THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

CAPE TOWN, MARCH 24, 1843.

In the Legislative Council on Monday last, His Excellency the Governor communicated to the Board, a despatch from the Secretary of State, conveying the dissent of Her Majesty's Government of the Ordinance No. 4, 1842, and advising the Governor to introduce an Ordinance for the repeal thereof.

Our readers will remember that a question was raised in 1841 between His Excellency the Governor and the Municipality of Cape Town, by which the former maintained that certain public properties, belonging to the Colonial Government, should be exempt from the Municipal Assessment for the purpose of a general rate, and also from a water-rate.

A long correspondence ensued; when at last the Governor introduced a Bill in the Legislative Council, for the purpose of such exemption. It was opposed by a Petition of the Boards of Commissioners and Wardmasters, and when brought to the vote, it was also voted against by all the 5 Unofficial Members, against the 5 Official Members, who voted in its favor, and carried by the casting vote of His Excellency the Governor, sanctioned by him, and published as an Ordinance.

The Boards of Commissioners and Wardmasters adopted, and transmitted through the Governor to the Secretary of State, a strong Petition, praying Her Majesty's Government to disallow the said Ordinance. The Petition, containing the merits of the case at full length, will be found in our paper of the 6th of May 1842.

That our representations were not vainly made, is proved by the decision to which Her Majesty's Government has arrived. Why the Secretary of State did not adopt the more simple and usual mode on such occasions, of at once disallowing the Ordinance, instead of recommending the Governor here to repeal it, we are not able to divine. There may, however, exist a sound reason for so doing. The Secretary of State may have thought that a disallowance at once might inconvenience the Government of this place, or have wished to leave the question of repeal to the Governor himself and the Colonial Legislature.

Be it however as it may, with the form we have no concern. The public however have reason to rejoice at the decision to which the Government at Home has arrived, as it will remove the erroneous impression, which still exists with some, that it is needless to send remonstrances and petitions Home, for that they will not be attended to. The days have passed by, and are now merely matter of Record, when our remonstrances and Petitions, if ever brought under the notice of the proper person, obtained a safe deposit on the shelves in the Colonial Department, and were never again heard of.

With the present proof before us, that our remonstrances will obtain a full hearing and due consideration, before Her Majesty's Government at Home, we hope both the public and the Unofficial Members of the Legislative Council, will on every occasion, when a representation becomes necessary, not consider they have done enough by merely protesting, or noting dissent upon record, but will follow it up, by Petitions and remonstrances, transmitting them to Her Majesty's Secretary of State.

Another instance of a similar satisfactory manner, in which the applications of the inhabitants of this Colony are attended to at Home, we record, in the answer of Her Majesty's Secretary of State to the Memorial of the Municipality of Cape Town, and the Colonists at large, to their Petition, not to execute or sanction the measure of introduction into this Colony, of Juvenile Delinquents.

Simultaneous with the withdrawal of those measures; the Bill, recently introduced into the Legislative Council, for the formation of a Hard Road through the Cape Flats, has also been withdrawn by the Attorney General, in the Council on Monday last, with the view of introducing another Bill. It is said, that whilst amongst the public there is a division of opinion, in respect of the question of a Hard Road, and of the rate to be levied for the purpose, an equal division of opinion exists amongst the Honorable, the self-defending Members of the Legislative Council, who feel ashamed of their countrymen, because they prefer light to darkness, about what?—The line of the Road!

We have however much more to say on the subject than our present limits will allow.

On Monday the 27th instant, at 10 o'clock precisely, a joint Meeting of Commissioners and Wardmasters will be held, for the purpose of "assessing the House and Water-rate" upon the immovable properties, within the Municipality, for the current year. We trust that every Wardmaster will consider it imperative duty to attend a Meeting, which has for its object the fixing of the rate, to be levied upon the Householders and themselves.

RIVERS DALE.

20th March 1843. Yesterday was a joyful day for the Inhabitants of this place, and for the members in general of the Church in this Parish. The Rev. Mr. Borchers was installed in his office as Minister of the Congregation, in presence of a numerous and evidently delighted audience. The services on this

interesting occasion were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Robertson, of Swellendam, our former Pastor, who on Saturday Evening, presided on the necessity of the influence of the Divine Spirit to render the preaching of the gospel effectual, from 1 Cor. 3 v. 7; and on Sunday Morning, on the chief subject of gospel preaching from 2 Cor. 6 v. 20. In the afternoon our new Minister preached from Psalm 73 v. 23-25; and, after shortly referring to the subject as applicable to the Psalmist, and in a certain degree to himself, he proceeded to point out the mutual obligations and duties of ministers and people, commending himself to the prayers of his people, and their cordial co-operation in promoting the grand object of his ministry. Every one seemed pleased and delighted with the spirit of humility and christian affection manifested by our new Pastor; and many, we believe, and sincere were the prayers which were offered up to the Almighty that He may be pleased to give "the increase" upon the seed of the Divine Word, which our new Pastor may sow among us.

