The 8th Annual National Folk Festival is to be held from Thursday December 7 thru Sunday December 17 on a private farm in Rivonia known as 'The Farm' and owned by the Bryanston Churches Youth Council.

Amongst the many exciting names appearing this year are the Ahmed Mukhathar Group, Des & Dawn Lindberg, Edi Nederlander, Jerham Bhana, Linda Dawson, Mel Miller, Ritchie Morris, Theo Coetzee and groups from folk societies.

Also included on the agenda besides the normal evening performances of traditional and contemporary music will be musical workshops, discussions, children afternoon concerts, folk dancing, Volkspele, arts and crafts, music for Africa, jazz and three 'New Faces' concerts where any member of the public is invited to do a number on stage.

A bus service from the city will be arranged, and those who book through Computicket or read the newspapers will be advised of the times and places of departure. Among the many artists taking part will be: Els Soccarats, Spanish trio who play traditional and contemporary Latin American; Jannie Hofmeyer, singer / composer from Cape Town; Paul Clingman, singer/composer of country and contemporary folk; Edi Nederlander, singer, composer and guitarist; Caroline and John van Nierop, contemporary and traditional husband and wife duo; and a host of new faces.

There will also be a special talk by Ramblin' Jack Domp.
