### THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, May 10, 1853.

The Sir Robert Peel, so long and anxiously expected, arrived here on Tuesday evening last from Natal, which place she left on the 12th instant.

She brings papers to the 5th, and though they contain but little news of importance, they set at rest, at least for the present, all speculations on the question as to whether gold is found in those regions in any remunerating quantity. One of the papers—the Independent of the 5th of May—contains an announcement—like many which have preceded it—that “it is positively assured that gold has been discovered at the Martin’s Diggings, and that the prospect of success is brightening;” but other papers before us, as well as private letters, do not make the slightest allusion to the subject.

The serious crisis under which the country had suffered for a lengthened period, appears to have had its climax, and matters are now wearing a better aspect, though the transition of necessity proceeds tardily. The interior traffic is described as progressing by degrees,—that in cattle as unusually lively, especially in the Klip River District and upper parts, where a considerable number had been purchased at the rate of £3 to £4 a head for the Cape market. The Natal Witness states, that traders come down as far as from the Paarl (near Cape Town) to make these purchases; that they select the choicest cattle, which are driven to farms hired for the purpose on the Orange River, where they are allowed to recruit thoroughly, and from whence they are driven by the shortest possible route, to the place of their destination.

Amongst the passengers of the Sir Robert Peel, is the hon’ble Mr. CLOETE, the Recorder, to whose suspension we lately referred. This measure appears to have occasioned much regret, excitement and disgust, and we hear that Mr. CLOETE intends to proceed to England in person, with the view of defending his conduct and explaining the same to the home Government.

Though we are not sufficiently acquainted with all the merits of the case, to give a decided opinion, we beg to observe that the able and impartial manner in which Mr. CLOETE has, during the period of his judgeship at Natal, and in his isolated position, administered the law, has surpassed the most sanguine expectations of his friends, and that the scrupulous and punctual exercise of the duties of his office appears to be the very cause of his having fallen into disgrace. Happily, Mr. CLOETE is not abandoned. The public at Natal, satisfied of his merits and innocence, have laudably come forward to second his efforts for redress, as will be seen from the following petition addressed to the present Secretary of State for the Colonies and subscribed by 240 inhabitants of Pietermaritzburg and its neighbourhood, which was followed up by a similar petition and address from the inhabitants of D’Urban:

*The Memorial of the Undersigned Resident Householders of Pietermaritzburg and its Vicinity,*

HUMBLY SHEWETH.—That your memorialists have heard with grief and surprise, that the Hon. Henry Cloete, L.L.D., Recorder or Natal, has been summarily suspended from office and salary, on the grounds of having allowed personal feeling towards the Lieutenant Governor and Mr. MELLER, the Resident Magistrate of D’Urban, to interfere with the fair and impartial administration of justice as evidenced in the proceedings brought before the District Court, in the cause of MELLER v. BUCHANAN; that repudiating as your memorialists do, any reflections on His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, or his council in this matter, many of your memorialists were present at the trial of the said cause, and all were cognizant of it. That those of your memorialists who were present, bore testimony to the strict impartiality, and extreme forbearance of the Recorder on that occasion, and all join in the expression of their unbounded confidence in the public and private character of this most respected Judge.

That their confidence in Mr. Cloete is based upon their daily observation, during a period of several years, in community so small, that every occurrence almost of daily life is exposed and known to all, and where every judgment undergoes minute analysis.

That your memorialists have analysed the grounds set forth for the suspension of the Hon. Henry Cloete, may be restored to office, and to your memorialists and for which, as in duty bound, they will ever pray, &c.

The following is the address of the inhabitants of Durban, with the Recorder’s reply thereto:—To the Hon. H. CLOETE, L.L.D., Recorder of the District of Natal.

We, the undersigned, inhabitants of the Town of Durban, beg leave to address you on your intended departure for England, to express our wishes for your safe and pleasant voyage, and for your speedy attainment of the object which calls you there.

