





THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

Cape Town, August 11, 1853.

We have perused the blue book containing further papers relative to the establishment of a Representative Assembly at the Cape of Good Hope, and shall offer a few remarks on the contents.

The series begins with a despatch of General Cathcart, bearing date Graham's Town, Nov. 14, 1852. In judging of that despatch, it is but fair to keep in mind that, when a Governor writes home shortly after his arrival in a Colony, we must expect him in all candour and uprightness to make many statements which after a longer stay he might see fit to correct, if other parties possessing more local information have not done it for him from the beginning. Keeping this in view, and taking moreover into account that General Cathcart, like all prudent men, is rather conspicuous for keeping his own counsel, we are surprised to find a despatch of so early a date so correct in almost everything of importance on which it touches. We shall not dwell upon particular statements, as we have transferred the whole despatch to our columns. As regards a few offensive expressions, such as "the ravings of a factious municipal body" and "a turbulent spirit among the Cape Town rabble," we are confident that, if circumstances had allowed of His Excellency residing at Cape Town, he would have seen at once that such language is not applicable. The impressions of our Municipality were probably collected in the East. The term rabble, in the sense in which it is applied in England, does not apply to any part of the population of Cape Town. There is no class of people among us, whether white or coloured, or both mixed together, that deserves to be called a rabble. The Malays are decidedly much better behaved and infinitely more respectable than the common people in the large towns of Europe. The imported blacks and mixed races, besides forming a small proportion of our population, are generally very well behaved and give the police very little trouble. How little disposed to turbulence the lower classes of Cape Town really are, became evident, perusing the correspondence about the Constitution, when another fact on holding different views from the municipal body, were extremely anxious to create disturbances, but could not find a rabble to stir up.

The rest of the despatches are either of little importance, or such as have already been before the public.

Recurring to the proceedings of our Municipal Board in their meeting of the 31st instant, we cannot help stating our conviction, that the sentiments then and there expressed in a resolution proposed by Mr. Commissioner Maynard and seconded by Mr. J. J. van der Walt, are most cordially responded to by an overwhelming majority of the Cape Public. We also agree with the opinions severally expressed by the other gentlemen present, that the recent vituperation levelled at a most deserving public officer, by a paper which shall be nameless, cannot be intended for the colonial reader, who is sure to repudiate it, but is prepared with a view to party purposes at home; and that "to be blackened by the clique who support that production" ought to be considered rather complimentary than otherwise.

Out of respect for ourselves and for our readers we have long since dropped all allusions to the obnoxious journal, but since our Municipal Board, which His Excellency rather precipitately characterized as a "factious body" has taken the lead in visiting the distinguished merit of the second in authority of her Majesty's servants in this Colony, we could not refrain from availing ourselves of this unsought opportunity, of testifying our entire concurrence with every opinion and sentiment uttered on that occasion.

A paper has come to our hands headed: Prospectus of a New Newspaper to be called the Cape Town Times, and ending with the words: "Names of Subscribers received by Mr. George Gain, &c." We are not anxious to damp the ardour or repress the aspirations of any one who feels it his duty to contribute towards enlightening the public. The arena of politics must be open to all, and though the future Editor of the Cape Town Times is probably a man who has recently come among us, and who therefore can hardly be supposed to be up to local questions, his claims to our support may consist in a thorough acquaintance with the nature of that form of Government, for the introduction of which we are now preparing. It is this political crisis, which the writer of the Prospectus now under review, puts forth as the occasion for launching a new journal. It cannot be denied that some of the clauses of the Constitution Ordinance are likely to be a little puzzling to persons who are called upon, for the first time, to take an active part in the working of the political engine. Errors will occur—some grave, some ludicrous, and nothing but time and experience can prevent their recurrence for the future. To anticipate and foreclose them altogether we hold impossible; but we have no doubt that it can be done to a considerable degree by a well informed man with a clear head. Is the writer of the Prospectus, whom by conjecture we shall identify with the future Editor, such a man? A clear head should be reflected by a clear style of composition, for the style reflects the mind of man, as the looking glass his outward favor. We shall let the Prospectus speak for itself. Here is the introductory paragraph:

"The introduction of free institutions into the Cape Colony and two Houses of Assembly, or Parliament, shortly being about to meet, when doubtless matters of important moment, no less than this Colony deserves, will be brought before our elected Representatives for their consideration and approval, and as since the first introduction of journalism every political body and parliamentary party have been more or less guided by the opinions pronounced by an enlightened press, and as in every country of advancement the press is the safeguard of the rights and liberties of the people, for it points out the path and the mode of progress of that which is striking, stirring and beneficial—it is the duty, in fact the purpose and intention of every journal, to propound and enlighten any doctrine, tending to the civilization and well-being of the country where it exists, and to set

forth, when difficulties impede the way of advancement, how they can be removed."

