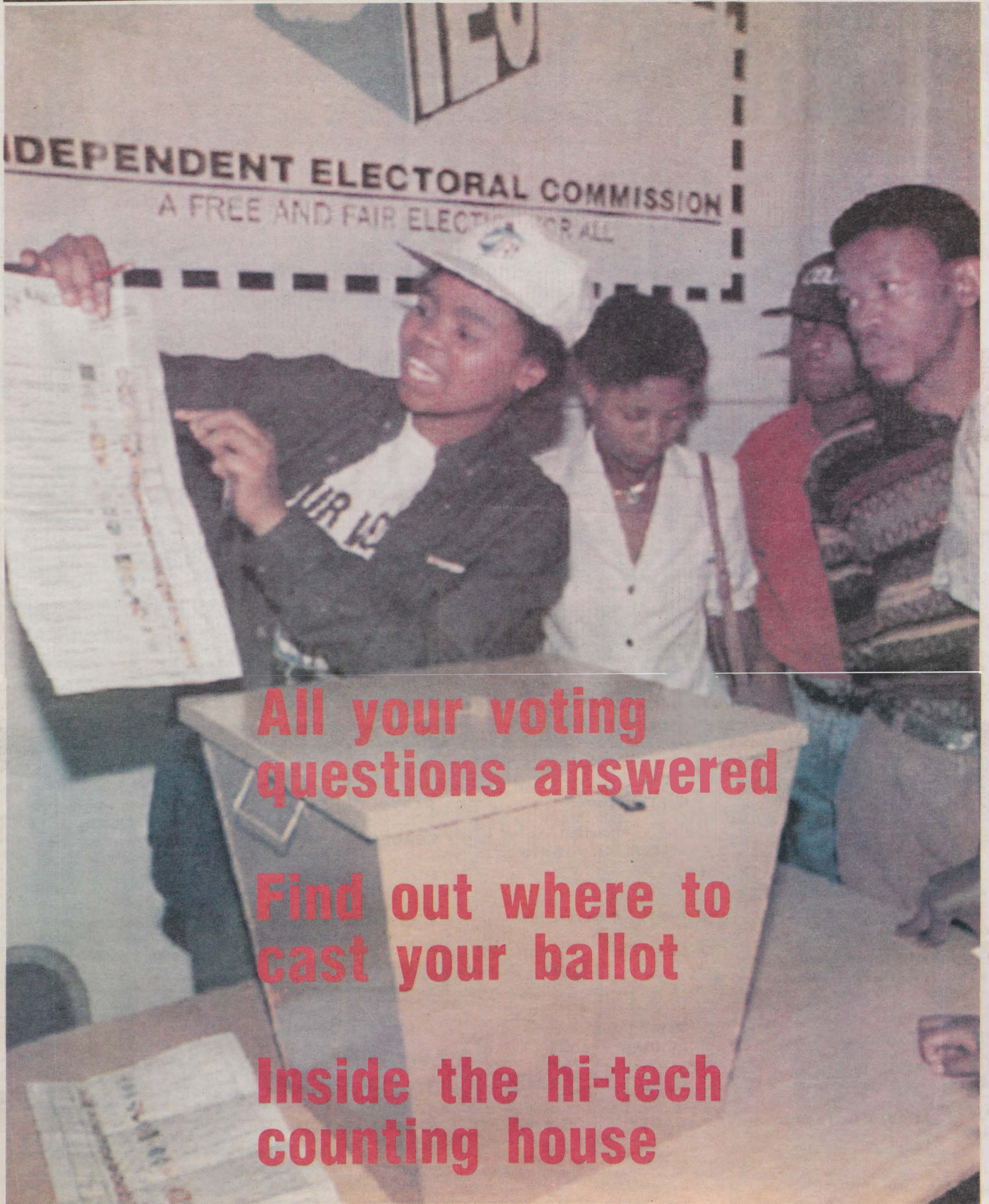

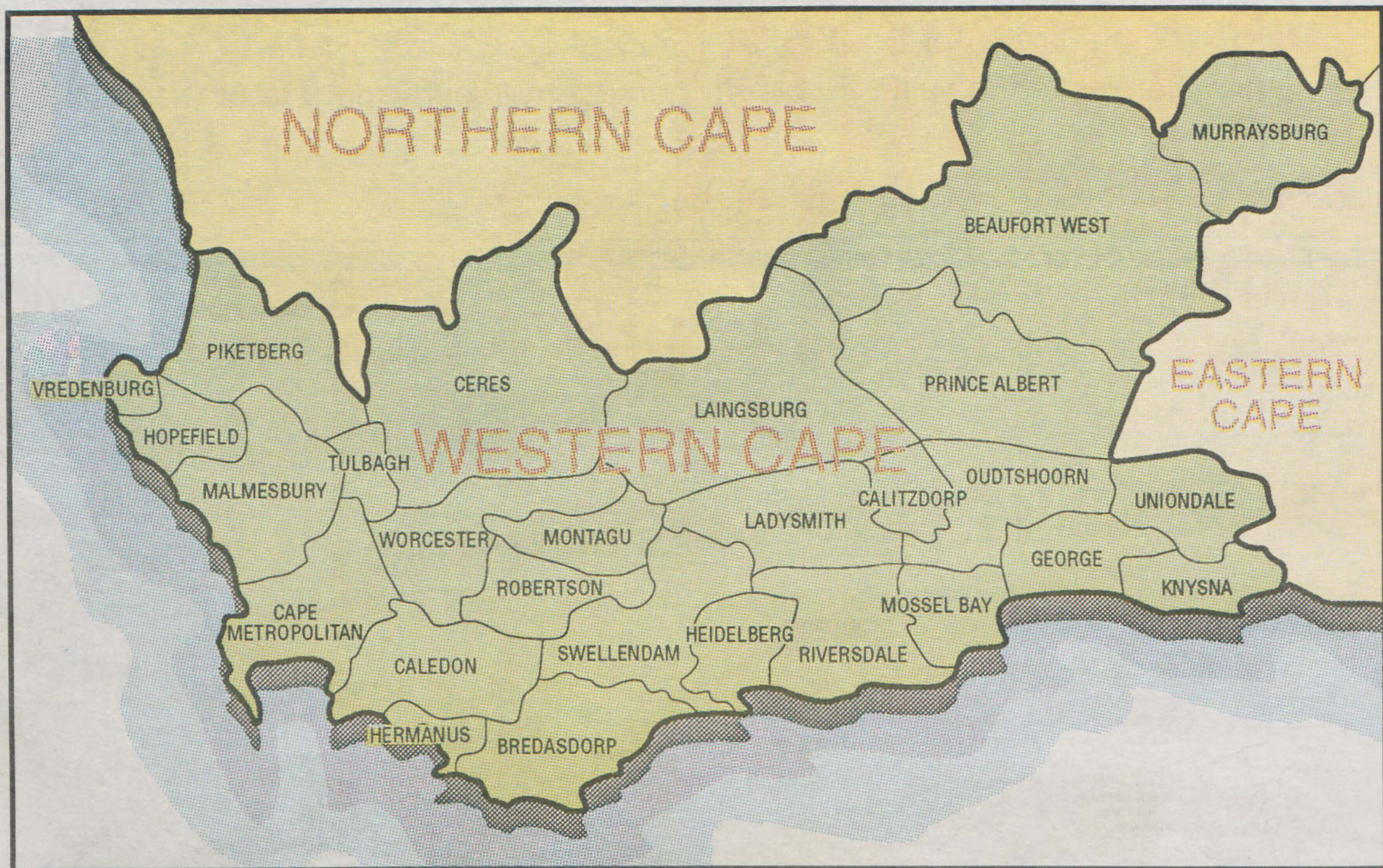

The jewel in South Africa's crown

THE Western Cape, which is to have its own semi-autonomous provincial government in the new system, is one of the most compact and relatively prosperous areas among the country's nine regions.

Compared with most of the other proposed regions it has some of the best prospects for economic development and stability.

The demarcation commission that set the boundaries found the Western Cape to be economically functional, with the core being the more industrialised Cape Town metropolitan area.

Along with the huge fruit and

wine industry of the rural areas, there are also prospects for the development of more hi-tech industries in the urban areas.

