CAPE TOWN, SEPTEMBER 2, 1842.

THE MEASURE OF AWARDING *Cape Wine* and *Brandy* *Cups*, for the purpose of exciting a proper competition in improving those articles of our staple produce, has had a promising effect. Yesterday was the day fixed for awarding those *Cups*; and as the notice had been published only about 3 weeks previous, only 5 samples of *Wine*, and 1 sample of *Brandy* were sent in. This is quite enough for the commencement. Several more samples, we hear, were also forwarded, but arrived too late to be received for competition.

At 12 o'clock the meeting of the Agricultural Society was opened in the Commercial Room, when, Mr. J. B. EBDEN having been called to the chair, the following Report of the Judges, to decide upon the samples, was read:—

Having proceeded to examine and taste the following samples of *Wine*, forwarded to compete for the *Cup*, viz:

1, marked Good Hope, six bottles,

2, " Z M, six do.

3, " six do.

4, Hoop, half-a-m.

5, OOO, do.

We are unanimous in opinion, that the sample marked *Hoop* is the best of those submitted, and entitled to the Prize.

Only one sample of *Brandy* having been produced, we did not consider it expedient to proceed to the tasting of it.

J. B. EBDEN, Chairman.

Mr. N. G. Vos, residing at Klapmuts, having then been declared as the successful competitor, the sample of Mr. H. C. ESTERHUYSEN, of Klapmuts, was declared the next best,—that of Mr. C. G. MARAIS, of Jonkershoek, the third,—that of Mr. P. J. DE VILLIERS, A. B. son, of Great Drakenstein, the fourth; and that of Mr. J. W. ESTERHUYSEN, Rondebosch, the fifth.

A sixth sample of Mr. H. J. NEETHLING, of Stellenbosch, was also produced, but could not be received in competition, as it had arrived, through some unfortunate circumstance, after the date fixed in the 6th section of the Prospectus.

The sample of Mr. Vos having been put up for sale, 3 leaguers were sold at Rds. 60; and the same price was obtained by Mr. H. J. NEETHLING in the 6th section of the Prospectus.

It will now be the duty, and in fact it ought to be, the object of every *Wine Farmer*, to wrest from this victor the palm of triumph, by strongly and earnestly contending against him at the next ensuing competition.

Nobody can fairly excuse himself from entering into the field of competition hereafter, because they will have sufficient time to prepare themselves for the battle, by the notice which they now receive, that a year hence the *Cape* will be again competed for.

We frankly admit that we do not care whether Mr. Vos, or Mr. Somebody else obtains the Prize *Cup*; but we particularly anticipate with great concern the improvement of these articles, which will be effected by the encouragement thus held out, and the competition arising in consequence, among the *Wine-growers*.

Indeed, if ever there was a time we should be seriously intent upon carrying out the proposed object, it has now arrived. We find from a late English paper, the *Colonial Gazette* of the 8th June, that, in reply to Mr. LABOUCHERE, on Wednesday the 1st of June, —

"Sir ROBERT PERL stated that Ministers had received information that the French Government have the power to raise their import-duties by ordinance, and the Minister of Commerce had implied that such was the intention with respect to Linens and Linen-yarns—

"He could assure the right honourable gentleman that the British Government did not allow a post to leave the country without forwarding a communication on the subject to the French Government, and expressing the deep regret that had been felt on learning the course that it was intended to pursue.

This dispatch stated what material effect such a proceeding must have on the commercial negotiation between this country and France, which had proceeded so far. He could not help stating that there existed a strong feeling in several parts of France, and especially in the South of France, against the policy of such a proceeding. That portion of that country was most anxious for the favourable termination of the commercial negotiation which had been carried on so long. If this step, however, should unhappily be adopted, it would become the duty of the Government to open communications with other countries of Europe which produced wine, to see whether commercial relations on more favourable terms could not be established.

He hoped, and from the best means of forming an opinion on the subject he believed it would be the case, that the *wine-growers* of France would make exertions to induce the French Government to abstain from taking the step alluded to.

