EXPRESS FROM PARIS.

THE TIMES OFFICE, 7 o'Clock, a. m. The Paris papers of Thursday, which we have just received by express, again devote a considerable portion of their columns to the report of the previous day's discussion in the Chamber of Deputies, relative to the law against associations, and direct the attention of their readers to those discussions.

VIENNA, FEB. 28.—An English courier from Constantinople has hurried through this city on his way to London. His arrival created a sensation on our Exchange, much importance having been attached to his dispatches.

HOLLAND AND BELGIUM.

BRUSSELS, MARCH 9.—In the debate in the Chamber of Representatives on the 7th on the motion of M. Hoffsmith, respecting the conduct of the Ministry in the affair of Luxembourg, and which motion was withdrawn after the reply of the Minister for Foreign Affairs, M. Pirson made the following speech, as reported in the *Moniteur Belge* (the other papers give only some short extracts of it):—

"M. Pirson.—The affairs of Luxembourg are certainly very serious; they give me an opportunity to relate to you a conversation which I have hitherto kept secret, and the witness to which I can name.

"If the Minister for Foreign Affairs has nothing to tell you—if, generally speaking, he thinks himself authorized to be silent, and this is possible, since with respect to the claim to be made on Holland he may say that negotiations are not sufficiently advanced,—I, gentlemen, have other things to tell you.

FRENCH PAPERS.

The *Sentinelles des Pyrenees* has the following from Bilbao of the 31st:—"The Carlists of our province speak and act as if Don Carlos was on the throne, supported by the Merinos, Valdespina, and Ventaynas. They have their government, their administration, and their army; they establish lines of customs, levy taxes by force, and perform all the acts of an existing government. The receipts of their customs are signed by their administrators, and it is thus, by the aid of the gold of the monks, and the fruits of their plunder, that they defray the expense of a war which would terminate in their favour if success depended on perseverance and individual confidence. Zavala, appointed Generalissimo, has addressed to the Corregidor, President, and Deputy of Bilbao, a decree for the immediate execution of the prisoners of war, in retaliation for the Queen's decree of the 21st of January. There is a spirit of mockery and hypocritical regret throughout this document worthy of an ex-Carson.

We received yesterday, by express, the whole of the French papers of Tuesday, and a letter from our regular Paris correspondent. They bring a confirmation of the rumours circulated on the preceding day at the Bourse, relative to disturbances in Madrid. The *Madrid Gazette* and other papers of the 4th inst. had been received in Paris by an extraordinary courier. They give a variety of particulars of the disturbances which occurred on the 2d. The first of these arose, it appears, from a riotous movement on the part of some Carlists, who had attacked a party of the portineros of the Queen, in the quarter of the Cabada, fired upon them, and then retired to a house in the street called Toledo, which they invested with the name of the Castle of Charles V. There they were attacked by some troops, and after making a desperate resistance, were obliged to surrender. They were all taken to prison, and by decree of the Regent are to be tried by a court martial. Some of the troops were wounded by missiles of all kinds hurled at them by the rioters from the windows of their castle. At the departure of the courier tranquillity had been re-established, but it was said that a good deal of fermentation prevailed in consequence of the riots.—*Times, March 14.*

CONSTANTINOPLE, FEB. 11.

Matters here have again taken a serious turn, which visibly embarrasses the Porte. It was hoped that the stipulations with Russia were forgotten, and would not be again mentioned, but this was a mistake. The English Government renews its pretensions, at least so it is strongly reported in the higher circles at Paris; it seems to make it a point of honour, and is said to have demanded that it should be renounced. At first no credit was given to this news, but it seems to be true; after our first fruitless attempts England is said to have assumed a more decided tone, and to have peremptorily required the Sultan to come to a resolution, which he will not and cannot do unless obliged.

