CAPE TOWN, DECEMBER 19, 1850.

We have learnt, upon the authority of private letters received per last arrivals from England, that a considerable rise had taken place in the price of Cape wine. This intelligence may perhaps have a tendency to encourage our wine growers to hope for the return of better times.

Wine formerly formed a principal article of export to the English market. The causes which have contributed to the decay of this important branch of commerce have been various, but chief of all has been the fact that a bad article was exported by the merchant, and thus Cape wine, which had formerly attained a high character, fell into disrepute.

That this would not have been the case, and that Cape wine generally would have retained its position in the London market, is apparent from the fact that a really good article is ever in demand.

Let our merchants but apply themselves to the improvement of good and properly prepared wine, & the result must prove advantageous both to themselves and the colony.

Several articles have occasionally appeared in these columns, suggesting various modes to the wine growers to improve the quality of their produce. Some treatises on the same subject have also been disseminated by the Agricultural Society as well as individuals, with the laudable desire to advance the welfare of the colony. These suggestions were soon followed up by several wine growers, but we regret to say that their efforts were as speedily blighted by the fact that they could obtain no increase of price from the merchants, so as to cover the additional expense incurred in producing a superior article.

We trust we may not be wrong in again urging upon our wine growers the necessity of renewed exertions on their part. The wine-making season is approaching, and it will be worth their while to ponder upon the subject.

The Observer states that Sir Andries Stockenstrom reached Graaf Reinet on the 5th instant, and was received with the usual kindness of the inhabitants.

By the last frontier post we learn that his Excellency the Governor reached East London on Monday morning the 9th instant, and proceeded from thence the same day to King William's Town. In a notice, published the same day, his Excellency informs the people that he would institute a searching investigation into the causes of the present excitement, with a view to the punishment of the guilty authors thereof. On the following day a Proclamation was issued, calling upon the frontier inhabitants to enrol themselves for their own protection when the troops shall advance, for says his Excellency, "the present crisis of affairs demands very summary procedure on my part when a full and just cause is elucidated and substantiated."

In consequence of the above Proclamation the inhabitants of East London, Fort Beaufort, Graham's Town, Uitenhage, &c., have commenced to enrol themselves, and to select their own officers.

His Excellency was concentrating his forces near the Amatola mountains, the stronghold of the insurrectionary chiefs. The C. M. Rifles had marched out of Graham's Town en route for Fort Hare, whither Col. Somers' was to proceed to prepare for the reception of the Governor.

The latest intelligence communicated by the G. T. Journal, on the authority of a correspondent, upon whose veracity it places great reliance, is to the following effect:—

"I am not forced to move, intend to await the order to march off."

"It is really distressing to witness the trekking of the farmers, their wagons crammed to the very top, men and children, the paralysed and the sick, doubled in a way which follows the stock over-driven, famished flocks and sheep as many as 40 at a time are met on the roadside, abandoned to the wolf and the vulture, which have been the curse and gain of their rearer. At another spot your eye meets a miserable vehicle with no cover, an old board to serve as sides—this filled with women, children, and lame, and ready to break at every turn. Ask them here what you are going to? and they will answer—we know not; we follow the track of the others! At another abandoned farm you will find breakfast served on the table, and a man goes to eat it the inmates having died. At another, you will hear of a poor woman just laid in, being bundled in a wagon, and the inmates having died. At another, you will hear of a

"Zyne Excellente de Gouverneur seide onlangs daan de buren, en wel in sterk bewoording dat er geen gevaren was—dat sy hunne planten niet moesten verlaten—geene voor een Kafferoorlog—en dan wanneer iets ernstigs gebeurde, wy op hem moesten vertrouwen, en dat de Civile Commissaris daarvan by tyds zonde kennis geven! Alle vertrouwen echter is verloren; en ik gelooft inderdaad dat ik de eerstige uitzondering ben, en wanneer ik alzo nu zoa gaakt word om te verbuzen, sal ik het breng afwachten om afmarcheren.

Het is inderdaad aandoenlyk, om het trekkens der buren te lenen, de wagena tot aan des top gevuld, rvsseerende, haderende, de lavame en sieke, so veel ry kunnen is ekander, dan volgt het vee, overvrefen, vrhongende, ammeren, schapen en hokken tot 40 toe, ziektem langs des weg, auwelen en roofooghs overgelaten, welke tot vordsel en voordiel van die lakked hadden moeten dienen. Op een anderplaats niet een ellend voorval; sonder leent en oule planken tot zyntuken—deszelfs met vrouw en kinderen en goederen, dirigende om alle orgenblieken te breken. Vraagt men waarheen?—het antwoord is my weten huij, wijs volgt, het spoor van de ander. Op oene en re verlaten plaats vindt men het ontblyt op die self gedec. maar niemand tot te eten dan daar in de woning geslukt zyn.—Op eene terplaats moet men van eene vrouwe pas bevallen, in een wagon geplukt, en weg.

