The esteem in which Cantor and Mrs. B. Chagy are held by Jewry in Johannesburg was well demonstrated on Sunday evening when a farewell reception was held in their honour under the auspices of the Zionist Socialist Party at the Elgin Hotel. Mr. L. A. Pincus presided over a large gathering.

SUCCESS OF VOCATIONAL **GUIDANCE WORK**

The great success attending vocational guidance work in Johannesburg is reflected in the records of the Vocational Guidance Bureau for the first two months of 1941.

Since the beginning of the year, over fifty youths have been placed by the Bureau in various skilled occupations, such as body-builder, boiler-maker, electrician, engraver, fitter and turner, motor mechanic, panel beater, plumber, printer, sheet metal worker, welder, and many others. The most popular vocations proved to be those connected with the motor industry, fitter and turner, electrician industry, fitter and turner, electrician and plumber. More than a quarter of the placings were in the trade of motor mechanic, which also remains the favourite choice among new applicants. plicants.

The proportion of youths placed by the Bureau during the above period was close to seventy per cent. of the total registered applicants.

During January and February, the Bureau had approximately 600 interviews with youths and their parents about the choice of a vocation.