It is affirmed that the English Ambassador has lately presented a memorial to the Porte, stating the objections of his Government to the treaty of the 8th July, and requiring that attention shall be paid to them. But (asks the Divan) what need all these direct and indirect demands, when it is written that the sovereign prerogative of national independence must be renounced because a third party does not give its assent, and that a state cannot enter into engagements at its own pleasure and for its own security? The Porte is happily capable at least of feeling the degradation of its attitude, which is sought to be given it, and if it is not perhaps sufficient strength to reply with the pride of wounded honour, it is, however, deaf to all threats and ill-founded insinuations. It is affirmed that in the Divan at which the new pretensions of the English Ministry were discussed unusual agitation prevailed, and that the grave Mussulmans expressed themselves in terms of the bitterest dissatisfaction against the English nation, which was formerly so much honored. These negotiations will doubt less be mentioned in our Paris papers, but it is as well to ask of them beforehand, that

ANTWERP, MARCH 10.—Last night the Dutch in Lillo advanced 700 or 800 paces beyond the line of demarcation, and appeared before Old Doel in their boats. The alarm was immediately given, and the forts fired on the Dutch boats, which immediately withdrew without returning the fire. In an hour afterwards they came again, when Major Stuyvens, commanding on the left bank of the Scheldt, doubled the posts, and they again fired on the Dutch boats, which retreated and were driven back towards themselves. Several more gun-boats arrived yesterday to reinforce the Dutch squadron at Lillo.

AMSTERDAM, MARCH 10.—The *Handelsblad* says—"Constant Polari, alias *Cuervo*, was to-day found guilty by the Court of Assize of a forcible entry at night, and robbing in an uninhabited house, and condemned to stand on a scaffold at the Hague for half-an-hour, to be confined for 12 years in a house of correction, and to the payment of the costs, with orders for an extract of them to be posted up at the

Hague and at Brussels, and that the articles, as many of them as are in the hands of justice, shall be restored to the owner.

In the course of yesterday Polari narrated all the circumstances that preceded, accompanied, and followed the robbery of the diamonds; he repeated his previous declaration; that he was the sole person concerned in the robbery, and that it he was distinguished from the street in the palace of the Prince; that he never had any communication with any person in the Palace."

MARCH 11.—A letter from the Hague of the 10th says—"This afternoon the Cabinet Council is to meet, on account of this affair, of despatches received from Vienna." It is not certain when the Prince of Orange and his son will return, as it is likely they will first pay a visit to Weimar. We learn that the Government intends to adopt some measure of precaution to prevent such disasters and dangers as the ships in the Nieuw Diep were exposed to in the late storms.

THE HAGUE, MARCH 11.—Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Orange and his eldest son, who arrived at Berlin on the 4th inst., as we hear, are expected at the Hague in the beginning of next week.

His Royal Highness Prince Frederick arrived at Birion on the 5th. In consequence of the King's Cabinet order of the 21st of January, respecting the enlistment of men serving in the Schutterij for the colonial service, His Excellency the Director of the War Department has issued the necessary instructions to the Governors of the provinces.

We learn from Zealand, that the Hercules steam-boat is expected at Flushing to tow to Rotterdam the Scheldt and Koophandel merchantmen, formerly Belgian, but now become Dutch by the removal of an Antwerp house. These ships, which ever since the revolution have been lying in the docks at Flushing, are to go to the East Indies.

The works for fortifying the town of Neuzen proceed rapidly. Some changes have lately taken place in the command of the troops in Dutch Flanders.—*Times, March 14, 1834.*

A great variety of rumours has lately been in circulation on the alleged dissensions in the French Cabinet, and the probability of its approaching dissolution. At one time we were told that the party called the *Doctrinaires* had quarrelled with the warmer friends of the late revolution, and that the former must be turned out to make room for the friends of the latter. At another time it was said that M. DURAN, instead of remaining President of the Chamber of Deputies, was to become President of the Council of Ministers, and that Marshal SOULT, with his adherents, was to retire. In fact, there was no end to the variety of reports which were thrown out by the journals upon the public, and which even gained credence among the better informed class of politicians, because it was notorious that the Cabinet was not perfectly united in designs and feelings.

TIMES-OFFICE, 7 o'Clock, A. M.