"In een behoorlyk deel der olande der trekkers niet hierby blijft, vanner sy in het Distrik Somerset komen, staan de ingezetenen, welke zy ontmoeten zullen, met stokken en swepen aan den dammen, geroid om de kudden weg te dreyven; en aangeen—wy hebben geen water voor onze kudden, gy moet uw wegs gaan. Is dit niet hartverscheurend, in den volsten din den words? Het lyden en verlies der trekkers moeten boren berekening zyn.

"Wanneer ik di maal moet verbuizen (en er bestaat alle voormitig dat ik daartoe zal genozaakt word) dan zal het derde maal binnen 15 jaren zyn. Ik heb heel vorige met myn gezin en groot verlies geleiden, en dat de tweede gelegenheid, in 1835 en 1840, niet goed leveren, en dan van myn gezin, waren dijkelyk gevarieerd. Ich heb de lyken getoen van myn vermoerde vriend—noz die zy de verantlike van den laekker waren. Ze die tot den bedelaat geraakt sijn, waren niets. Nab y my heb ik een broder en een neef, van den werd de armen gebroken door een Kaffer-kogel, toen hy in 1846 met hen handgemeen was, en de andere heeft een arm verloren in 1835; en een verloot een kromme kort-arm,—en de andere een hand en de helft van syn arm. Dit alles niet achtende, en daar wye een anderen Gouverneur stonden te krygen, rekende ik op eene verandering ten beste in onz Kaffer-betrekkingen—dus, vattet' it modo, bouwde een goed huis op de oude ruinen en verbederte het land met goede goedingen; en door vele vooruitgaende ben ik nu omringd! Is antwoord, niets anders dan, wanneer die gekoesterde vrees bewaardhoudt.

"Wanneer ik dit alles heb ik zoa even verlossen, dat onse barbaren is het regt, dat het leveren en de godervaren van H. M. loyale onderdaanen voorvalt om prooi moeten bliven der woechte Kaffers! Neen, niemand sal dat bewearan. Wanneer het niet regt is, dan met het kwad verholpen word, en dat kan alleen geschieden door kenneleyke straf van de oproerige opp-roofhoeden en hunne oproerige aanhangers. Niets minder zal ons bevedigen!—dit moeten verantwoord word. Dit is zeer bevreidend, en geeft een schijn van waarheid aan Moroko's oproegen, hetgeen zeer aangenaam is. HOLLAND.

Het Nederlandsch Gouvernement heeft in goeden ernst deszelfs tarief op nieuw veranderd. Een nieuw stelsel door de Kamer van de Staten-Generaal aangenomen, wordt thans aan de wereld opengelegd: en het is waarschynlyk dat weldra een besluit zal worden genomen, den tyd bepalende, wanneer dese zyn in werking zal komen. De volgende zyn deszelfs hoofdvoorzieningen welke' men beschouwen mag, als de eerste vruchten van een toekomenden oogst, welke zich tot alle volken zal uitstrekken:—

1. Onvoorwaardelyke herroeping van byzondere gunsten aan de Hollandsche vlag verleend, door afschaffing van de reglementen, welke aan deze vlag de voorkeur gegeven vreemde vlaggen,

2. Voorwaardelyke gelijkheid van vlag in de scheepvaart van en naar de Nederlandsche koloniën,

3. Stipulatien door de wet, betreklyk den handel en de scheepvaart in de koloniën en de bezittingen van de Kroon in andere deelen der wereld.

4. Herroeping van het interdict om Nederlandse cheques te geven aan buitenlandsch gebouwde vaartuigen, door zuilke vaartuigen toestellen tegen een impost van 4 p.c., van dezelve waarde voor de registratie.

5. Het verminderen van invoer regten op hoofdmateriëlen voor scheepvaart.

6. Staking van de invoer regten op den Rhyn en Yssel.

7. Algemeene afschaffing van transit regten.—*British Banner*, 18 Sept.

TRANS-VAAL AFFAIRS.

Vaal River, Oct. 25th, 1850.

To the Editor: Sir—I will now give you the latest news from beyond the Vaal River; you must not though imagine, that this is to be got at without difficulty. When you converse with a farmer you have to listen to an interminable yarn of matter, "weary, stale, flat, and unprofitable," as well as uninteresting; but no matter it must be heard, though you may not feel the slightest interest in the curvature of a *zwart bonte's* horn, or the disposition of the colors upon a *zwart witte's* pens, a roode bonte, or an unfortunate *geel bek* with a *stomp staartje*; yet all this added to the price of coffee, &c. &c., has to be endured before a particle of intelligence can be obtained, and should you be hasty about it you get just nothing. However we are not entirely destitute of the means of gaining the little information, that has leaked through the closed and guarded doors of the *Raad Huus*. Among other things, we understand that a letter was actually received from Snellekamp, and that the young Hollander after having been ejected from the assembly, was called in, and begged to read and explain it to them. Pretorius was more unanimously elected than we had been informed previously. One thing you may depend upon, and that is that they have decided that no person being a British Subject, or a Resident within the Sovereignty, shall be capable of holding land within the limits of the Republic, any person holding land, must trek over the Vaal and reside on it, or sell it immediately for what he can get. It is said that they have not confiscated Mc'Cabe's property, but that his case was brought before the Haad, his letter to the "Frontier Times" read before them, and the sentence of the Landdrost confirmed. I hear that William Jacobs has intrusted his person to the medical skill of the Doctor Vroum, on Rhenoster River, and the tender mercies and compassion of his countrymen on this side the Vaal. Old Hendrik Potgieter was sick, but had sent for, and obtained medical assistance from Natal. I bear that they have received an addition to their ordinance in the shape of a couple of cannon, from the Portuguese settlement at Delagoa; the person that told me spoke positively on the subject. The Portuguese Governor was at Oristad about 200 miles from Mooi River Dorp, and about 150 miles from Delagoa Bay. He has engaged Abezie, a Portuguese trader, as his interpreter. I have taken the latitude at Coqui's house, at the Vaal River drift about 20 miles from Mooi River dorps, and found it 26° 56' South. We have had for the last two days plentiful showers of rain.

