"Perchance to Dream."

OPENING AT ALHAMBRA NEXT FRIDAY.

Tom Arnold's production of Ivor Novello's musical romance "Perchance to Dream," which comes to the Alhambra, Cape Town, on Friday evening next, is one of the outstanding successes of the present day. It ran for well over 1,000 performances at the London Hippodrome, breaking every long run record there, and is the eighteenth play to score 1,000 consecutive performances—at least since records of play were kept, and certainly no play ran anything like that length of time in the more distant days.

The reason for its success is the reason for the consistent success of Ivor Novello's works in general—it has a good strong story, it is human, it has thrills and sentiment (but not sentimentality) and it has some of the very best music Mr. Novello has written. It makes a universal appeal.

The romance traverses many years, starting in Regency days, proceeding to the Victorian era and ending at the present moment. The lovers meet when the "First Gentleman in Europe" held sway. Death parts them. Their descendants meet when Queen Victoria reigned, and again they are parted. But their descendants of the present time find happiness together.

All this gives scope for display of the costumes of three periods, for decor of three periods and music in the style of the three periods—opportunities which Mr. Novello has used to the full and which Tom Arnold has caused to be beautifully illustrated on the stage. The full-blooded life of the Regency is contrasted with the more discreet, modest and restrained Victorian era and that again is contrasted with modern life.

"Perchance to Dream" offers something for every one. It has an exciting and dramatic story, comedy, magnificent singing, tuneful music, ballet and other graceful dancing. Its popular number "We'll Gather Lilacs," has already entered the national repertoire of songs. And the sales of this song have exceeded even the astronomical figures achieved by "Keep the Home Fires Burning"—Ivor Novello's great song of the First World War.

Adrina Otero.

In her farewell recitals on Friday and Saturday nights at the Hofmeyr Hall, Adrina Otero again revealed herself as a consummate artist. As an exponent of the Spanish dance she is incomparable, and she infuses her dancing with amazing life and vigour. The effect is heightened by her expressive mime and gesture, by her exquisite costumes and the use of the castanets. Among the outstanding dances were Corrida, an impression of a popular bullfighter, La Solterona, a study of a rather coy old maid of the Madrid of 1700, and Campesina, an episode of a shy, awkward little peasant girl.

Adrina Otero was supported by Lulu Visser together with whom she danced Bulerias Rocío and who also gave a spirited performance of the traditional "Farruca."

Emilio Borgonovo, the young Argentine pianist, delighted the audience with his renderings of works by Albeniz, de Falla, Granados, and Argentine composers; he also proved himself an efficient accompanist.
