THE ZUID-AFRIK VAN.

Cape Town, October 6, 1856.

The latest intelligence from Holland is important on account of a recent change of Ministry. The late Cabinet, with BARON VAN HALL at its head, had sprung from the agitation in 1853 owing to a papal decree for organizing the Roman Catholic Church in the Netherlands. That agitation proceeded from two parties: the one a political party, signified as anti-revolutionary, clinging to the principles of faith of the Reformed Church and to the divine right of Kings, in opposition to republican views more or less disguised; the other, less consolidated, consisted of Protestants advocating those more liberal views in the Church, which are held by the majority of the clergy in Holland, and professed to be, in politics, either conservative, or progressive on constitutional principles. The Ministry of that time, not favoring anti-revolutionary views, was exposed to the attacks not only of that party, but also of the extreme liberals, who had resisted the Protestant movement from the beginning, and had been temporarily at the head of affairs during the Ministry of THORBECKE. As the last party was more numerously represented in both Chambers, the Ministry could not help making some concessions to them. It was anticipated that the discussion of the Education Bill, which the Ministry was about to introduce, would produce a violent clashing of parties. The extreme liberals were urgent for excluding all religious instruction from the public schools, while the anti-revolutionary party were no less anxious to introduce exclusively the doctrines of their own denomination. If the latter had carried their point, denominational schools would have been unavoidable—a result which would probably have suited the Roman Catholics more than anything else. But the dread of so marked a separation between children of different denominations at school, and the conviction that a religious principle and an historical account of the Christian Religion are reconcilable, at least in the Netherlands, with the exclusion of doctrinal matters, induced many pious and liberal minds Protstants to recommend, that the Law on Education should contain no distinct allusion to religious instruction.

The Ministry had introduced a Bill in the spirit of the liberals, which seemed to satisfy a majority, not excepting even the Roman Catholic Meubrs, and was opposed only by the anti-revolutionary party, constituting a small minority in the Representation. These accordingly tried to gain their point by petitions. The King appeared inclined to modify the Bill in accordance with those petitions. This can be inferred from a speech of the new Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. SIMONS, on whom the Education Bill must devolve, and who is not known to hold anti-revolutionary views. The only one of that party in the present Ministry is Mr. Advocate VAN DER BRUGGEN, the Minister of Justice; and judging from his antecedents, he is perhaps of all anti-revolutionaries the most likely to effect a partial reconciliation between his party, and the more liberal Protstants.

The elections during the late ministerial crisis were not calculated to alter materially the state of parties that existed under the former Ministry. The extreme liberals, who acknowledge Mr. THORBECKE as their leader, may boast of some acquisitions, and the chief of the anti-revolutionary party, Mr. GROEN VAN PRINSTERER, has not been re-elected.

NISCHNER.—We have been requested to call the attention of the Municipal Board to the disgraceful state of the Long-street canal. The inhabitants have just cause to complain that whilst other canals and ditches have been dredged over, justice is not done to them. Surely, if the Commissioners have not a sufficiency of funds at their disposal to do the whole at once, they may do a part annually, and we are confident that the owners of property in Long-street, if a proper representation were made to them, would not fail to contribute liberally towards such a desirable object.

ABOMINABLE SPECTACLE.—We call the attention of the competent authorities to a most abominable scene at the military lines, at the spot where the convicts of the Waterloo have been interred. The ground having been from time to time washed away by the sea, the unbleached skeletons of the dead have become exposed to view, presenting a most ghastly spectacle, and calling aloud to those who bury it, to look to these things at once to beat themselves in the water.

S. A. MISSIONARY SOCIETY.—The Bazaar held in the Exchange on Wednesday last, in aid of the Zoar Institution, belonging to this Society, yielded the handsome sum of £80. Goods to the value of £40 or £50 more are on sale on reasonable terms at the residence of Mrs. the widow Bresler, Long-street.

THE "PROTECTORUM."—At the 18th Annual Meeting of the Shareholders in this company, held on the 1st instant, a dividend of £1 per share was declared, in addition to 6 per cent upon the paid-up capital, and a bonus of 2½ per cent to policy holders. The receipts for the year amounted to £9866. 0s. 4d.; but the losses of the company were heavy, those by fire at Road-board alone amounting to £6239. 10s. To make up that above dividend and bonus therefore a sum of £1469. 2s. 9d. was taken from the accumulated fund. The meeting also resolved to pay Mr. Attwell's policy of £450. £1000 upon his stock, which the Directors had refused to pay, because Mr. Attwell had effected an insurance upon the same stock with another office, without having given notice thereof to the Protektor, and in consequence of which his policy had been vitiated. As it appeared that Mr. Attwell's omission arose entirely from ignorance, and this was the first case of the kind which had arisen, the shareholders resolved to pay Mr. Attwell, hoping that his narrow escape will prove a sufficient warning to other policy holders.

