That the communication was false, and that Mr. THALWITZER was not justified nor warranted in telling such a story, has been proved by his own evidence. During his examination he denied ever having said, that the whole company had refused to honor the toast;—he first swore positively that the whole company rose to honor the toast, except two or three officers;—then again: that all the Cape Gentlemen rose;—then again: that that one Mr. Advocate HIDDINGH, and finally: that he himself had not seen it.—(N.B. Mr. HIDDINGH was at that time setting opposite to him)—but had heard it from Mr. HORN, who by-the-by had left long before the toast was given.

Such was the evidence of the originator of the most false and slanderous report ever invented; and the communication made by him to Mr. EULERT is more astounding, when it is known, that Mr. REBELINGHUIS and Mr. WÖPKE, had left the table before the toast in question was given, and consequently could not have risen with Mr. THALWITZER, to do homage to the proposed health of Her Majesty.

In a future number, we will endeavour to give the whole trial; and we take the present opportunity to set the dinner-company right with their fellow Colonists, and to clear them from the most diabolical charge of disloyalty and anti-British feeling;—which, if true, would justly have excited an indignant feeling against every one of those who either shared in such unbecoming and outrageous conduct, or by their silence countenanced it.

Fortunately this has been most fully proved, not to have been the case; not only by the members of the dinner, but also by Mr. M. VAN REENEN, a gentleman, who had nothing to do with it, and who casually entered the place, at the very moment when the toast was proposed and drunk.

On the appearance of the libellous article in the Mail, four different actions were brought against the Mail, not with a view of "bleeding" its Editor and publisher, but only to obtain a full and open inquiry before the Justices of the land, into the conduct of the company. That having been obtained, and the Attorney General having justly observed to the Court, that it was not the damage or the money his client looked to,—the Court, by way of nominal damage, gave judgment for plaintiff, £20 damages and full costs.

THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN. CAPE TOWN, MARCH 3, 1843.

TRUTH has triumphed over the most unfounded and basest slander! The cases of the Hon'ble M. VAN BREDA, Member of the Legislative Council, and of W. F. HERTZOG, Esq., Assistant Surveyor General, against the Editor and Publisher of the Cape Town Mail, for libel, arising from a statement in that paper, of a dinner at which it was said that Her Majesty's health had been contemptuously refused to be drunk and properly honored, were tried during Tuesday and Wednesday; and after a close, minute and the fullest possible inquiry, the Supreme Court came to the unanimous conclusion, that the charge was entirely unfounded, and, said one of the Judges "that mind must be very prejudiced indeed, who leaves this Court Room with the least doubt, that any disrespect was shown to the proposed toast of Her Majesty."

It was proved, beyond a shadow of doubt, that the dinner, as we stated on a former occasion, was a mere private beefsteak collation, on the occasion of "the playing for the Silver Golf," by subscription of the Members of the Club only, and fixed upon, four days before the arrival of the Dutch Frigate the Palembang, in Simon's Bay; that during the play of the game, Mr. J. KLERCK, a Member of the Club, having introduced his Son, a native youth of this Colony, who was a Midshipman on board that vessel, and three other Midshipmen, who had come up to Town with him, they were requested to partake of the hospitality which that beefsteak collation offered; that after dinner one of the Officers calling upon Mr. KLERCK, was also introduced and offered a seat at the table; that the only toasts given by the Chairman, who happened on that occasion to be Mr. M. VAN BREDA, was the winner of the Silver Golf, and that several other toasts all of a private nature were given by the Members promiscuously; and that at a late hour, (when of the number of about 40 who sat at dinner, had diminished into the remaining number of 12 a 13, the others having left, some to play at billiard, s, some at cards, and others having gone home, amongst whom was M. VAN BREDA), Mr. THALWITZER having proposed to drink Her Majesty's health, it was cordially received and responded to, by the whole company rising and duly honoring it, with the exception of a single gentleman, an officer, who, although unable to rise, yet honored the toast by emptying his glass.

If this be true, how then has so unfounded a report become current? It is with regret we say, that we owe all the agitation which has excited our small community to no one else but to Mr. M. THALWITZER, the Hansatic Council, who,—it appears from the evidence of Mr. EULERT, a Bookkeeper in the Office of Messrs. DUNELL & STANBRIDGE,—thought fit, the next morning after the dinner, to tell that Gentleman that he had left the Company in disgust, because when he proposed to drink Her Majesty's health, the whole company had refused to drink it, and that with him only two Gentlemen, Mr. REBELINGHUIS and Mr. WÖPKE, chose to honor it.