We have just received by express the Paris papers of Monday. They bring accounts from Bayonne of the 5th inst., which are rather more important than those which had been received for some days before from that quarter. There had been a disturbance in Saragossa on the 27th ult., and some fighting in the streets, by which several lives were lost; but it is not very distinctly stated whether it originated in a Carlist insurrectionary movement. The rebels in the Basque provinces, however, are represented as being more numerous than ever, and daily increasing in numbers. Although General Quesada has a larger force under his command than that which was at the disposal of General Valdez, it seems he stands in need of more troops, in order to be able to act in a decisive manner against the rebels. The latter will not meet Quesada in the field, but move in the circle they have traced out, by which they contrive to avoid the Queen's troops.—*Times, March 12, 1834.*

INDIAN NEWS.

From the *Bengal Chronicle*, March 11, 1834. By the Bombay Papers we learn that the town of Mocha had been taken by storm by a tribe of Bedouins, after being defended for four days. One hundred and twenty-six of the expelled Turks and Arabs took to boats without oars or sails, and were rescued when driving out to sea by the boats of the *Tigris*. Some of them had proceeded to Muscat; but the Governor and five or six followers had arrived in the *Tigris* at Bombay. Eighty thousand rupees was the price offered for the Governor's head. In the sacking of the town the furniture of the Residency was either removed or destroyed. For further details we refer our readers to the extract from the Bombay paper, which is as follows:

BOMBAY.—CAPTURE OF MOCHA.

The Honorable Company's Brig of War, *Tigris*, which arrived on Wednesday last from Mocha, has brought intelligence of the irruption into the territory extending from that place to Hodida, of a host of Bedouin Arabs, composed of various tribes, numbering, it is said, between thirty and forty thousand men, who have pillaged and plundered the whole of the country along that line of coast. They attacked and carried by storm the Town and Fort of Mocha, after a brave resistance by the Turkish garrison of 600 men, a large portion of whom fell in the defence; and of the remainder many sought and received protection on board the Hon. Co.'s surveying ship, *Benares*. Amongst these were the Governor, Toorky-bel-mas, who, with nine attendants, has arrived here in the *Tigris*. It appears, that for the space of three days, the ill-fated town was given up to plunder, during which time the wild and lawless Bedouins, unrestrained in their rapacity and licentiousness, committed the greatest excesses, despoiling the inhabitants of every article of the slightest value, and murdering those who would not, or could not, direct them to the places in which they supposed the Merchants had concealed their wealth. The person and property of the British Agent, a Bohar, were, we hear, respected; and it is said, that all who fled to his house for refuge escaped with their lives, and such property as they were able to convey to it. Many Banians connected with persons at this place, Surat, Bhowanager, &c. who failed, or were unable to avail themselves of this Asylum, were plundered of all they had; and we are sorry to add, several of them were killed.—The following extracts from a letter from an officer on board the *Benares*, dated 26th December last, with which we have been kindly favored, gives the fullest account that we have seen of the murderous doings of the Bedouins.

"Mocha has been taken by the Bedouin Arabs. Toorky-bel Mas, the Chief of the Rebels, at the head of about 600 Turkish soldiers, all that were left as a garrison at Mocha, had 20 days warning to prepare for the Bedouins coming

down to storm and plunder the town. About a fortnight ago they first made their appearance, and in five days, it is computed, near 40,000 assembled outside the town, in their tents, just clear of the range of the guns on the walls. The evening before the attack, I was on shore with some of the officers, when we were taken into the Divan of the Head men, and their appearance was very striking—they were seated in a semicircle, with a brace of pistols in their belts, muskets, or matchlocks and swords standing ready near them—their attendants and their hands at a feeling of admiration weapons in their hands. A strong feeling of admiration could not arise in my mind. I looked on men who in such critical circumstances, far from despairing, looked perfectly collected and firm.

From the ship we observed when the attack was made, by the incessant firing of guns and musketry. We learnt from eye witnesses that the buildings in the suburbs of the town, the walls, sheltered rough ladders to scale the walls, and in spite of a continual fire of grape and canister, they were planted, and as they were knocked down, replanted their ladders, and even heaped up the bodies of their dead comrades to support the broken ones, and enable them to clamber over the wall, which many succeeded in doing, and of course, many died in attempting. When all the Turks were busily employed on the wall, some of the merchants sent one who ployed on a rush was seen from the ship towards it, gun after gun knocked down dozens as they pressed in, but numbers prevailed.—What could 600 men do against, at the very least, 40,000?