LATEST FRONTIER NEWS.—The frontier papers received by Saturday's post, state that in Kafirland everything was very tranquil. The Graham's Town Journal states to have

been confidentially assured that the report of the Tamboosies having also commenced slandering their cattle, in obedience to the commands of the Witch Doctor, is destined to foundation.

TOTAL WRACK AND ALL HANDS LOST.—Information reached the Cape on Saturday last, that the Dutch ship "JAPAN," Capt. Kley, had been lost with all hands at Nicobar (Islands) on the spot where the "DUNCASTER" was wrecked. Four bodies had already washed up, and the beach was strewn with timber, &c. The disaster is supposed to have occurred on the night of Tuesday last, the 30th ultimo.

GRANTS.—At the meeting of the Commissioners of the Cape Town Municipality held on Wednesday last, the following letter from the Col. Secretary was laid on the table, being a reply to the request for information relative to a certain grant of land lately made by the government to the English Bishop:—

Colonial Office, 30th September, 1856.

The Secy to the Cape Town Municipality,
Sir,—With reference to my letter of the 13th instant, acknowledging the receipt of yours of the 11th instant, upon the subject of certain grants of land connected with the Government House Gardens, I am directed by His Excellency the Governor to acquaint you, for the information of the Commissioners of the Municipality, that as he is advised that the Ordinance under which the Municipality is constituted does not confer upon the Commissioners any power or right to interfere with the prerogative of the Crown in the issue of the grants in question, His Excellency directs him to return the grants to the Commissioners.

But His Excellency is at the same time of opinion that such publicity should be given to all matters connected with the disposal of public lands, that neither the Commissioners nor any other party interested in the disposal of those lands should have occasion to ask for such information as the Commissioners have hitherto apportioned.

To prevent, therefore, the possibility of the recurrence of such an inconvenience, His Excellency has directed that for the future a monthly abstract of all grants of land issued each month shall be published at the close of it in the Government Gazette.

The first publication of this nature, containing all grants made between the 1st January and the 31st August of the present year, appeared in the last two numbers of the Gazette I have, &c.

Mr. Ekkernas came before the meeting to tender his services for the widow of the late Mr. Chisholm to the end of December; he was willing to do every thing in his power to give satisfaction to the Board, and he hoped the Commissioners would allow her to receive the salary up to that date. The Commissioners decided to grant this to the widow.

SIR A. STOCKENSTROM.—In a letter addressed by the Hon. Baronet to the Editor of the "Commercial Advertiser," dated London, July 28, he expresses himself in the following empirical terms with respect to the aspersions cast upon him during a debate in the Legislative Council on the so-called "120 fabricated diagrams":

About the attacks on myself personally, I am not going to detain you. A certain poite epithet which must have added considerably to the dignity of an assembly supposed to consist of gentlemen, I take in the light of a compliment, considering the source whence it sprang. When I last stepped from the Cape Jetty, I was in hopes that I might have been allowed to forget these men. If I could remember having cast a straw in their way, except as a sacred public duty, I should not die easy without having made ample amends. As their hatred was notorious, I have, in self-defence, for upwards of twenty years, bearded them, defied them, provoked them to bring forward boldly and openly a shadow of a charge against me. If in that centre there were an atom to be found that could destroy all that is dear to me, we know that heaven and earth would have been moved to bring it to the surface to be applied in one fell swoop. Their failure is proof of their impotence; and my conscious rectitude of purpose, in spite of many blunders, places me far beyond the reach of their malice unless they send another patrol to burn my property ("the gem in the desert"), thus ruining my purse without adding to my fear or diminishing my contempt. I cannot, therefore, be any further pestered with their trash, and as the state of my health drives me into a nook where it is hardly known in which hemispheres, here the Cape is situated, and where I am not likely to hear what further advantage may be taken of my absence, I must cut this matter short by referring to every piece of impertinence, past, present, and future, to a comprehensive reply given by me in Council, on the 27th March, 1853, which seemed so well fitted that it was at once appropriated. As for my "sweeping charges," either in or out of Council, or before the House of Commons, I can only observe that I adhere to every syllable that I have uttered; but those charges were never expected nor intended to please those who were fatigued on the misfortunes of the country—neither the exterminators, nor the smugglers of gunpowder, fire-arms, and brandy, nor the sufferers of Grylls' fat oxen, and the like, nor the soldiers of the British Army, and the like.

The new, or rather second road, which has been made in the southern outlet of our village by the prisoners here, is in every respect an improvement. Formerly we had one road, now we have two. Everybody can ride whichever road he chooses, whoever now prefers a crooked road will take the old road, our Magistrate keeps the right one.

But "an Inhabitant" is not yet satisfied. Mr. Wiggins and Mr. J. H. Munnik, both members of Parliament, must also be dragged into the dispute, and this again in a manner which clearly shows that the men and not matters are the object. As to ourselves we attach no weight to rumors and old women's stories, as "an Inhabitant" appears to do, to plan-makers. This last is no art.