In addition, the tourist industry — already one of the highest money earners of the region — can be greatly developed.

The commission found the Western Cape was "an economically viable region because of its well-developed and diversified industrial base and its successful commercial agricultural production".

It added: "With the national legislative capital and the Cape provincial administration capital, the

Western Cape has sufficient institutional and administrative capacity to manage the development of the area and to undertake the necessary planning, policy and administrative functions associated with effective government.

"There are also adequate tertiary and other training institutions to facilitate capacity building in the area where it is currently deficient.

"The Western Cape is a heterogeneous region comprising primarily Afrikaans, Xhosa and English-speaking people.

"It forms a compact region with

an urban base."

The Western Cape has an area of 108 600 square kilometres and a population of some 3 700 000.

The coloured community forms the largest part of the population at 59 percent, followed by whites at 22,1 percent. The black population is some 18 percent and the Indian population about 0,7 percent.

But there are no really reliable figures for blacks. With the continuing influx to squatter camps, the figure could be much higher than the official one.

The official figure for voters in the area is some 2 400 000, with the

estimate for coloured voters at 1 288 000, whites 662 000, blacks 404 000 and Indians 19 000.

Here, again, the figure for blacks could be much higher.

The bulk of the population is aged between 15 and 64, with a slight preponderance of males to females (51,1 percent to 48,9).

One of the biggest assets of the region is that it has by far the lowest illiteracy rate — only 8,5 percent of the economically active population.

At R15-billion, the Western Cape has the country's third highest gross geographic product.

WHAT'S HAPPENING

April 20: Media centre at Gallagher Estate operational.

April 26: Special votes for infirm, prisoners and overseas voters.

April 27: Public holiday, first day of voting at 9000 polling stations which open between 7am and 7pm.

April 28: Normal working day, last day of voting. Ballot boxes transferred to between 800 and 1000 counting stations.

April 29: Vote counting starts at 6am. First unofficial results expected by midday.

April 30: Counting continues, with provisional results being updated continually on SABC's TV1 and CCV.

May 1/2: IEC announcement expected on final results and validity of election.

May 6: New parliament elects new president in Cape Town.

May 10: Public holiday, inauguration of new president at the Union Buildings in Pretoria.

HOW IT CAME ABOUT

Gallagher Estate is one of the biggest conference centres in the country and was opened in September last year. It is situated just off the N1, between Johannesburg and Pretoria. It belonged to one of the pioneers of Johannesburg, Harold Gallagher, who left the land to Child Welfare about 17 years ago.

Developer Venter Odendaal was responsible for turning it into the luxury centre it is today. Odendaal, who is a keen gardener, plotted every tree in the 50-year-old garden on computer, and then had architects design the conference centre, function rooms and office blocks around them.

It is Odendaal who has asked the SA Tourism Board to become involved in promoting the country among the captive audience of the world media over the next few weeks. He even plans to promote South Africa, by hosting about 200 journalists a day in the extensive gardens and plying them with South African food and wine.

All eyes on hi-tech wonderland

ALL the election results will be announced from the grand ballroom at Gallagher's Estate in Midrand, just outside Johannesburg, and preparations are far advanced.

A state-of-the-art media centre is being built in a hall as big as an aircraft hangar. About 800 special pay phones have been installed, 150 of which will have high-speed modem facilities to plug into laptop computers. There will be about 160 television and fax outlets.

A wall of video terminals in the media centre will keep about 3 000 foreign journalists and their South African

counterparts informed at all times of what is happening elsewhere in the sprawling complex, where IEC chairman Mr Justice Johan Kriegler will preside.

Next to the media centre there will be a special auditorium that political parties and news organisations will be able to rent on a "timeshare" basis for interviews and press conferences before, during and after the election.

There will be hourly IEC briefings for the media, with news coming in from more than 9 000 polling stations across the country.

When counting begins at 6 am on April

29 at about 1 000 counting centres, votes will be counted in batches of 3 000 and the results will be fed by computer to the IEC headquarters. They will then be released to the media and broadcast by the SABC.

By law the IEC has between two and 10 days to make a decision on whether the election was "substantially free and fair" and to announce the final result.

