administration.

"No purpose can be served by a

"No purpose can be served by a revolt in Palestine against the British Government. The Jews in Palestine are congregated in certain centres and it would be suicidal to tackle a revolution on any large military scale against Britain."

A policy of non-co-operation, however, would soon demonstrate to the British Government that it was upon Jewish achievements in Palestine that the economic strength of the whole country, and the welfare of all the inhabitants, including the Arabs, depended, and such a policy, therefore, would probably do much to secure the withdrawal of the White Paper.

At the end of his address, Mr. Kuper ably replied to questions put by those present.

Miss H. Nottes conveyed the thanks of the audience to the speaker for his informative talk.
