Extracts from English Papers.

The Messenger of Ghent announces, after letters from Germany, that the three Great Northern Powers and the Germanic confederation have drawn up, in common accord, and are about to publish, a manifesto against the treaties of 1815, and the conduct of France and England in the agitations prevailing at this moment in Europe. This manifesto, it adds, received its definitive sanction at the recent interview between the King of Prussia and the Emperor of Austria.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 30.

The Orator's journal contains their columns attacks on King Leopold, every day repeating that neither the King nor the Queen will return to Brussels, and that they left their capital in the greatest haste. It is not possible to see how they can be so sure of this, as they are not even in Brussels. It will perhaps be said, they have received their agents in Brussels, and they are in possession of the city. To which the Messenger de Gand replies, "Should it be possible to be driven away by the Austrian and Prussian ministers, who are to be sent expressly to compel him to abdicate." It is with such miserable reasons that the journals in the pay of King William support the hopes of the restoration, and there are persons to be found who place reliance on them.

BRUSSELS, TOMORROW EVENING, OCT. 29.

We have heard to-day that the conference between the Belgian and Dutch Commissioners is to be resumed at Zandhoven (Lainburg), with the view of regulating the manner of regarrisoning Maestricht, and respecting the navigation of the Meuse. Colonel Wilmar, of the Engineers, left Brussels last night for Zandhoven, charged with power from the Belgian Government to treat with the Dutch Commissioners. The communication lately delivered to the States-General by M. Verolme de Sassen gives, however, little hope that this secondary negotiation will be brought to an amicable conclusion, at least unless the Dutch Government consents to the regulations for the navigation of the Meuse, which it has heretofore always refused, as its last communication of the 18th of October bears witness.

Whilst the journals announce that the Cabinet of the Hague has required the consent of the German Confederation and of the House of Nassau to a cession of part of Luxemburg, we find that the Orangists of the province in question are giving themselves great trouble in getting up a petition praying that it may not be divided, but remain wholly under the dominion of King William. No doubt is entertained but that these hawkers of the petition have received their instructions from the Hague; and it gives an additional proof of the sincerity of the chief of the House of Orange, and of his great desire of putting an end to the differences, which are ruining his people by compelling them to submit to sacrifices which they are totally unable to bear. Europe ought long before this to have interferred, for the ex-King of Belgium has given sufficient evidence that he will never make any concessions until constrained; and to hope that he will ever modify his politics is only entertaining a chimerical illusion. He will wait until he is compelled by the Dutch themselves to concede; but until then, my opinion still is that no progress is out of the question.

THE HAGUE, Oct. 29.

The Minister of Finance went to-day to the Second Chamber of the States-General, in order

to propose the budget of 1834. On this occasion the expenses were divided into ordinary and extraordinary, but included in one project of law. His Excellency declared that the Government had thought it could comply with the desire of a number of members of the Assembly for such a division, as three years' experience had shown the unavoidable extent of the ordinary expenses; and it might be shown that not only could the ordinary expenditure be defrayed by the ordinary revenue, but that it would be possible, by a proper system of taxation, to provide for all the expenditure of the kingdom. The whole amount of the expenditure would be 53,000,000 or 54,000,000, a sum which is even less than the expenditure of 1815.

Count Dietrichstein and Baron d'Arnim, the Austrian and Prussian Ministers appointed to the Court of Brussels, are still, we understand, hugging at Frankfurt, bound together like the two Siamese youths; neither can stir without the other, and it is a happy, voluntary, that they are never both ready to start at the same time. Their mission has lately been the joke of Europe; and why they have not been able, in the course of four or five months had travelling, to get further than Frankfurt, on their road to Brussels, we cannot presume to guess. Certain it is, that if they had succeeded in reaching their appointed station, their presence at Brussels would have had a great effect in undermining the King of Holland, and in hastening the end of the Belgian question. For be it from us in imagination that on this account it is that they have not yet arrived at their destination; but though the Morning Post has declared our repeated predictions to prove to us by quotations the instructions in Prince Schwarzenberg's despatch the high-flown panegyric which it bestowed upon them, perhaps it may condescend to inform us why these diplomatic twins have been unable to effect their north-west passage from Frankfurt to Brussels, and whether they are to be frozen up all the winter through, like Captain Ross in Regent's Inlet.

According to late accounts from Frankfurt, referred to by some of the Paris papers of Wednesday, there are no less than three Russian Plenipotentiaries, including Count Nesselrode, now in Berlin, who are every day engaged in conferences with M. ANGLON, the Prussian Minister of Foreign Affairs, and with the Austrian Minister, Count FIEQUERMONT.

The Notizie del Giorno of Rome gives the following account of new phenomena presented by Mount Vesuvius:—"On the 12th of August, in the afternoon, crevices of the width of several feet were remarked round the whole circumference of the old crater. On the following night a thick column of smoke rose to about a mile into the air, and went in the direction of Castellamare. At three o'clock on the morning of the 13th, three torrents of lava issuing from the opening, formed in April last, rapidly descended in the direction of Torre del Greco, dividing in different streams. At 5 o'clock two other streams, proceeding from the same crater, rushed down towards Crocetta del Cantarone. It was remarked that, two days previously, the water in the wells at Resina had begun to decrease considerably. At about half-past 7 a loud noise was heard repeatedly in the interior of the mountain, and the rapidity of the lava increased. At 11 o'clock in the afternoon three shocks in Mount Vesuvius caused the houses in the neighbouring communes to vibrate, whilst a white column, fractured with red by a flame, which was seen moving inside, rose to a considerable height opposite the rays of the sun. This column had entirely disappeared at 6 in the evening."