About 1 000 guests will be invited to the main ballroom, where Judge Kriegler will make the announcement. Each political party will have a ration of guests, apart from diplomats, observers and foreign dignitaries.

The event will be staged as a television spectacular and the SABC is in charge of the production.

SABC officials say they hope President De Klerk and African National Congress president Nelson Mandela will be among the guests. Since Mr Mandela is widely expected to become the president-elect, it would be a glittering occasion for him to make his first public announcement and for it to be televised simultaneously around the world.

It is estimated that more than 800 million people will witness the event on television in more than 120 countries.

Big changes in radio, TV programmes

THERE will be drastic changes on television and radio once the election gets going. Much of the normal programming will be shelved as all channels and stations concentrate on the election.

From April 26, TV1 will be known as Channel 1 and CCV as Channel 2. Entertainment has been moved to NNTV, which will be known as Channel 3.

"This is the biggest news story and as a public broadcaster we have an obligation to bring to South Africa the process of democracy," says SABC election television editor Andre le Roux.

It is also the biggest production the corporation has ever undertaken and as host broadcaster it will be sending about 1 000 reporters, cameramen, production and studio staff and writers out into the field with 30 outside broadcasting units.

This is the SABC's plan:

April 26

THE SABC will broadcast visuals of South Africans voting around the world, starting with Good Morning South Africa. South Africans living abroad will be able to vote at embassies and legations in about 150 towns and cities in more than 80 countries.

On the 6pm news viewers will be told of the SABC's detailed plans for coverage over the following week. News bulletins will be broadcast at noon and at 8pm on all channels throughout election week.

April 27

THERE will be coverage of the first voting in South Africa as the polls open at 7am. The SABC will be crossing to its 30 outside broadcasting points throughout the day and there will be regular commentaries from political analysts

and experts around the country.

News bulletins will be updated throughout the day and election coverage will be interspersed with "tension-breakers" — light music, videos and comedy sketches.

April 28

IF the bulk of voting takes place on April 27, the SABC will consider reverting back to normal television programming on TV1 and CCV, using normal news slots for election coverage. But there would be hourly news updates nevertheless.

April 29 and 30

THE Independent Electoral Commission will begin counting votes at 6am on April 29. The SABC expects the first results to come through by noon the same day.

The SABC will broadcast "scoreboards" showing the various political parties and their vote to-

tals nationally, as well as in the nine regions. As the results (at that stage still unofficial) come streaming in, they will be added to the running totals of the parties by computer. The bulk of the results are expected in by April 30.

May 1 and 2

THE waiting begins for the final results. The SABC will be given about four hours notice of the great event so that it can set up its equipment at Gallagher's Estate ballroom, outside Johannesburg.

The declaration that the election was free and fair and the announcement of the final results by the IEC will be broadcast live around the world. But the duration of any disputes over the voting will determine the actual timetable.

"We will be broadcasting for 24 hours. As long as results are coming in we will be on the air by ra-

dio and television," Mr Le Roux says.

For practical reasons most of the election broadcasts will be in English, although the SABC says it will do what it can to effect a fair balance between Afrikaans, South Sotho, North Sotho, Pedi, Tswana, Zulu and Xhosa. Some coverage in minority languages such as Venda, Ndebele and Swazi will be done from time to time.

How it will work is that while English is being broadcast on Channel 1, Channel 2 will be broadcasting in the Sotho family of languages. When Channel 1 gives Afrikaans and the Nguni family of languages a chance, Channel 2 will switch to English, giving television viewers the opportunity of hearing English at all times by moving between the two channels.

The SABC warns that because of the unpredictability of the election coverage, normal radio and television scheduling could be affected until mid-May.

You ask . . . we answer

IN recent weeks The Argus has received many inquiries from readers who have never voted before. Their questions have been collected and summarised so that comprehensive answers can be provided. Many of the questions touch on the secrecy of the ballot. Here is a representative sample, with the answers . . .

Q WILL my vote really be secret? Who guarantees that it will be secret?

