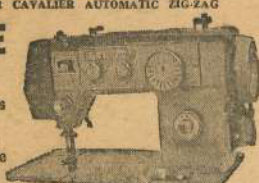

COPS ARREST 357 WHITES

THREE HUNDRED and fifty seven White Witwatersrand University students were arrested by the police in Johannesburg yesterday, after they defied the ban on their protest march through the streets of the city.

After being arrested and taken to John Vorster Square where they were photographed, fingerprinted and had their names and addresses taken, the students were released.

They are to be charged under the Riotous Assemblies Act and will be summoned to appear in the Johannesburg Magistrate's Court, police have announced.

PROTESTING

The students were protesting against the detention under the Terrorism Act of 22 detainees, including Mrs. Winnie Mandela, wife of the banned African National Congress leader, Nelson Mandela, who is being held on Robben Island.

The students were banned from holding the march under a court order, nevertheless some 600 set out on the march in defiance of the law.

English speaking universities throughout the country have expressed their indignation at the ban and four main ones are seeking per-

Mr. Meshack Tshabalala (41), of Dube, who was known as "Sbaga" by his colleagues and passengers, was found in a pool of blood near the road. His skull had been split of the back and it appeared his

NO RIGHTS FOR NON-TSWANAS IN MABOPANE

MAFEKING.—All the non-Tswana African National Units who live at the new mammoth cosmopolitan township of Mabopane outside Pretoria will not have trading rights nor ownership of land, according to Chief H. T. R. Maseloane, Minister of Community Affairs in the Tswana Territorial Authority.

This statement was made in the second week of the second sitting of the Tswana Territorial Authority in Mafeking.

The township of Mabopane is being built by the Pretoria City Council and has now been handed over for administration to the Tswana Territorial Authority.

The non-Tswanas who will be accommodated at Mabopane will be those working within the magisterial area of Pretoria.

In addressing the session, Chief Maseloane said: "Mabopane is within the area of the

Tswana Territorial Authority and anybody living there who is not a Tswana will not have the right to trade, to own a house or to buy land. All these will be for the Tswana people only.

"The only thing we have made provision for is that the schools will teach the children of these other national units in their own mother tongues."

MINISTER

The Minister of Education, Mr. M. M. Selthogelo said the school administration will fall directly under the Tswana Territorial Authority.

Chief Maseloane further said: "The non-Tswanas at

Mabopane will either have to become Tswana nationals with Tswana citizenship, or, if they do not like the set up at Mabopane, they will have no choice but to move over to their own Territorial Authorities.

It was further pointed out that the non-Tswanas at Ga-Rankuwa will have to be moved over to Mabopane where they can have their children taught in their mother tongues because "at Ga-Rankuwa, the schools are going to be a hundred per cent Tswana," said Chief Maseloane.

Two soccerites' street brawl ended in stabbing — evidence

VEREENIGING.— A 17-year-old crack wing-half of Dangerous Lions Football Club of Sharpeville was found not guilty and discharged by Mr. L. A. Mackay at the Vereeniging Regional Court on a charge of culpable homicide.

The youth was alleged to have killed another soccerite, Mr. Esau Russia Rampal of Red Pirates by stabbing him with a knife in the chest on the night of February 14, in Sharpeville, this year.

Evidence in court was that while the youth was walking in a street, in the township together with Mr. Abednego Mkwanzai they met Mr. Rampal.

While they were talking a quarrel arose over football.

Mr. Mkwanzai told the court that after the quarrel the two youths fought with clenched fists. He said that

they fought for a long time. Suddenly Mr. Rampal brandished a knife and stabbed the youth in the leg.

"A bitter struggle ensued for the possession of the knife between the two. I then noticed that the youth was bleeding from the leg. The youth managed to force the knife out of Mr. Rampal's hand

and plunged it into his chest. After the stabbing, Mr. Rampal walked away but died in his own home," said Mr. Mkwanzai.

The youth told the court in his defence that he was attacked and stabbed with a knife by Mr. Rampal. He said that their football club had beaten Red Pirates two weeks prior to this in 1967 and he quarrelled

with him during the period of play.

He admitted stabbing him and said that he had no intention to kill him but was only protecting himself.

The Magistrate accepted the youth's evidence and said that it was quite clear from State witnesses that Mr. Rampal was aggressive on that night.

He therefore found him not guilty and discharged him. The youth had pleaded not guilty to the charge and was defended by J. de Klerk.