INDIAN NEWS.

CHINA.

INSURRECTION IN COCHIN CHINA.—Information has reached Canton of the breaking out of an insurrection in the southern part of Cochin China, in which both natives and Chinese are concerned. In consequence of a popular magistrate having been disgraced and imprisoned at Saigon, through the intrigues of some more courtly colleagues, the people became clamorous and the police was beaten back in an attempt to suppress the public feeling. The wiser ones among the people perceiving that they had gone too far to recede with safety, determined not to allow the military time to collect; and at once formed the resolution of attacking them and killing the officers. This they effected, and having released their imprisoned favourite, whom they then placed at their head, they sent immediately to the Siamese for assistance. As these latter have had an army on the Cochin Chinese frontier for several months, it is impossible to form an idea as to what may be the consequences. The insurrection broke out on the 5th of August.

BENGAL.

(Translated from the Bengāl Hurhār and Chronicle.)

HERAT.—Mirza Abuus, the Prince Royal of Persia on hearing of the demise of his father, ha

left this province with the Perso-Russian army, to proceed to Herat, the capital of Persia (where all the other Princes of the Royal Blood have assembled, together with the chief noblemen of the kingdom), to assume the reins of Government; the departure of Mirza Abuus's army was the signal of revolt to Kameran shah, the ruler of Herat, who immediately shook off the Persian yoke, and having gathered his forces together attacked the rear of the retreating forces, capturing two guns and other spoils, with which the shah arrived safe in his capital as the Persian Prince, owing to the emergency of his speedy arrival at Herat, to prevent discussions regarding the succession to the throne of Persia, did not deem fit to delay his March by encountering with his opponents of Herat.

KABOOL.—The emissaries sent by Shah Soojah-ol-Moolk to incite the Afghans to throw off the yoke of Kameran Shah, and to acknowledge him as the rightful sovereign of Afghanistan, have been seized by the enraged populace and delivered up to their present ruler, who, after having put them to the torture to extract from them all that they knew regarding the schemes, means, and intentions of Shah Soojah-ol-Moolk has cruelly put them to death; this news has greatly affected Shah Soojah-ol-Moolk.

JELALABAD.—Dost Mohomud Khan, the Chieftain of Kabool, Meherdel Khan of Kandahar, and Sooltan Mahomud Khan of Peshawar have combined their forces under the commands of Meher del Khan, Rahim del Khan, and Mahomud Isake, to oppose the progress of Shah Soojah-ol-Moolk, and give him a battle at this place.

SUKKA POOR.—Shah Soojah-ol-Moolk being joined by successors sent by the Seindian Chief, under the command of Muddet Khan, has marched from this place to meet the combined Afghan forces at Jallalabad, so that a battle may speedily be expected.

LAHORE.—The Maha Rajah Runjeet Singh, the sovereign of Punjab, is still laid up by indisposition; the physicians having decided that His Majesty's complaint is the rheumatism, have administered oil by friction on the affected parts, and have advised the Maha Rajah to wear flannel next his skin, and avoid all cooling diet. The charge of bribery against Mr. Ventura, proving to be malicious and false, he has, after receiving an honorary khalat, been reinstated with the government of Deera Gaze Khan; and his calumniators shortly reprimanded for their evil intentions by the Maha Rajah.

CASHMERE.—Rajah Khoosul Singh, the jemadar of this province, sent amongst other presents to the Maha Rajah Runjeet Singh, five flasks of Ganges river water, taken from Gunga Sagur, in Bengal, and a map of this province, sketched by Mr. Hume, was at the same time presented to the Maha Rajah, who, after perusing the map attentively, and admiring its workmanship, had it kept in the durbar. Owing to the still prevalent distress in this province, the Maha Rajah has sent an agent to report on the best means of relieving the distress.

NEW CANAL.—It is said that Government contemplates the cutting of a canal from Rajemahl to Cutwa, and that this is to be secured by locks. A survey, we are told, has actually been commenced to ascertain the practicability of the attempt. If it be found freely to succeed, the advantages to the trading interests and the community at large will prove immense in having a shortened line of communication, free from the numerous shoals and windings of the great river. A bar of sand which lies across the Bheerutt at Sootes point, makes it necessary for large boats to proceed lower down, where a passage is found at either the Jellinghee or the Matabangah, but then during the above stated period, it is found necessary to deepen by drag machines, which is sometimes the cause of delay. It would be advisable in working on the projected canal to widen it by one half more than the breadth of those already cut to the north and south of Cutta, and the additional expense would hardly be a matter of moment in such an undertaking. In the voyage through the Sunderbuns by Tolly's nulls, the channel is literally choked up by the number of small craft with which it is perpetually incumbered so as to render the passage of larger boats extremely tedious. By having the new canal widened, as we have suggested, steam

ers would have room to tug the largest river boats with facility and expedition. The line from Rajemahl to Cutwa is direct; the face of the country presents no inequalities; the rivers which the canal would cross are insignificant, and the work itself would be a noble monument of Government munificence.

LIBERTY AND KNOWLEDGE.—The Congress of the United Mexican States have appropriated 30,000 dollars for the purchase of periodical publications, almost all of which are, of course, to be imported from foreign countries. The bill, as passed by the House of Representatives, appropriated 25,000 dollars; but, on being increased by the Senate, was adopted with their amendment. Our countrymen will believe that the Mexicans are in earnest in the pursuit of national happiness, by the only means, viz, the improvement of the people, when they see the Government adopting measures that reflect so much honour upon their judgment and their feelings.
