My Dear Little Cousins,

Jews in South Africa are at present being asked to contribute money to the Jewish National Fund in order that more land may be bought in Palestine.

The Jewish National Fund, which is called the J.N.F. for short, and also the Keren Kayemeth, was the idea of Dr. Hermann Schapira, who was Professor of Mathematics at the University of Heidelberg, Germany. In 1897 at the First Zionist Congress at Basle, be explained his idea that the Jews all over he explained his idea that the Jews all over the world should contribute towards a fund for buying land in Palestine and settling Jews on it. This land was never to be sold again but was to belong to the Jewish nation.

In 1901 Johann Kremenetzky of Vienna worked out the idea of a Jewish National Fund which is to-day of great importance in the building up of Palestine as a Home for the Jewish people. Thousands of Jews have been settled on land bought with money con-tributed to the J.N.F. by Jews all over the world. The Jews who settle on J.N.F. land mostly become farmers; they cultivate the land which has been neglected for hundreds of years and thus help to make Palestine a fruitful and happy country.

It is very important for the Jewish people to buy more and more land in Palestine if they want to make it a real Jewish homeland. The Jews of Europe who are suffering so terribly are very anxious to settle in Palestine, and work as farmers if land would be given to them. Unfortunately the J.N.F. has not enough money to buy all the land the leaders would like to obtain and it is hoped that the Jews of South Africa, who have already helped to buy large tracts of land in Pales tine, will this time give even more generously so that a large amount of money will be

Even children can help in this great work. I am sure you all have a blue and white J.N.F. box in your homes and put in something whenever you can. A great deal of land has already been bought in Palestine with money collected from the boxes.
