It is Atzeret, the concluding festival which demonstrates that freedom goes hand in hand with religion. The journey from Egypt to Canaan was via Sinai, and this fact has dominated Jewish life.

The State of Israel is now "Ben Kayom," having passed the thirty critical days since birth, and giving full promise to live. The State of Israel would give the Jewish people renewed religious freedom. The following Fules must be strictly adhered to:-

The following rules must be strictly adhered to:—
 Write the letter in the usual way and put it in an envelope with the address of the person to whom the letter is sent in Palestine. Seal this letter.
 Put this letter in a second envelope, addressed to Postal Communications, Zionist Federation, Box 18, Johannesburg. Stamp this outer envelope in the usual way.
 Do not affix stamps to your letters addressed to Palestine.
 Send 1/-, either in stamps or postal order, with each letter weighing up to half an ounce.
 Do not use stamped air-letter cards.
 No money orders, postal orders or any dutiable articles are allowed to be sent.
 It is emphasised that no responsibility for the safe delivery of these

It is emphasised that no responsibility for the safe delivery of these letters can be accepted by the Zionist Federation, which, however, will do everything in its power to ensure regular communication. At the same time steps are being taken to maintain incoming letters from Palestine to the Union.