"Lord JOHN RUSSELL concurred in the propriety of opening communications with other *wine-growing* countries, with a view to commercial relations."

If therefore the event should occur, that the French *Wines* are to be subjected to an increased duty, we ought to be prepared to enter into the market with our produce, but suited to the taste of the consumers, which can only be effected by improving our article.

Although we might perhaps feel convinced, that our *Wines* have flavor and body enough, yet if the purchaser in the market or the consumer, say they have not, it is our business to satisfy them, because they drink it, they purchase it, and they pay for it, and unless we do, what they want, we cannot complain when they won't drink, nor buy it, nor pay for it.

We hope the Committee lately appointed by the

Wine-growers at Stellenbosch, will not be asleep, but join in exciting amongst the *Wine Farmers* a proper consideration of our present situation and future prospects. We, on our part, will most readily open our columns for every information about *wine-growing* and *wine-making*, to which it may be thought worth while to call their attention, thus combining our joint energies to arrive at the desired end.

In our following we purpose giving a full detail of the proceedings.

THE "WATERLOO."

We have ascertained that of the 800 souls on board that vessel, the following were lost, viz:— 1 sergeant, 16 privates, 4 women and 13 children, 11 seamen and 8 boys, and 142 convicts; in all 188, so that only 114 have been saved, of which several are still in a lingering state. There are, we are told, about 70 convicts placed in the Town Prison, with a military guard of 12 men inside, to prevent their escape.

HINTS FOR COLONIAL WINE-GROWERS.

BY MR. R. CHAMBERS, M.A., &c.

The *Cape Wines* have been long noted for their general earthy taste and inferior flavour, which a few vintages ago improved much, but I am inclined to think that the *French champagne growers* has been lately attracted, finding the *sparkler-wines* to be of superior flavour to the others. Three causes seem to operate in producing this superiority:—firstly, the greater height of the smaller grapes above the soil causes them less liable to injury by blowing dust or rain soil whirlings, which generally injure more at the *Cape* than elsewhere, from the showers there being so heavy, the soil so light, and the wind so gusty; secondly, the sun has a greater distance to move before reaching the smaller fruit, by which it is more effectively purified from its grosser particles; thirdly, the *sparkler-wines*, when contrary to the direction of the prevailing wind, afford a better mutual protection against it than that afforded by the annual *stamp-shoots*. There seems, then, reason to believe, that by the universal adoption of *sparklers* in wise countries, an superior description of grapes and wine will be obtained; the superior taste and flavour of English hot-house grapes to those field-grown on the Continent being mainly referable to their *sparkler* growth; and their glass frame protection from harmful atmospheric influences.

Barley for green food is grown among the Sicilian vines; and from the luxuriance of both, they seem mutually to benefit each other; securing by this commingling all the advantages of crop-rotation, as has been already done with eminent success in England by the planting of wheat and turnips in alternate rows. Throughout the Mediterranean, a cotton crop is found to be a beneficial precursor of wheat and barley; but at Minto, *barley* (for green food) and cotton are now generally planted together; the former in small clumps, like the Sicilian.—*Col. Gazette*.

Governor.—Well Major, let us have no more recrimination; but let us get out of the present confusion of these land questions as quickly as possible; for I see plainly, if our revenue goes on improving, as it has done the last 9 months, that we shall be able to have funds for Emigration; and that the Hon. Masters, Bokkeveld, and others, will force it on me. One of the observations in Lord Stanley's despatch shows his mind on the subject:—

"If the administration of the finances of the Colony has been, throughout, really satisfactory, it is not surprising that you inform us from reminding your Excellency that you have had a surplus revenue before now, and a deficit existing in this year, you can only suppose, after due examination of the Colonial accounts, that the amount is yet to be credited to you. Clearly, the £6,000 would have enabled the Colony to receive 500 or 600 Emigrants."