That object—your restoration to the duties of your office, we cannot regard as a matter merely involving your personal interests, but as one intimately connected with the cause of the colonists of Natal, in the upright administration of justice throughout the District.

We are fully alive to the grave difficulties and responsibilities imposed upon any one man, however learned, and cautious, and conscientious, who undertakes, as a sole judge in the Supreme Court of the District, to administer justice between parties, free from the imputation of partiality. In a community whose social and commercial relations are so extensively interwoven and knit together, and where no occurrence of interest can long be kept a secret.

This, your great difficulty, sir, has, however, redounded to your honor. We beg to express the admiration we feel for your conduct in these trying circumstances. We have witnessed your decisions on the bench, and willingly bear testimony to the high sense we entertain not only of your great abilities, but of the impartiality of your judgments. And we respect your conduct in a recent case of libel (from which the citizens publicly preferred against you have been drawn which led to your suspension from office) we feel more particularly called on to declare our unbiased conviction of the

strict impartiality and uprightness of your decision in that case, and of your wonderful forbearance and command of presence.

Under these circumstances, we deeply deplore your temporary absence from us; and trust that you may soon return amongst us and be long spared to administer Justice in the district, in the same able satisfactory manner, which has hitherto secured for it the confidence of the community.

A memorial, addressed to Her Majesty’s Secretary of State for the Colonies, praying for your restoration to office, is now in course of signature in Durban; but owing to circumstances, which will not be necessary particularly to refer to here, it has been found impossible to complete the cause for signatures till late for the memorial to be forwarded by the next steamer.

Again wishing you a pleasant voyage and success in your undertaking.

In answer to which the Recorder made the following written reply:

D’URBAN, 11th May, 1853.  
Gentlemen.—In thanking you for the expression of your kind wishes for my safe voyage and for the speedy attainment of the great object for which I have severed myself from my family and home, I feel it my duty to add, that you have justly viewed this subject as one not merely involving my personal interests, but as intimately connected with the confidence which the inhabitants of Natal ought to feel in the upright administration of justice in this district.

Without entering into the details of the extraordinary proceedings here, which have led to my summary suspension from office and salary, I may yet declare that I have been less surprised by that act of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and his Executive Council, than by the information I subsequently received to the effect, that this, my suspension from office and salary, had indeed not only been sanctioned, but ordered by the Secretary of State.

If an order can thus emanate, directing the suspension from office of a Judge of any colony without his even suspecting the nature of the charges to be brought against him, he will not be able to exercise the duties of his responsible office with credit to himself or benefit to the public; and I have thus felt it to become my painful, but imperative duty, to court that public open inquiry into my judicial conduct which it would be vain to expect here.

Leaving these shores, then, an inward consciousness of that impartiality and integrity which I have endeavoured, at least, to show to every superior before the Court; I feel little doubt as to the ultimate issue of such an inquiry, however painful and tedious it may prove; and do not anticipate any difficulty in removing the stain which it has been attempted here to throw upon my honor and character.

The Natal papers, which came to hand by the above opportunity, make no allusion whatever to the supposed defeat of the Boers, lately, and even, yet so eagerly disseminated through certain channels. The subjoined extract from the first number of the South East African of the 2nd April—1 paper published at Natal, exclusively in the Dutch language—mentions indeed that great devastations had been committed by the Kafirs in the district of Marikana, during the absence of the inhabitants, who had been previously compelled to remove to a more secure quarter; but as the Commandant, equipped for the purpose of revenging these atrocities, if actually perpetrated, would not leave before the present month, it is almost impossible that the result can already have been ascertained.

KAFIR DISTURBANCES AT MARIKO.

The latest accounts which we have received from the public are of a very painful and deplorable character. It must be still fresh in the recollection of our readers, that a few months ago a Boer at Mariko, shooting a Kafir, in the midst of a more turbulent party, caused them to scatter, and that immediately afterwards they were compelled to abandon their farms and homes in order that those who had been shot might be sent to hospital.
