memorate his name and no streets or villages should be named after him.

He also directed that his personal property should be utilised for a Rutenberg Endowment Fund for Jewish Education.

Impassioned Plea for Unity.

The second document of the will makes an impassioned plea for unity in the Yishub, stating: "The division of our people into communities, parties and sects has always been our disaster, bringing us to the brink of the abyss. Whether we wish it or not, we are brethren in distress. Let us realise this and be brethren in a life of creative endeavour and action in the upbuilding of the National Home.

"Youth represents our hope for the future. For the proper education of Jewish youth I dedicate the proceeds of my estate to serve to initiate a great fund to inculcate into our youth the spirit of unity and brotherhood—the spirit of Israel."

Tributes.

Mr. McPherson, the Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government, Mr. I. Rokach, Mayor of Tel-Aviv, and Mr. D. Remez, Secretary of the Histadruth, have paid tribute to the memory of Rutenberg. Tributes have also been received from Dr. Chaim Weizmann, the Zionist Executive, and Prof. Brodetsky.

In New York all Zionist institutions paid tribute to Rutenberg.

After offering up a prayer in which he referred to those who had made the supreme sacrifice in the last war and also in the present struggle, and had thereby helped to hold back the raging torrents of aggression which threatened to flood the world, the Rabbi delivered a short sermon. In the course of his address he said:—

Our New Year wish to-day must be not so much for "A Happy New Year" as for "A Worthy Year." Happiness is a much abused term. It is all too often identified with mere comfort and ease. Such happiness is only a mirage—a form of self-deception inevitably ending in bitterest disillusionment. True happiness is to be found only in that inner peace of the spirit that emanates from fulfilment of duty, from performing faithfully the service to hand. Then even sacrifice is no tribulation but a blessing.