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COLESBERG. We are glad to say that the ten men who deserted from the 27th Regiment at Colesberg, have all been re-taken. We mentioned that two have been secured before the troops had commenced their return march to Graham's Town; two others were re-taken at a subsequent period. The rest were followed into the country across the boundary by a party of 20 of the Cape Mounted Rifle Corps, under the command of Capt. Donovan, and were re-taken at a distance of eighty miles beyond the Orange River. We mention this with the more satisfaction, inasmuch as it seems to indicate a great relaxation of that spirit of resistance to British rule which has been lately exhibited in that direction. The fact that a small party of 20 men could penetrate, without molestation, to so great a distance from the colonial boundary—and that they were permitted to capture, and return to the Colony with so many prisoners of the character in question, and under the circumstances stated, is to our mind, good evidence that the government has only to act with promptness, decision, and justice, to restore tranquillity to that distracted country. Capt. Donovan is spoken of in terms of great praise for his great activity, determination, and address, in the execution of the duty in question. The six deserters were captured within 24 hours from the time of starting, the labor being so arduous that two of them died of fatigue, while another was left in the Orange country, completely knocked up. Capt. Donovan was accompanied by a number of Griquas, who seem to have acted as guides to the military party. On getting sight of their pursuers the run-a-ways made for an isolated conical hill and prepared to resist—but no sooner did the military present themselves than they came forward and surrendered. They declared the Griquas should never have taken them, and they had succeeded in nearly passing through their territory to within about two hours of the country occupied by the emigrant farmers under Mooké.

We have letters from Colesberg, the complexion of which, is very favorable. All is quiet, and the farmers are returning to their usual peaceful pursuits of agriculture, &c. Mooké, it is said, is quite disposed to submit, but fears to come into the Colony from a conviction that he committed himself at Memsie's Drift. It is said that he expresses himself in terms of thankfulness for the good advice given to him there by Mr. Justice Menzies, and regrets that he did not more strictly follow it. Now appears to be a most favorable time for settling the unpleasant differences which have hitherto existed in that quarter.—G. T. Journal, Feb. 23.

Nothing's Hof, 1st March 1843. It is now the third time that I address you on the subject of the Locusts. They have, since my last communication, increased their number by millions, and arrived at many places, not previously visited, and commit great devastation. They have not devoured one-third, but the half of my vintage, and that of other Wine Farmers in an equal degree, and that they can no longer destroy the grapes, they have turned to the leaves of the fruit trees, which are for the greater part bare. As soon as any young grass appears on the burnt lands, it is devoured by them; I have observed how they lay their eggs in the young grass, so that the young Locusts, on their coming out, may find subsistence. I am of opinion that they will even devour what grass there may be still left.

The Vineyards and Gardens in the village still suffer from these miscreants.

I am, J. H. NRETHLING, Senior. The following is from Langekloof, District of George, respecting the same subject:—Lang-kloof, 22d February 1843. "The Locusts have done great damage to the gardens, but at some places not much,—at some places the maize fields are, as it were, not damaged, at others totally destroyed. On the 16th instant an immense swarm arrived at my place of a smaller kind, and of a brownish and drab color. On their approach a noise was heard as of thunder at a distance, luckily a South Easter began to blow very strong, and drove them towards the North across the mountains. Till this day I have not heard, where they have been driven to, and at present not a single Locust is seen here,—however, we may now expect the scalled Voegangers or travelling Locusts. The Locusts have laid their eggs every where, and according to information, I have seen young Locusts follow the ploughing and sowing season. Here the chattering hand of the Lord is clearly visible, which, after so many admonitions from year to year, having remained unobeyed, has now come with double power."

