THE JOURNALIST AND THE COMMUNITY

Mr. Bernstein Addresses Luncheon Club

MR. EDGAR BERNSTEIN delivered a lively address on "How a Jewish Journalist Sees the Community," to the Zionist Association Luncheon Club last Friday. Mr. H. Miller presided.

The Jewish journalist, said Mr. Bernstein, is able to see the community and the people at their best and at their worst. Though he sees all phases of human nature he is not required to give any indication of what he sees; he must merely report what is said. He does realise, however, that many members of the community are doing a good job of work; he realises also that many would do an even better job of work if they were not hampered by personal limitations, such as the urge to get publicity which is indeed infectious.

Continuing, Mr. Bernstein alleged that the communal official was regarded as the "doorman of the community." These officials, he said, were often treated as office boys who "were being paid to do some work." Many members of the community imagined somehow that God had vouchsafed to them also the gift of writing.

The community, continued the speaker, should show a greater appreciation of its press. Very few people were able better to appreciate the Jewish position than the Jewish journalist.

Mr. Bernstein concluded on a humorous note. "Don't," he said, "ask the Jewish journalist 'what's news?', because he is trying to find that out from you—and if he knows of something special he certainly won't tell you, but save it for his paper."

Bialik Concert at S.O.E. Hall

THERE was a large gathering at the S.O.E. Hall on Tuesday night at a Bialik concert arranged by the Educational Sub-Committee of the Sydenham-Highlands North Hebrew Congregation. The programme was very carefully selected and most of the items were devoted to the works of Bialik.

The concert opened with the Haskarah intoned by Rev. O. Altschuler. Mr. J. Fine then addressed the gathering and traced the development of Bialik's poetry. He gave various illustrations of his works.

The pupils of the Sydenham Talmud Torah were accorded a hearty applause when they sang Hebrew songs and danced the Hora. The soloists were Masters D. Sevel and P. Gershater. Mrs. J. Targowsky recited a number of English translations, with great effect.

One of the outstanding items of the programme was the rendering by Gertie Hirschmann of Bialik's "Take me beneath Thy Wing"—a new composition by Rev. Altschuler. The music is most perfectly suited for this song. It is slightly in an Eastern vein and completely captures the plaintive spirit of the poem. The second halves of each verse are particularly impressive. The beginning of the second verse, however, should have been given softer and more melancholy treatment. Gertie Hirschmann excelled in this song. It provides ample range for her voice and it is hoped that she will sing it again on the Johannesburg stage. She also sang with good effect a number of other songs.

Alter's Balalaika Orchestra was given hearty applause when it rendered a pot pourri of Bialik's songs. Mr. R. Shalit gave some fine recitations and Rev. Altschuler rendered two Bialik songs.

The concert was organised by Mr. J. Fine, who also related anecdotes of Bialik's life, in between the items. In conclusion Mr. Teeger made presentations to the artists and to the organiser, and thanked them for the arrangement of a splendid evening.