AN ENGLISHMAN.

We published some time since a communication from the interior stating "that Potgieter had killed another chief, making the fifth whom he has destroyed,"—at that time we could not guarantee the correctness of the statement, but we now find from other sources that it is too true. The names of the tribes scattered by him last winter are the Baluine, and Bakloqua, residing north east from Zoutpans Berg. It is reported in the Natal papers that he has met with his death, but we hear he is still living, though from the nature of his complaints being dropsey we fear his days are not many. If these things that are brought to his charge are not proved by himself or friends to be falsehoods, he will leave behind him the name of a tyrant and a shredder of innocent blood.

The country is perfectly quiet. Matters between the British Resident and the chief Moshesh remain

precisely as they were. There is an altered feature in the case, in so far that Moroko's claim for 800 horses has become "small by degrees and beautifully less;" for on Mr. Allison, the Clerk of the British Resident, revising the lists a few days ago, at Thaba 'Nchu, 147 horses only were found to be the actual number missing. This is perfectly consistent with the truth of the original loss of 800. The Cape horse is a strange animal, and will make desperate efforts to return to the place where it was bred. In the present instance so many have made their escape from Moshesh, and Molitza's people, that 147 only now remain to be accounted for to Moroko. This is most satisfactory; and imports an air of truthfulness to Moroko's statements, that is really gratifying. There is however another feature in the business. The number of horned cattle said to have been originally stolen was 3,800, now the number demanded is about 4,000. This is to be accounted for by the list of owners having been made hurriedly, and closed before all the sufferers had come in from the outposts. Mr. Allison, we understand, at the request of the British Resident, has made a fresh list, and great care has been taken to verify its correctness.

We understand that Moshesh has replied to the letter of the Magistrate of Bloem Fontein enquiring into the steps, that had been taken with the view of bringing to justice the murderers of the Kafirs alluded to in our leading article. Moroko it is said, expresses his willingness to try the murderers by a council of their countrymen. We shall next week lay before our readers the state of the law, amongst the Borolongs, in respect to persons guilty of murder.

Original Correspondence.

Worcester, December 9, 1850.

SIR,—Is it the practice of the Attorney General, or more properly of the Clerks of the Peace of Cape Town and elsewhere, when any person comes to complain that he has been assaulted, to institute a civil action for damages, independent of the criminal prosecution? And has any such thing occurred in the late case of the Van Reenen's? Now, Sir, this system has been carried on here for a considerable time by the Clerk of the Peace, of which I shall give an instance which

is memorable, and possesses something of practical character. His recent exhibition at Cherbourg brought forth the following declaration which is not a little that is significant:—

The more I travel through France, the more I perceive that much is expected from the Government. I do not visit a department, a town, a hamlet, but the Mayors, the General Councils, and the very Bourgeois, demand of me new ways of communication, such as canals, railroads, the completion of the works which are begun, these some measures which may remedy the sufferings of agriculture, and give life to industry and trade.

Nothing more natural than the manifestation of these wishes; it does not strike, you may believe it, an inattentive ear; but I must tell you in my turn that those so-much-longed-for results will not be obtained unless you give the means of accomplishing them, and that this means lies entirely in your concentration in fortifying the power, and avoiding the danger of the future.

If France must needs, in the end, have a king, perhaps she cannot do better than give the crown to Louis Napoleon, or, if she chooses to remain a little longer under the government of a President, it may be doubted whether, upon the whole, she could advantageously replace the Prince. Much is said concerning his intentions, in due season, and when the ground is rightly prepared to make an attempt against the Constitution and the Assembly. As yet, however, he has done nothing, and he has not said much, however a lively and fanciful people, one malicious party spirit, may contrive to extract its own views from his deeds and his words.—*British Banner*.

Defendant put in the Medical Ordinance, No. 82—1830, now in force in this colony, by which he is entitled to command all articles of the Pharmacopeia Londinensis, and produce the Pharmacopeia.

The Clerk of the Peace and defendant made a few observations, whereupon the Magistrate remarked, that it was not proved in evidence that pure brandy was sold, and that bitters can be made without that ingredient, bitters which the clerk of the peace had failed to produce the article purchased from the defendant. Looking also to the evidence on the side of the defence, he fell into inquisition in acquitting the defendant.

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
