SOME of South Africa's leading pop, jazz and classical guitarists get together at Natal University's Sneddon Theatre in Durban on Saturday afternoon for a *Guitars For Africa* concert.

The concert, which begins at 2.30 pm, has been organised by the Music Association of Natal (MANA) and the university's SRC.

The line-up features top acoustic guitarist Steve Newman and singer-songwriter-guitarist Edi Niederlander, who will perform together as well as solo; the popular duo of Ken E Henson and Syd Kitchen; Steve Fataar, who will play blues and rock; jazz guitarist Andrew Eagle; and Madala, a member of Afro-rock group Zanusi who will gives a jazz slant to traditional Maskanda music.

The programme will cover a wide range of musical styles ranging from classical to blues to

Tickets, at R5 each, may be booked at Computicket.

The Guitars For Africa concert, which is being held in association with Dave Marks' 3rd Ear Music and Tusk Records, is a fund-raising event for MANA, which was established a year ago to promote and support local musicians.

Among the projects that the association has mooted is a national music convention to discuss, among other things, the future of music in South-Africa. It is planned to hold the convention in Cape Town in January next year.

A festival of SA's top guitarists

HEAD for Natal University's Sneddon Theatre on Saturday for a feast of some of the best guitar music in South Africa.

It's the Guitars For Africa concert at 2.30 pm and topping the bill will be ace acoustic guitarist Steve Newman, sharing the stage with the exciting singer-songwriter-guitarist Edi Niederlander.

Together, Newman and Niederlander are a formidable music force. At a recent concert in Cape Town, people had to be turned away at the door.

Newman is a guitarist of international repute, having played at such festivals as Glastonbury and Sidmouth in the UK where he shared the stage with such stars as Van Morrison and Michelle Shocked. He has also played on the folk music circuit in Britain, Holland and Scandinavia.

A child of the 1960s, Steve began playing guitar in Cape Town where he was exposed to the influences of Goema music as well as the sounds of pop, rock and folk of that era.

Other influences on his music have been many and varied — including classical, bluegrass, flamenco, African, Bushman and even Japanese music — which have all been integrated into a style entirely his own.

While Steve has collaborated with many musicians in the past, notably fellow Cape Town guitarist Tony Cox and British cellist Kathryn Locke, he has come into his own playing with bassist Gito Baloi and percussionist Ian Herman in the group Tananas.

The group have released an album, Tananas, to wide acclaim, and were nominated for an Octave Award re-

cently. A second album is due for release in September after which the band will tour France, Germany, Sweden and the UK.

Edi Niederlander has distinguished herself in both the recording and live performance arenas with a track record that includes a solo album and mega-concerts appearances in Johan nesburg and Cape Town.

She has paid her dues on the restaurant circuit as well as appearing at many concerts for such causes as No-Nukes and feminist festivals. The title track from her debut album, Ancient Dust, featured on the soundtrack of the movie Jock of the Bushveld.

Also taking part in Guitars For Africa will be the duo Ken E Henson and Syd Kitchen, Steve Fataar, Andrew Eagle and Madala. Tickets, at R5, can be booked through Computicket. This the first major gig organised by the Music Association of Natal.

slant from his days with Zanusi.


Guitars for Africa, which starts at 230 pm, is a funraising even for Mana, which was established last year to promote and support local musicians.

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
MANA plans music fest