A WHEN you make your cross next to the political party of your choice, you do so when you are alone inside a small compartment. No one can see what you are doing. You then fold your voting paper (ballot card) and drop it into a box, where the ballot cards of all the other voters will be placed. There is no number or mark on that piece of paper which can in any way connect it to you, and there is no way anyone can ever find out how you voted — unless you tell them, of course.

Q I HEAR that my hands will be stained with invisible ink when I vote. Why?

A IN this election there will be no list of voters, and to make sure that people do not vote again after they have already voted, their hands will be stained with an invisible marker when they receive their ballot card. This stain will show up under ultraviolet light. One of the first things officials will do when you arrive to vote is to ask you to place your hands in a box with an ultraviolet light, so that they can make sure you have not voted already. The invisible marker wears off in a few days.

Q WILL my identity document be marked? If so, won't this let people know how I voted?

A EVERYONE'S identity documents will be stamped with the same stamp when they arrive to vote. This is an additional check to ensure that people do not vote more than they are allowed to. When you arrive to vote, your identity document will be checked to make sure it has not already been stamped. There is no way that anyone

can tell from the stamp on your identity document which party you voted for.

Q IS anyone allowed to make me say how I voted?

A NO. The new constitution guarantees that your vote is secret. All democracies have secret voting in elections. Anyone who tries to make you tell them how you voted is breaking the law. If you do answer questions about how you voted, there is no way for those questioning you to find out if you are telling the truth.

Q WHAT if people who know me see me at the polling station?

A WHOEVER sees you at the polling station, or even inside the hall, cannot find out which party you voted for. Political parties will not be allowed to set up tables or have representatives anywhere near the polling station. You are allowed to vote at any of the 9 000 polling stations in the country. You do not have to vote at the one nearest your home. If you feel unhappy about being seen at the polling station by people you know, then go and vote at a polling station far from where you live or work. Voting will be allowed over two days, on Wednesday and Thursday, and your vote will have the same value no matter where you vote, or on which of the two days you vote.

Q THEY say that some of the parties boycotting the election will be able to see the invisible marker to see whether a person has voted.

A THIS is most unlikely. To do so they would have to use special ultraviolet light equipment and they would also have to get you to hold your hands under the light.

NEW SOUTH AFRICAN GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE

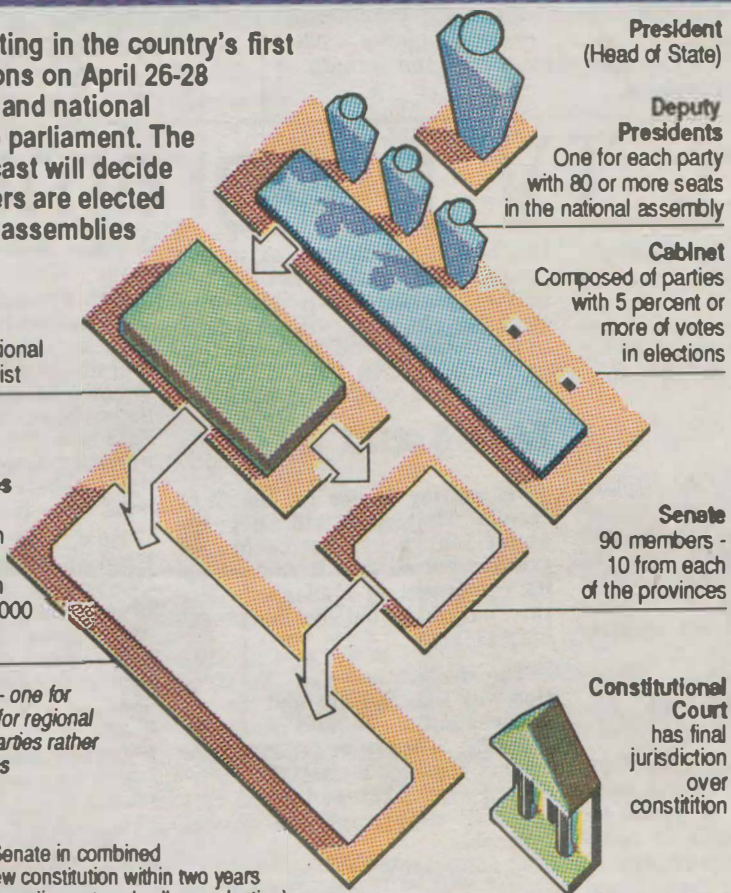
South Africans voting in the country's first multi-racial elections on April 26-28 will elect regional and national representatives to parliament. The number of votes cast will decide how many members are elected to nine provincial assemblies

