The unexpected intelligence of the decease of Mr. MONTAGU, our late Colonial Secretary, brought us by the Indiana, at the moment when his family and friends were about to welcome him on his return to the Colony and to his office, has produced a sensation that for a moment throws the Turks and Russia into the shade, and suspends the calculations of our speculators in copper.

There are only partly true. There are men uncharitable enough, to delight in raking up the faults and infirmities of those who can no longer vindicate themselves; but there are others also, who can make ample allowance for erroneous views, and would rather be silent than ascribe to dishonorable motives, the actions of any man, who may have conscientiously held opinions different from their own. Let party spirit be hushed, and let not the journalist take upon himself to pronounce the stern verdict of the historian.

Events melancholy in their partial evil may be beneficial in their effects and the "partial evil" as another poet says, "universal good." We cannot help sighing in that light which is not in the light which we are now commending.

Men are more reluctant to part with power than with money, and some are too blind to see, that where political privileges are equally conferred on all, that which is given to one, is not taken from the other.

The turn out among the Lancaashire factory operatives has now lasted several weeks, and there seems no prospect of a speedy termination of it. The number of persons out of employment altogether is not less than 50,000, or 60,000.

The people of South Africa are about to exercise a power, which shall confer distinction on some, and withhold it from others. Wealth and talents, however desirable in Representatives, will not suffice to earn the confidence and procure the suffrage of the people; and those will have the best chance of being distinguished, who show by their acts, that they have the good of the Colony really at heart, and that, though it may not be to the benefit of their birth, they have adopted it as such, and are willing to devote to it their interest whatever means it may have placed Providence to put in their power.
