

DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Our last accounts from Holland and Belgium precisely the same as it was two months ago—that the evacuation of Antwerp and the free navigation of the Scheldt have not been completed so that so long as these points remain unsettled no final arrangement can be hoped for. The tone of the accounts is certainly much less warlike than formerly, but it is generally believed that the differences will not be settled before next spring. People here were therefore of a little amusement with the assertions made by the English "Globe" and "Cairier" of last Wednesday, that the affairs of Belgium and Holland will be brought to a close in the course of one or two weeks. It was enough that similar assertions have been made at least 50 times within the last eight months, to draw on your evening contemporaries, on this side of the water the charge of misinformation or wilful misrepresentation.—*Times, September 11, 1832.*

The persecutions to which several persons in Poland were exposed on account of their participation in the revolt, on have pretty well ceased. The "Rising authorities" have been again most seriously engaged to act with forbearance, and give too ground for just complaints. Prince Paskewitsch himself is said to be very careful that injustice is done to nobody; he has fixed some days in the week on which personal application may be made to him. This arrangement is good, because subordinate authorities now know that everybody has a channel to make his complaints which are attended to according to the existing ordinances. Many Poles who at first hesitated to inflict in the newly-formed regiments have been now induced to enter them, partly from want of other means of subsistence, partly from conviction of their having been unwise; even many of the soldiers who have fled to France are said to be inclined to return to their own country and enter the service—at least this is asserted by persons worthy of credit. It seems that the mischievous percentage for what is past,—will be pardoned to those who have accepted conditions. In the Russian army, where no too deeply implicated in the revolutions, and who have not committed any of those offences which by the imperial manifesto excuse them all, it is said, will be manifested their service.

The Brabant of Naples of the 1st instant states, that the following proclamation has been distributed widely in La Vendée:

"Vendéans!—Ever brave and faithful, you will hear my voice. The time has come to have recourse to arms. Recollect your fathers; recollect my brothers.
