20th CENTURY-FOX PRESENTS

"13 RUE MADELEINE"

In bringing "13 Rue Madeleine" to the screen Producer Louis de Rochemont again employs the format he used for "The House on 92nd Street" and prior to that in the subjects he once produced for the "March of Time."

Like Mr. de Rochemont's predecessor film, "13 Rue Madeleine" is a swift-moving and highly exciting melodrama of espionage, utilising fact and fiction, off-screen narrative, clever camera technique and a semi-documentary approach.

The story concerns the activities of one branch of the U.S. Government's vast intelligence service during the war—a service long kept secret but which closely paralleled the activities of the Office of Strategic Services. James Cagney heads the cast as the cat-like, quick-punching chief of some 16 novice agents of whom Richard Conte is a Nazi spy and Annabella and Frank Latimore are members of the intelligence group.

CAPE TOWN REFORM CONGREGATION TO BUILD TEMPLE

At the third annual meeting of the Cape Town Jewish Reform Congregation, it was announced that a permit had been obtained and building operations would commence almost immediately on the new Temple and Communal Hall in Green Point.

The report recorded that the membership of the Congregation now stands at 600, and that a Hebrew School and Jewish library have been established. Rabbi David Sherman, Minister of the Congregation, addressing the meeting, said that the building programme had been planned in order to accommodate the great influx of new members that is steadily pouring into the ranks.

The report of Sky Taxis, which was registered on December 28, 1945, for the period ended June 30, 1946, states that the directors have purchased three four-engined Halifax aircraft. These are being converted into passenger aeroplanes, and a service between South Africa and Britain will begin shortly. The company also purchased Ross Aviation, including a lease of the Benoni aerodrome. Purchase of further aircraft is recommended.