National Assembly
200 members from national list, 200 from regional list

Provincial Legislatures
(About 500 members in total) 30-100 for each of the nine provinces. Total votes cast in each province divided by 50,000 gives numbers of seats

Everyone has two votes - one for National Assembly, one for regional legislature. Vote is for parties rather than individual candidates

National Assembly and Senate in combined session must produce new constitution within two years (or president will dissolve parliament and call new election)

SOUTH AFRICAN POLITICAL PARTIES

The 11th hour decision on Tuesday by Zulu chief Mangosuthu Buthelezi's Inkatha Freedom Party to contest South Africa's elections means there will be six main parties competing in the country's first all-race elections on April 26 - 28



AFRICAN NATIONAL CONGRESS

Led by veteran black nationalist Nelson Mandela, the ANC was founded in January 1912 as the South African Native National Congress and is Africa's oldest liberation movement. It favours free enterprise with some state involvement in key sectors of the economy



NATIONAL PARTY

The party created and institutionalised apartheid - racial segregation - and has ruled South Africa since 1948. The NP now presents itself as a non-racial party with the experience to lead South Africa into the post-apartheid future



PAN AFRICANIST CONGRESS

Radical black party formed in 1959 by a breakaway faction of the ANC. Police accused its guerrilla wing of racially-motivated attacks on whites. It wants land returned to dispossessed blacks and greater state control of the economy



DEMOCRATIC PARTY

Formed in 1989 from the Progressive Federal Party (PFP), the Independent Party and the National Democratic Movement. The PFP had a history of opposition to apartheid and the DP has laid claim to its anti-apartheid mantle. Led by Zach de Beer, it favours strong individual rights and a free-market economy



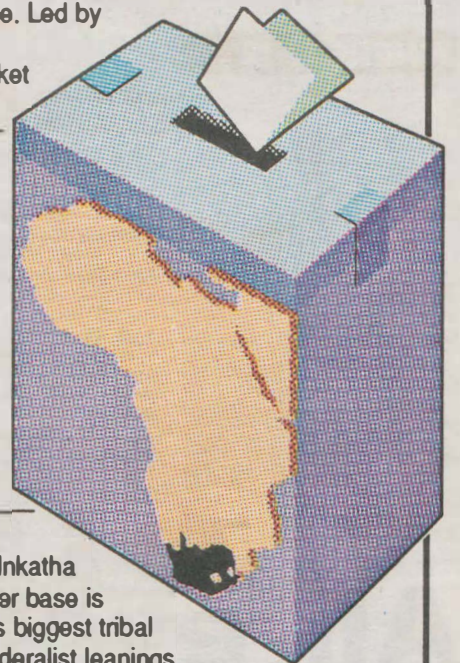
FREEDOM FRONT

Formed by former Defence Force chief General Constand Viljoen, who broke ranks with hardline white rightists boycotting the elections and demanding an Afrikaner homeland. The Front also wants a white homeland, but doesn't believe this can be achieved by boycotting the election



INKATHA FREEDOM PARTY

Led by Mangosuthu Buthelezi, Inkatha is the ANC's main rival. Its power base is among the Zulus, South Africa's biggest tribal group. It is pro-business with federalist leanings

Q WHO will count the votes that are cast in the election?

A THE votes will be counted by officials of the Independent Electoral Commission, in front of witnesses from all the political parties. There will be more than 9 000 points around the country where people can vote, and when all the voting has been completed the ballot papers will be taken to about 1 000 counting points in different parts of the country, where they will be tallied up. Counting will be done in batches of 3 000 votes and the results will be sent by computer to the Independent Electoral Commission's election headquarters in Midrand, just outside Johannesburg, where the results will be announced.

Q PLEASE explain what they mean by a double ballot? Some voter education programmes have stressed that a person may vote only once.