MURDER IN FRANCE. (From Galvani's Messenger) The Court of Assizes of the Oise was engaged, on the 27th and 28th ult., with the trial of the widow Dupain for the murder of her husband, whose body was found in an oven on the 30th of June last at Compiègne, as was stated in the Messenger at the time. It appeared from the evidence that Dupain and his wife lived together on very bad terms, he accusing her of having improper connection with his son, and she upbraiding him with living with a girl named Dauroury. In the year 1835 he left his wife altogether, and took up his residence with the other woman, and about the same time sold his house, and kept the whole of the price to himself. This sale and the application of the money were an additional cause of difference between Dupain and his wife. In 1837 Dupain was engaged to do some mason work in the prison at Senlis, and was there exhorted by the chaplain so strongly to give up his evil course of life, that he determined to quit the woman, with whom he was cohabiting, and return to his family at Compiègne. He previously made a pilgrimage to Notre-Dame-de Liesse, and in 1837 he again entered the house where his wife was residing. Their differences continued, however, just as badly as before, and the neighbours frequently heard them quarrelling. A person named Brabant heard one night loud cries for help proceeding from Dupain's residence, and went down to the street, and was about to interfere when, considering that this might be only an ordinary quarrel, he thought it as well to leave the matter alone. From that night Dupain was seen no more, and none of his neighbours could say what had become of him. His wife gave different accounts of his absence, at one time saying that he was living at Senlis, at another that she knew nothing about him. In 1840 she appeared before a notary to signify her consent to the marriage of her son, and then assumed the quality of widow. On his remarking that the certificate of her husband's decease ought to be produced, she got an act drawn up, stating that he had disappeared in 1835. Eight days before the discovery of the body, she appeared to two witnesses that she had seen her husband, at Chappel-Senlis on her way to Paris. The discovery of the body was made as follows. A woman named Francœur, wishing to use the oven, which was common to the several inhabitants of the house, perceived a thick smoke to issue from the lower part. She informed the prisoner of the fact, adding that there was a strong smell of burnt linen, and with some difficulty persuaded her to have a mason sent for. The mason determined on opening the part below the oven, formerly used as a rabbit-hutch, and, on removing the mason-work and a quantity of stones piled up inside, was horrified at beholding a body, in a sitting posture fully clothed in a winter attire, the cravat alone being wanting. The body was in a complete state of mummification, and was immediately recognised as being that of Dupain. In the pocket of his jacket were a prayer book and a medal, arising probably from

his pilgrimage to Notre Dame de Liesse, three letters from the woman he lived with (dated 1837), and three notes on different matters. The question at once presented itself, how did the body get into this strange position? The prisoner tried to account for it in various ways. At one time she spoke of suicide, but it was observed to her, he had not an end to his existence, how did he get into the cavity? She then suggested that he might have descended by the chimney of the oven, and placed himself in the position in which he was found; but, on examination, it was discovered that there was no communication between the two. Another suggestion of hers was that he had built up the brick chimney from the interior, but it was found that not only had the mason-work been executed from the outside, but that she had herself employed a man, named Hautmann, in 1837, to stop up the opening. It was proved also that she had never left him during the time he was so employed, and had given him such to enable him to continue his work, a dreadful smell having proceeded from the hole. She had also, for some time afterwards, been in the habit of throwing filthy matters near the place, to lead persons to suppose that the offensive odour proceeded from them. The Jury, after three-quarters of an hour's deliberation, brought in a verdict of guilty of murder, without premeditation, and the Court sentenced the prisoner to hard labour for life at the galleys. On hearing this sentence, the wretched woman fell back insensibly, and the gendarmes were obliged to carry her out of Court.

SWIMMING SCHOOL. A letter from Berlin, August 3, has the following. Last week we were witnesses of a spectacle, of which there is scarcely an example in modern times, at least in Germany—a swimming manœuvre. This spectacle was given by the pupils of the Royal Swimming School of Berlin, in honour of the 25th anniversary of the establishment, which has served as a model to all good swimmers. At five o'clock, 1,900 swimmers, the most part belonging to the army, assembled in the barracks and of the infantry of the guard, and proceeded to bathe in the Spree, on the banks of the Spree, where they put on the costumes. At eight o'clock the following procession was seen to swim forward, and pass before the view of more than 40,000 spectators. First came a large flat boat metamorphosed into a large harbour, in which were four bands, who executed morsels of military music,—then, a car in the shape of a shell, in which was seated Neptune with his hair and beard of red, and armed with his trident. This car was drawn by six dolphins, and surrounded by a band of Nereids and Tritons, the latter playing the trumpet and clashing cymbals.—A numerous troop of Indian musicians, bearing on their heads brilliant plumes, adorned with collars and bracelets of coral, and bearing clubs—Scotchmen, Norwegian, Spanish, Italian, and Russians in their national costumes—Baboons, seated on a gigantic cask, crowned with vine-leaves and ivy, brandishing in the air his thyrus, with which he directed the grotesque evolutions of a hundred bacchants, who sported round his throne—the King of the Frogs, represented by a gigantic frog, seated on a car of reeds, and followed by a train of others of the same species, though less in bulk,—and, last of all, two hundred sailors, singing national songs. The immense crowd who were drawn together by this strange spectacle, moved about on the banks of the Spree in carriages, on horseback, or on foot, or sailed about in small boats adorned with garlands of flowers.—Scotsman.