Either we are very dull, or this introduction is as obscure as it is verbose. Modesty prompts us to admit the former of these positions, and we cannot help envying those readers, whose greater penetration enables them to fathom the depths of the above extract. The writer cannot take offence, if we say that it is most ungraciously; for if the composition is bad, that epithet would involve a compliment; and if it is good, our shaft falls to the ground. In either case then, we may safely use that word; and who but knows, that when called upon to give an opinion of what you cannot understand, it is a great relief to hit upon something that can do no harm. Well, let it stand then—the introduction is most ungraciously.

The remaining part of the first paragraph is a kind of running fire of short sentences, each fraught with some startling discovery, and succeeding each other like the charges of a revolver. Dropping all as-ses-ber-ge these announcements might be thus condensed: Wanted for the Cape, a spirited journal, the press is asleep, to sleep more comfortably two journals have laid their heads together, and a third wakes only once a week; your Cape Constitution is a mere sham, business flourishing, but mercantile interests unprotected; wanted, a paper to teach your merchants to be something more than mere sellers and barterers. Get up to the mark of the Rothschilds and Labouchères, &c. &c.

If the first paragraph of this Prospectus might be appropriately characterized in the margin with the term Rhymerole, the designation Blarney would do for the next.

In the third paragraph, which might bear the inscription Pelf, our future Editor again stretches out his hand to the skirts of the sellers and barterers and, trying very hard to keep on his legs, promises to support them and furnish them with a Mercantile Index for their use and behoof. The whole winds up with another little running fire, but this time the revolver is loaded with promises, as:

First promise. A remedy for ill-feelings, bickerings and jealousies arising from partisanship. We give the writer credit for having found out one of our wants at least.

Second promise. Cordial support to those courses of action which shall tend to the advancement and benefit of youth.

Third promise. The CAPE TOWN TIMES (here the paper is named as one of the things that he) will contain faithful and accurate reports of all public proceedings, &c. &c. And hereupon, in proof of his sincerity, the author gets unbidden into the witness box and promises to speak the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth.

Then follows a little display of independence, quite in keeping with the tone of a man who asks no favors and promises his support to the mercantile community, and, to crown all, an avowal which looks somewhat like a sneer at our simplicity—"we fix our confidence in the innate goodness of our fellow-countrymen—an enlightened and intelligent people.

Such is the Prospectus of the New Newspaper which the writer informs us is projected to meet local callings. We cannot help anticipating that this projectile will not take effect.

It appears from the Graaff Reinet Courant that the negative reply of Sir Andries Stockenström to the requisition sent to him, had been received there; but that the Constitution Committee had adopted the wise step to submit the subjoined document to the electors, requesting Sir Andries to reconsider his previous decision and to comply with their urgent request:

REQUISITION.

Graaff Reinet, 25th July, 1853.

Sir A. STOCKENSTROM, Bart., Chairman.

Sir, - Y our answer to the requisition inviting you to become a candidate for election to a seat in the Parliament of the Colony, as a member of the Legislative Council, has been received.

We beg to assure you that, though the requisition was signed by only twenty five of us, it was made at the request of many, and that we believe that very many of the inhabitants of the Eastern Province are, like ourselves, anxious that you should take a share in the duties of the Council of Parliament, and with us, exceedingly regret that you feel constrained to decline doing so. We trust, however, that your refusal is not to be understood as being final and irrevocable.

Of the reasons assigned for that refusal, permit us to observe, that, after having attentively perused the answer which contains them, we feel our confidence in your abilities unshaken; whilst, as regards the infra state of your health, though we can not wonder that the effects on your frame, of the bodily and mental exertions of a long life, always held cheap by you at the call of public duty, should exhibit themselves at your age, - we trust that your serious and disinterested will be but temporary; and that, by the goodness of Providence, you will soon be restored to your usual health, and be enabled not long to devote a portion of your time to the service of your country. In this expectation, and feeling how essential - nay, absolutely necessary - your assistance and co-operation will be to ensure the good working of the liberal system of Government which your strenuous exertions have, in a great measure, contributed to obtain for the Colony, we venture to request that you will yet reconsider your decision, and consent to the nomination proposed in the requisition sent to you.

Should it be hereafter found that the advice now given by your medical friends, and as sincerely hope only as a precautionary measure, must be imperatively followed, - that you must seek repose and retire from public business, - we shall, though not without sorrow and grief, submit to the unavoidable necessity.

His Honor the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Bell gave judgment this day in favor of the plaintiff in this case, and in so doing entered very fully into its merits. The joint estate of the parties is by the judgment of the Court to be administered, liquidated and distributed according to the joint will and codicil, produced under the act of opening thereof on the 7th June 1853, consisting of the documents found therein.

Mr Justice Magrave, who was present when judgment was pronounced, and had refused to sit in consequence of his having given an opinion in this case, stated that he quite concurred in the views that were expressed by his brother Judges.

The Court will proceed with the Appeal Case from Natal To-morrow, Friday, at 11 o'clock.