This is pretty plain upon us. I hear, also, that a person coming to the Colony, who advertises that a carpenter and his wife, a maid and his wife, a man and his wife, might have a free passage to the Colony; and that nearly 200 persons applied for the berths. It is evident, therefore, the prejudice against the Cape is wearing away; and it is no use, I don't deny facts. What with the increase of our population, the increased value of our exports, it won't do; we shall have immigrants enough here by and by. Would that a few thousand of my distressed Scotch countrymen would come to the Cape. But Major, I forgot. I must return to the despatch received this morning respecting old scores. We must get rid of them at once. We can defer Emigration a little longer, till I am out of it.

Major.—Well, your Excellency, I am most desirous to attend to your wishes. Is anything more stated to be wrong?

Governor.—Why, yes, Major. Nor is it simply in the breast of Lord Stanley. We are, or your department cuts, but a sorry figure before the Land Commissioners and the public. That Ishmael, Smith O'Brien, is gradually making himself somebody in Parliament, particularly as regards the Cape and other Colonies. Now, we have to return respecting the *Land* and *Crown Lands*, and from our late book, formed from your surveys, they have made one management of the *Crown Lands* appear any thing but honorable to our talents and zeal for the public good of the Colony. They have sent me a complete extract of that which relates to the Cape. Here; first look at this slip.

Major.—(reading)

There is a discrepancy in these figures for 1840. They are, however, a true extract from the original returns sent up by the Cape Government.

Well, your Excellency, is there any thing the matter with that return?

Governor.—Why, Major, I am ashamed of you. Any thing the matter, indeed! Why, don't you observe those four asterisks?

Major.—Ay, to be sure I do, your Excellency; but I don't see any thing more. Two stars in one column *Creditor*, and two stars in the other column, *Debtor*. Ha! ha!

Governor.—Major, Prince of Hamburgh, this is treating it too lightly by far. You have made another clerical error, as you always designate those unaccountable gross blunders or mis-statements which they will no longer allow to pass unobserved.

Major.—Surely, Mr. Hope, the official who made the returns to Parliament, has not reflected on me as an official here. By saying there was "a discrepancy," I concluded he merely meant to say there was a larger quantity sold in 1840, than in 1841 or 1839.

Governor.—No Major, he says this, in effect, that you cannot have done much work in 1840, as you have represented, and ought to have done. Your original statement, from which these printed returns are made to Parliament, is that you surveyed 83,000 acres and that the price was 3s. 2d.; the price was much more than that in many cases, I perfectly recall, and by my calculation, made just before you came in, that amounts to 18,588. 18s. 6d., just double what the Cape Treasury was credited.

Major.—Gracious goodness! your Excellency need not go into such particulars! I could not, for the life of me. It is not liberal on the part of a great national Government to be paying. Ha! ha! That is Mr. Smith O'Brien!

Governor.—Unfortunately, he is on the other side of the water.

Major.—It is an ugly circumstance for us.

Governor.—It is, for your department.

Major.—Not exclusively for my department; there are many fees, it is true, and they have been cut down too much already; and there are other persons' fees and there was a fine of some little amount you will reflect.

Governor.—I recollect what do you mean?

Major.—Why your Excellency will recollect last Shrove Tuesday, which I recollect very well by the pancakes.

PUBLIC DISTRESS AND STATE OF TRADE.

MANCHESTER, June 7.—The market to-day has been gloomy, no doubt caused, in some degree, by the news from India, the commercial state of which is by no means favorable. All kinds of goods went off heavily, and in many instances at reduced prices. The flatness was more than ordinarily felt, and no prospect of immediate improvement presented itself. The complaints throughout the district are most lamentable. The number of unemployed hands is increasing daily, and fearful symptoms of commotion are indicated in various parts of the country. I am sorry to report three failures to-day in the Manchester trade, altogether amounting to a heavy sum. These events have added to the depression.

The Corn-law League met to-day, and was occupied with business of high national interest.—*Morning Advertiser*, June 9.