A YOU will get two voting papers, one to vote for the party of your choice in the National Assembly and one to vote for the party of your choice in the provincial parliament.

To avoid confusion, when you arrive to vote you will be given a ballot paper for the National Assembly first, and only when you have dropped that paper into the ballot box will you be given a ballot paper for the provincial parliament.

You will actually have voted twice, but only on the one occasion. You cannot vote in the National Assembly election on one day and for the provincial parliament on the next day. Neither can you vote for the National Assembly at one polling point and the provincial parliament at another polling point. Both votes must be cast on the same single visit to a voting station.

Q WHAT is the Independent Electoral Commission and what does it do?

A IT is a body of 16 people headed by Mr Justice Johan Kriegler, a respected

South African judge. There are five foreign members of the commission, from the United States, Canada, Eritrea, Zimbabwe and Denmark. All members of the commission have been approved by the political parties taking part in the election.

The commission is completely in charge of the election. It supervises the campaign, organises and supervises the voting, appoints officials to serve in each of the more than 9 000 polling stations, counts votes and announces the results. It also arbitrates on all disputes involving the election.

The commission must declare the election to have been "substantially free and fair" before the result becomes official and the new government takes over.

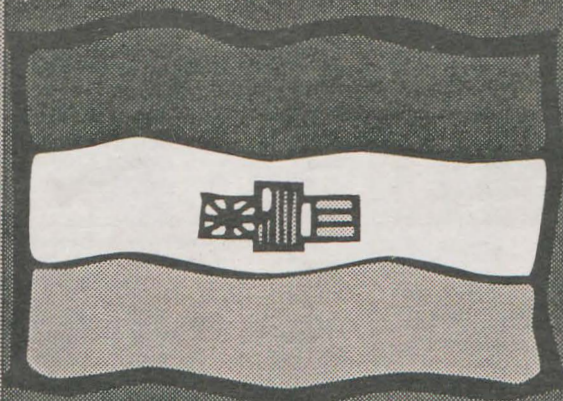
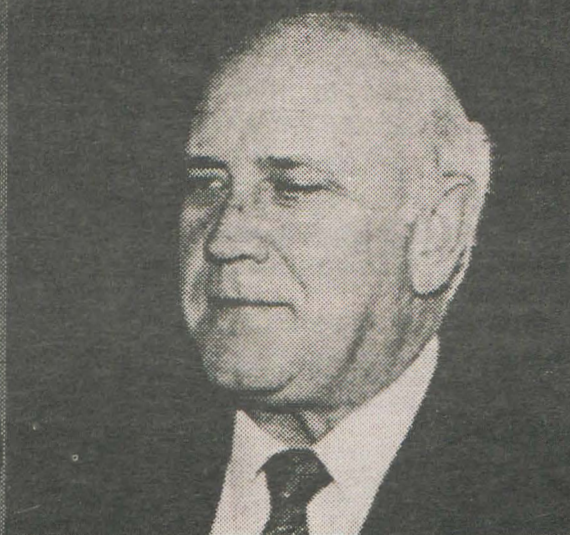
Q WHAT happens if the election is disrupted, or if it is not free and fair?

A IF the Independent Electoral Commission decides that the election was not substantially free and fair, the Transitional Executive Council and the government will continue to run the country - as it has been doing for some months now - until a new election can be held. It is most unlikely that this will happen, since elaborate precautions are being taken to ensure that the election is substantially free and fair, and because almost all political parties are taking part and between them they represent about 95 percent of the adult population. It is in the best interests of all of them that the election be free and fair.

Q CAN I be penalised if I decided I don't want to vote?

A IT is your democratic right not to vote if you so choose. Some organisations and parties are calling for a boycott, and it is their right to do so. There is no penalty for not voting.

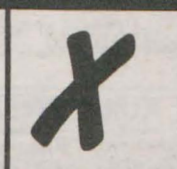

Voters from South Africa's nine electoral provinces will elect members to the national assembly and to provincial legislatures in the first multi-racial elections on April 26-28

There will be 400 seats in the National Assembly – 200 regional seats and 200 national seats. Each elector will have two votes, one for each part of the National Assembly. The number of seats in the provincial legislatures will be based on the total number of votes each party wins in the election.