The interest of this occasion was not a little heightened by the presence of Lieut. Col. Dickson, our new Civil Commissioner, who paid us his first visit in company with the Rev. Dr. Robertson and Joseph Barry, Esq. of Swellendam. The Commissioner was attended along the road by the Field-cornets, through whose divisions he passed, and was received, on entering the Village of Rivers Dale, with the sounding of a bugle and the firing of a salute. Every one seemed much pleased with the urbanity of his manner, and his evident desire to promote the public welfare; and during his short stay an address was presented to him, signed by the Minister and Members of Consistory, and a number besides of the principal Inhabitants, expressing their gratification on the occasion of his first visit to Rivers Dale, and praying that he would recommend to the Government the propriety and necessity of appointing a Justice of the Peace to this rising Village, and to allow him a look-up-house and some Policemen.

The Civil Commissioner, in reply, stated, that he felt convinced of the necessity of a Justice of the Peace in such a rising village and populous neighbourhood; and that he would not fail to recommend the matter in the strongest terms to His Excellency the Governor. (From a Correspondent.)

TO THE EDITOR OF "DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN."

THE COMET.

SIR,—As "one of your readers" attaches "some belief" to the statements of the Penny Cyclopaedia he may be induced to think less dispassionately of my haphazard proposition of the effects which might have been produced on the Earth, had it come within the focus of the tail of the Comet when he reads the following passages from that work.

"The nucleus of Comets (so far as observed) have varied from 3 to 3,000 miles, the length of their tails from nothing up to more than one hundred millions of miles; now any person who has seen, so as I have, a table cloth set on fire by the transmission of the sun's rays through a decanter full of water, may be excused for presuming on the possibility of the effects mentioned (as a joke) in my last taking part in some evening at the regularity of such magnitude intervening at the regular distance between the Sun and Earth."

Although the Editor of the Commercial Advertiser has his head generally so much above the clouds, that he sees most of the transactions on Earth through a false medium (for which reason I have for several years past declined reading his paper), I do not consider him any authority, even in matters relating to the stars, and believe the virtuous of his proteges, "the coloured races," or the inequities practised against them by the "Dutch Boers," might more easily be compressed into the space mentioned, than any one of the Comets. I supposed this to be Encke's Comet, from having recollected that it either appeared, or was expected, in Nov. 1822, but that its return was calculated at from 3 1/2 to 3 1/3 years, but "I am no Astronomer," and thus liable to wander among the ways of heaven. But what more particularly led me to remark on the negligence of the Astronomer Royal, in not having given notice of this Comet in its approach was the idea, that the appearance of such a phenomenon ought to be made known as speedily and widely as possible in order that others might be guided and assisted by dates and situation on making their observations and calculations thereon.

Colesberg, March 13th, 1843. Sir,—I entreat you will allow the insertion of the underwritten letter in the columns of your paper:—

To the Rev. PATER WILSON, Missionary at Philippolis. Colesberg, March 13th, 1843.

Reverend Sir,—In the Graham's Town Journal of the 2d March, I observe a letter signed by you, addressed to the Editor of that paper, and in which you take upon yourself gratuitously to dictate to that gentleman, "that he ought not to presume upon the truth of certain statements advanced by me against the people of Philippolis," and that in the end, you will not be surprised if the Boers for a second time come off second best.

To this the Editor very properly responded. Considering that this letter also calls for a reply from the individual, whose truth you have endeavoured to impugn, I must take the liberty to intrude upon your attention for a few moments. If you can show me that in advocating the cause of my unfortunate countrymen, the "Emigrant Boers" (where they adopt a constitutional mode of procedure, as they have now done in the present instance the Griekwa question), I have been misled into what the lawyers denominate "a bad case," I will at all times be most happy to acknowledge my error; but at present you cannot expect that your simple denial, even had it been supported by Hendrik Hendriks himself, would outweigh the certificates you allude to, they being, with one exception, all signed by respectable men, who are ready to substantiate what they have asserted by oath, and evidence of other parties, more especially as they are now backed by more damning testimony, and which I trust, will be made public, although, as the Editor of the "Graham's Town Journal" justly observes, it contains a very distasteful subject.

