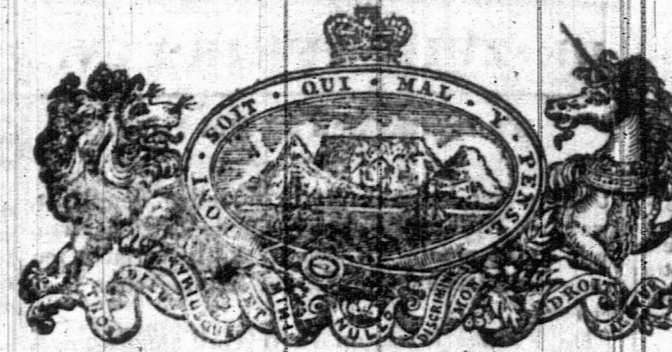

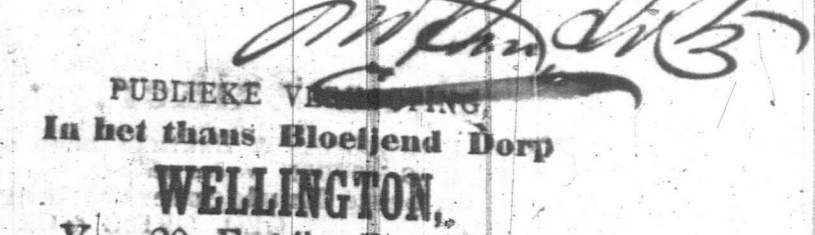

FRONTIER AFFAIRS.

(From the G. T. Journal Extra, May 11.)

FORT BEAUFORT.

At the appointed time, Monday, 24th instant, the mail steamer Bosphorus arrived in Table Bay.

The news which has come to hand is of a very interesting nature. Parliament was adjourned on the 6th to the 19th of April.

It will be seen with satisfaction that on Cape affairs all parties have spoken pretty freely. The brief report of Parliamentary proceedings relative to a money vote to cover the expenses of the present war, inserted elsewhere, will acquaint our readers with the views entertained on this all embracing subject.

The new Colonial Minister, Sir J. PAKINGTON, in the course of his speech declared, that since his assumption of office he had done everything to promote the consideration of the Constitution, and there can be no doubt, according to all the accounts received, that this gentleman is as anxious to return the Draft Ordinances—not as mutilated by the Council, but according to the expressed wish and desire of the Colonists—to this Colony with the least possible delay.

From the continent of Europe there is a scarcity of news. Except France, there is hardly a place furnishing anything worth notice. There, however, each day almost produces some remarkable event or other in the administration of the man who, as an elected ruler of the people, governs them like a despot, and whose every act furnishes the most convincing testimony that the existing Republic is a mere chimera, and will, on the first favorable occasion, be superseded by a form of government which LOUIS NAPOLEON himself has unhesitatingly declared he would assume should he fail to be supported in the maintenance of his present position.

Monday—The following is the report of Capt. Stubbs, of the Rangers, of the result of the patrol against the rebels at the Karra, already referred to. Capt. Stubbs, it will be remembered, was dangerously shot in the early part of the war, in an attack upon the rebels in the same locality, and narrowly escaped losing his arm, and it is gratifying to perceive that a health is now sufficiently restored to enable him again to take the field; upon this occasion he has performed a signal service, and taught the rebel band, who sought to occupy the old fort, that it is no longer a safe place of concealment.

Dr. TANCRED left Clanwilliam on the 22d inst, the field-cornet of Hardeveld having come to fetch him, whilst arrangements have been made to provide him with relays, &c., along the whole line, a distance of about 300 miles.

The object of the inhabitants of those wards is said to be the holding of public meetings for the redress of their grievances, and the adoption of all constitutional means to promote this object. It appears to be their intention to draw up memorials praying for the concession of the new Constitution in its original form, such as it was forwarded to this colony by our gracious Queen; and also another memorial praying that Mr. Secretary MONTAGU may be for ever removed from this colony, as having 1st public confidence.

MAY 14.—We are all alive and bustle here, since this Duke has become head quarters. A cavalcade of about thirty set, H. Hudson, Junr, Esq, arrived here on the afternoon of the 12th instant. Amongst the number were the Field Commandants W. Bourne, J. H. Delport, Piet Kruger, and Field Cornets Durst and Van Agter. The object of their visit was to have an interview with His Excellency, General Cathcart.

The interview took place this morning, Mr. L. H. Mearant of Olifant's Hook, who is also here, being the interpreter. The most interesting part of the interview was the discussion of the frontier question. The topics brought up were, the most important and knotty questions were discussed. His Excellency, in reply, informed the farmers that Sandhill, Macomo, and the whole of the Gaika tribes must be driven over the Keel, and that he intended immediately to establish a police on the frontier line.

It is expected, however, that out of this pay every expense of equipment, including forage, &c., is to be paid by the parties who are to be employed in the frontier districts. This force will be formed as follows, and will be for the protection of the Albany, Somerset, Cradock, Albert and Victoria districts.

Each of these districts will be expected to raise a certain armed, equipped, and mounted force, composed of men well acquainted with the country. This force, after being approved by the Civil Commissioner, is to be commanded by a Commandant and four officers, appointed by the Commissioner in Chief.

The object of the Governor in raising this force is to provide for the better security of the border districts which are now exposed to the ravages of the enemy. This force is to be posted in the most convenient localities, to repel the enemy and pursue marauders; and for this purpose it is intended to keep patrols by day and by night.

The troops are having a little breathing time, preparatory to some combined movement to drive the enemy beyond the Keel. His Excellency, it is said, will shortly appeal to the Burgheers for their co-operation, and it is fervently hoped they may not be disappointed. This will, no doubt, be the last appeal which will be made to them, and if they will, it will certainly help themselves on their own heads by the consequence.

There is a rumour in town, that the enemy are collecting in great force in the neighbourhood of Whittlesea. It is reported also, that myriads of locusts have reached the district of Somerset, and are destroying every article of vegetation before them. Should this be the case, it will increase our difficulties. A great number of frontier farmers who had retreated away with their stock when the war broke out, are, it is said, on their way back, but if the grass is destroyed, they cannot remain.

GENTLEMEN,—I have come to make this place my headquarters, as being within this Colony the most convenient station from whence I can judge from personal observation of the measures best calculated to re-establish the peace and security of these frontier districts.

THE KAFFIR WAR AND THE CAPE COLONY.

House of Commons, April 5.

The vote of £460,000, towards the expenses of the Caffre war, proposed in Committee of Supply, led to a debate opened by Sir William Molesworth.

Sir William went thoroughly into the whole question of our expenditure on account of South Africa; to show, first, the enormous increase and amount of that expenditure; and secondly, that it is due to the abolition of the old and cheap system of self protection by the colonists themselves. Our force was 4500 in 1810, and from that year down to 1833 it diminished yearly under the old system till it was 2030 in 1833.
