With reference to the warlike attitude assumed by certain native chiefs against the white inhabitants of the Orange River Free State...

It was proposed by J. M. Howell, and seconded by Commandant G. Viljoen, and resolved, "That the inhabitants of the Umvoti division immediately offer to the President of the Orange River Free State every assistance in their power."

Proposed by Mr. P. Van Rooyen, and seconded by Mr. P. Botha, sen., "That the President of the Free State be respectfully requested to obviate, by all means in his power, the great danger to life that may be incurred by obtaining troops from Mauritius, that island being at present visited by the cholera and small-pox."

Mr. McCORDELL'S NATAL IMMIGRATION.—This gentleman has proceeded with his labour party, to his land near the Umvoti, on the coast, to prepare the ground and dwellings, for the settlement about to be located there.

Sir George Grey it appears declining to decide himself upon the report of Major Addison sent it home to the Secretary of State, and the result is, the dismissal of their Agent from the service and the indemnification of Faku for the losses sustained, as far as such can be effected.