I am extremely glad, that you have now publicly (as you have hitherto privately) taken the part of the Bastards, (I will not allow them their assumed term Griekwa) versus the Boers. I am also willing to stand forth as the champion of the Boers, and break a lance with you in a courtly controversy, in other words to enter into pleading with you. All I require, is "a fair field" let the whole matter be placed before the public in its true light, and I will abide by its verdict; and should it go against my cause, the worst that can be said is, that I had found erroneous opinions. Self-interest cannot be attributed to me, and I will rest satisfied, that my motives were conscientious.

Your observations that "you would not be surprised that the Boers would again come off second best," is incorrect in its present—premature in its future sense, and calls for present remark—incorrect if you allude, as I presume you do, to the first meeting held at Colesberg between his honor the Lt. Governor and Adam Kock (who by the bye cannot be recognized as Chief of the Bastards) with some of his people and at which you acted as interpreter.

That meeting was held for the purpose of affording the Bastards an opportunity to prefer their charges against the Emigrant Boers; but this not being known to the latter, they could not be present to refute what was advanced against them;—hence, not being present, how could they "come off second best?" Should you however intend that the colonial Boers who were present, came off second best; I will allow that the willful misrepresentations made to his honor, and the still more misinterpretations of his honor's sentiments and declarations may have deceived you in your error.

Well acquainted as I am with the existing difference between the Bastards and Boers, and its causes and effects, I will willingly take on the side of the Bastards, there has been some representations and reports, and I ask you "what is the small amount of fact likely to survive, as a settling or final settlement, from all that huge turbid of turbid fiction, which your party has caused to be suspended through the public journals? If you have no reply, I will answer for you: if the whole matter is brought clear to the light of day—Nothing!—If, however, willful misrepresentation is allowed to prevail, I fear what I dare not express.

THE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

Eleventh Annual Report of the Committee of the Cape of Good Hope Agricultural Society to the Members.

Your Committee have the honor to report, that on their being called to the Annual General Meeting in March 1842, they considered their first duty to carry into effect the several Resolutions adopted at that meeting; they have consequently proceeded to deliver to the agents of Mr. William Dickson, at this place, the £50 Wool Prize Cup, he having been declared to be the successful competitor for the Wool Cup, and complied with the regulations and terms as fixed by this Society.

A subscription was also raised by your Committee for a second Wool Prize Cup of £25, to be competed for yearly under the same terms as the £50 Wool Prize Cup, by young Settlers, who shall have been Woolgrowers for less than five years (which term was, however, by a Resolution of this Society, in their Special General Meeting of the 1st Sept. 1842, extended to ten years); and from the list now before this meeting, it will appear that the amount subscribed is £9 10.

Your Committee have also opened a subscription for a third prize, to be awarded to the second best sample competing for the £50 Wool Prize Cup, which list now amounts to a sum of £2 subscribed for. And it will now be for this meeting to decide in what said second prize shall consist, and what shall be its value, in terms of a Resolution passed at the General Meeting of the 19th March 1842.

Your Committee's attention was next directed to the prices for the best samples of Cape wine and Cape spirits, in compliance with the Resolutions of this Society, in their meeting of November 1842; they have consequently offered a Prize Cup, value £25, for the best sample of Cape wine, and a Prize Cup, value £25, for the best sample of Cape spirit, all in the terms of your said Resolutions, offered to the Cape Winegrowers.

The amount however subscribed for these two cups amount only to £23 10, so that your Committee reserved all to the subscription list from the funds of the Society the sum of sixteen pounds and ten shillings sterling.

Five samples of wine, and only one of Cape spirit were hereupon received by your Committee, who appointed seven gentlemen, being all wise merchants of this Town, to be judges thereof. These gentlemen laid their report before the general meeting of this Society held on the 1st September, 1842, when Mr. Nicolaas Gerhardus Vos, of Klipmuts, in the District of Stellenbosch, was declared by that meeting as the successful competitor for the wine prize cup, now ordered from home, whilst one sample of Cape spirit only having been received, no award has been made for the Cape Spirit Cup.

Your Committee think it right here to observe that they consider the sending of so few samples for these two cups must be attributed to the lateness of the time when the prizes were offered, the pressing season having then passed and your Committee are fully impressed that this year's competition will be marked by a very great number of competitors.

