S OME weeks ago we referred our readers to some remarks made by Professor Fischer in the course of an address d-livered at Port Elizabeth, bearing on the importance of the study of the sciences; and we stated then that the Professor who so strongly advocated emore thorough study of science, was him of knowledge of scientific subjects here. We suggested regular scientific excursions as a means of, to a pertain extent remedying the defect. The students have had one excursion, and, a: far as we have been able to judge, have profited much by it. But now, there is another thing, which should be undertaken "in the interest of science" by the students, - one of those neglected opportunities spoken of by Professor Fischer. How is it there is nothing lin the way of a musoum in connection with our College? We have here, at Stellenbosch, young men from all parts of South Africa. Now in a few weeks' time these will all have dispersed to their homes. If this be Boarders to their homes in -taken advantage of by persons among us "Tho have any interest in science, we ire sure they will soon have the means to furnish a museum. We take for granted that young people are fond of collect-

ing. Now if each, say of 150 students bring from home half-a-dozen geological, botanical (or other -ical) specimens, we have the means of fitting up a small museum. 4
