IN AND AROUND THE PENINSULA

Dr. Samuelsdorff Addresses S.A.W.A.S.

Dr. A. Samuelsdorff, of the Women's International Zionist Organisation, addressed the Hospital Supplies and Comforts Section of the S.A.W.A.S. in the City Hall on Thursday, 17th inst.

Women in Palestine, Dr. Samuelsdorff said were taking a very active part in war work. Troops visiting Palestine from the Western Desert were all impressed by the constructive work that was going ahead in spite of the war demands on the country's energies and resources.

The Wizo had started agricultural colleges and domestic science schools for girls during the past twenty years. As a result there was a generation of women trained to cultivate the land and to run communal hostels and nurseries.

Food in Palestine would have been short owing to the cutting-off of customary imports had not women agriculturists been sent round the country teaching the growing of vegetables and the home production of food.

Instructresses from the domestic science schools also travelled round the country teaching economic methods of cookery. Now these cookery teachers had been asked to hold classes for army cooks and were teaching the preparation of meals suitable to a hot climate.

The nursery schools established by Wizo enabled mothers to do a full-time job and were run on the most modern lines. The schools also catered for refugee children from the invaded lands of Europe. Many Jewish girls in the auxiliary army forces could speak five, six or seven languages and had proved most useful to the Allied forces as interpreters, as well as clerks, ambulance drivers and storekeepers.

Vredehoek Cultural Circle.