In connection with the encouragement given to the so much depressed state of the wine trade by the offer of these prizes, your Committee has the satisfaction to state, that they have received from one of their members S. V. van Renssen, Esquire, of High Constance, on the cultivation of vineyards and orchards by an improved and less expensive mode than hitherto adopted, which observations will ere long be published for the guidance and information of those who may feel inclined to make a trial of that new mode of cultivation.

Your Committee have further to state their gratification in observing that the Wool growth is almost daily adding to the number of Woolgrowers in this Colony; so that many of those Farmers, who were formerly so partial to the breed of the Cape or Broad-tailed Sheep, are now gradually, as they are called to value their own interest, laying aside their prejudice, and have but too long existed against the breed of the Merino Sheep.

The increase in the last years in the exportation of this our staple produce has been beyond expectation, and shows to what enormous extent this may be carried to in a few years. The exports in 1841 was 1,016,807 lbs. and in 1842, 1,428,793 lbs., showing an increase of 411,986 lbs. in 1842, more than in 1841.

It is moreover satisfactory to observe that whilst the quantity of Wool has so considerably increased the attention for the improvement of the same has not been overlooked;—the favorable impression hence created in the London Market during the past year on behalf of this important article of Colonial Produce.

Your Committee have appointed two Members from their board to receive and weigh the Samples sent for competition, so as to prevent any mistake or difference which might otherwise occur, and they have further requested and appointed seven competent gentlemen to be the judges of these Samples and to report thereon to this meeting.

Your Committee beg also to draw the attention of this Society to the importance of encouraging competition in almost all articles of produce, in as far as at least as will be found practicable, and the means of this Society allow. For it is by this means that a stimulus is exerted for improvement, particularly in this age of competition.

Your Committee would recommend this Society at least to commence this year with an encouragement for the show of cattle and other produce of a general and daily demand, and your Committee need only refer to the result of the late exhibitions at the last general meeting of the Swellendam Agricultural Society which will follow such encouragement.

Whilst on this subject your Committee beg to express to your commiseration, that they have lately received from one of their Members Andrew Steelman, Esq., a Sample of Raw Silk, the product of this Colony, which they have also used to be laid before this Meeting. And your Committee considering the large field open in the Colony for the Silk Worm, cannot but strongly recommend to this Meeting the adoption of some Resolution by which the cultivation of this valuable article may be encouraged.

Your Committee beg to report to this Society their conviction of the great benefit this Colony will derive from the cultivation of sugar, and therefore suggest that a premium be offered for the best sample of raw sugar made from grape in a quantity of not less than 100 lbs., the sample to be delivered to the Society on or before a certain day to be fixed by this meeting together with a statement of the particulars of the mode of manufacturing of Sugar and the expense connected therewith.

It is a pleasing duty your Committee has further to discharge, to inform this Meeting that they have, at the suggestion of the Swellendam Agricultural Society opened a correspondence with that Society chiefly for the purpose of reciprocal communications of their proceedings, which communication will be made quarterly.

Your Committee embrace this opportunity to submit to this meeting a Resolution empowering the Committee of this Society for the time being, to appoint corresponding members of this Society as they may reside within or without the Colony, by which your Committee are of opinion the interests of this Society will be greatly improved. Your Committee have been particularly induced to submit this Resolution, as they have during the last year been favored with communications from England, Australia, and Ceylon, which convince them of the usefulness of making the connection of this Society with other places as often as possible.

Your Committee have lately received a letter of the Vice Consul of France, Mr. F. de Lettre, with a subscription list, requesting the aid of this Society for promoting Universal Cultivation and Colonization in Africa by Agricultural Commerce, &c. &c. upon which your Committee have inquired of the Vice Consul of France, that this Society extremely regret that their funds do not admit of their contributing any thing for foreign institutions, the Society being still in their infancy.

Before closing this Report, your Committee beg to bring to the knowledge of this Society, that the all important subject of Emigration from the Mother Country having occupied their attention, they have lately addressed a Memorial to His Excellency the Governor, requesting that His Excellency may be pleased to make such representation to the Home Government as may lead for the encouragement and introduction into this Colony of Juvenile Emigrants of good character, as a Government measure, on the same principles as those, that have been imported here by the late Children's Friends' Society, in addition to which your Committee beg to state, that they have received a communication from Mr. W. N. Frushard, of Buitantank, Cape Town, who is also greatly promoting the subject.
