Proposed by Mr. Toger Van Abo, seconded by Mr. Edw. Proposed by Mr. C. H. Caldecott, seconded by Mr. Lloyd.—That this meeting would present to the serious consideration of both Houses of Parliament, the urgent necessity which exists for their prompt and careful legislation on the subject of Emigration, as the continuance of the present peace and prosperity enjoyed by the colony, will in the opinion of this meeting, mainly depend on the introduction of a large European population.

Proposed by Mr. T. C. Scantlen, seconded by Mr. Janion.—That this meeting while it reposes confidence in the present Executive Government, would suggest that the control of the funds proposed to be raised, should be entrusted to the care of a committee, equally of official and unofficial members.

Proposed by Mr. Wm. Cawood, seconded by Doctor Flemmer.—That petitions be addressed to both Houses of Parliament embodying the foregoing resolutions, and that the following gentlemen be appointed to draw up the same.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. WEDNESDAY, APRIL 30.—The military pensioner's Bill, passed by and received from the Council, was read a first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Monday.

Mr. HIDDINGH in the TRANSVAAL and FREE STATE.—C. Hiddingh, Esq., Envoy of H.M. the King of the Netherlands to this State and the Transvaal Republic, reached Bloemfontein, on his return from the latter country, the week before last, after an absence of upwards of two months.

From a short communication with which that gentleman has this day favoured us, and which appears in both languages in this issue, there seems too much reason to infer, that his future reminiscences of South African Republics will not be wholly unmingled with disgust.

At the same time, we rejoice that the anticipations to which we gave utterance just before the late session of the Volksraad, regarding the respectful courtesy of the response which that body would display in acknowledgment of the King of Holland's gracious and really friendly letter, have been fully borne out by the mainly tone of anticipated gratitude for such kind attention on his part.

In some remarks of ours in January last, wherein we ridiculed the extravagant egotism of those who would slushily worship at the altars of ignorance enveloped the courtly, and walking comparatively in the dark, the inhabitant of the Free State, and who, for this reason, we felt it our duty to caution against, we were surprised to find that the Rev. Mr. Hiddingh had also, in a long talk, referred to Mr. Hiddingh's expressed horror at the rejection of his presence of Van der Palm's bible in 7 vols. by Fieldcornet Kotze, setting in the name of Commandant General Pretorius; Mr. H. seems to regard the act as something almost sacrilegious.

Foreign Intelligence. THE CHOLERA.—MADRID, 27th MARCH.—To the great regret and consternation of the whole population the Cholera made its appearance amongst us at the beginning of the month. In our former Overseas we have stated that 635 immigrants were landed at Gibraltar Island, there to undergo quarantine, as there had been a few deaths there from the disease from India. A short time after the Indians landed the Cholera broke out with deadly virulence and in the course of two or three weeks nearly 200 were carried off.

dead body would have been land-d if the Mayor had not arrived just in time to prevent it. The corpse was buried in the sea and the vessel was placed in quarantine after some days afterwards - on the 5th a case of cholera was declared in the upper part of the town and on the following day other cases were declared some of which proved fatal.

There have been several deaths in the Barracks not included in the above statement. At the present time the disease is on the increase. No sooner was the Cholera in town than it spread rapidly to most of the districts; in each instance there was the best of evidence that the disease was communicated by human intercourse. The public generally is indignant against the Government, as no precautions were taken to prevent communication with Gabriel Island, and the people in quarantine. On the occasion of such calamities the public are not always guided by a sentiment of justice; but we feel bound to say, writing coolly and deliberately, that in the present instance, the public has great cause to be aggrieved. When we are rid of this terrible visitation, the whole facts will no doubt be laid before the Imperial Government. The concession to the public wish that the quarantine station should be fixed at Gabriel Island has been nullified by the late conduct of the authorities, and the impression is that the indifference of Government to the due observance of the Quarantine Regulations is to prove that the Cholera cannot be warned off by means which are considered useless in England. And yet the most palpable and convincing examples of the spread of this disease by human intercourse are before us. A man died of Cholera in Port Louis harbour after having been to the place of quarantine, where the disease existed; the people on board the vessel where he died communicated with the shore at Port Louis; the Cholera appeared in town shortly afterwards; hundreds of Indians at the Immigration Depot were sent into the district by the Protector of Immigrants and they carried the disease wherever they went, some of them dying of it. In presence of these facts there can be no doubt as to the way the Cholera has been introduced and spread in the colony - *Maritime Commercial Gazette.*

GERMANY.—The protocol signed at Vienna will be shortly communicated to the Frankfurt Diet, and the Austrian Minister there will move that the Diet should express its approval of the propositions. Much doubt is felt as to the course the Diet will take, as Prussia is an incalculable power. The organ of the Berlin Government, the *Zeit*, takes to heart the exclusion of Prussia from the negotiations at Paris. It professes that the exclusion does not affect the honour of Prussia; that she will not stoop to solicit an entrance into the conference; that she has an incontestable right to be there, but that her dignity forbids solicitation. But as the conference was intended to place the European equilibrium on more solid bases, and as a treaty, if concluded without her, will not be binding upon her, she thinks she ought to be invited to the negotiations, if the treaty is intended to have the force of international law. At the close of the article the writer seems to intimate that Prussia may relent.

If Prussia decides on taking a step further—if she finds a plausible pretext for offering her hand—she will only take this step with the view of consolidating the new order of things about to spring up from the peace, and of securing to the world the benefits held out to it by this new situation. Prussia wishes to spare the Allied Powers the fault of leaving her shut out from the pacific relations of Europe because she wished to keep herself aloof from the complications of war. This fault could only be pernicious and entail serious results with respect to the consolidation and stability of the new order of things that it is now in contemplation to create. It is stated that when the Vienna protocol was signed, Gortschakoff requested that Prussia should be invited to take part in the conference. Count Buel supported the request. The French and English Ministers took notice of it, ad refrendum. — *Spectator*, February 9.
