## Marks to record tracks via satellite

RACKS for *The Hidden Years*, the debut album by local music producer and songwriter David Marks, will be recorded in Durban tomorrow, with a direct link, via digital technology, to the SABC's Radio Park Music Studios in Johannesburg.

About 50 musicians, with whom Marks has worked in his 30 years as a sound engineer, record producer and songwriter, have contributed to this 14-track album, which is expected to be released later in the year.

The digital technology that connects studios around the world has been used only twice before in South Africa – by Mango Groove, who connected from Tokyo to the SABC in Johannesburg, and on Marks's *The Hidden Years* album in January, when eight Cape Town musicians recorded from the SABC studios in Sea Point to the M5 Studios in Auckland Park, Johannesburg.

Today's recordings will feature percussionist and producer Dan Chiorboli, and David's family of musicians – his brother-in-law, singer-songwriter Len Downing; mother-in-law and piano and choir teacher Leonie Downing; and wife Fran and daughters Lisha and Rose-Lee Marks.

Steve Fataar, Ken E Henson, Syd Kitchen and Madala Kunene will also contribute.

To complete the project, musicians Hugh Masakela, Manfred Mann (in London), Shawn Phillips (in Los Angeles) and, on their return from America, Ladysmith Black Mambazo, will also make guest appearances.
