To finish this war we shall require volunteers, and this Government has issued a notice that all persons volunteering will not only receive the same privileges as a burglar, but will be found in rations as well; so that a man coming up with one or two horses, rifle, &c., may be certain of getting an excellent farm in the conquered country. ...

Upon the whole, the aspect of affairs may be pronounced satisfactory. Mr. Brand is seen to be not a "mad-brained President" which one or two of the Colonial newspapers, with more haste than discretion, represented him to be. He can calmly await the course of events, and base the vindication of his policy on the issue of the struggle. ...

The Natal Mercury says: "We hope that our Government will not compromise the future peace of the colony by a vacillating policy. The colonists generally will, we think, concur in the views generally expressed the other night, when Mr. Grompton brought forward his motion ascertaining that in any repatriation which may be entered for the late raid, the surrender of the ringleaders of the marauders be an absolute condition. ...

LATER NEWS FROM NATAL. By the Union Company's mail steamer Saxon we have four day's later news from Natal than that brought by the Valerius. The Mercury had heard that President Brand had "gone to the Cape to seek from Sir Philip Wodehouse either active assistance or passive mediation," but adds "that we must wait for further and fuller explanation before we believe that the aggressive party has so soon had enough of the pains and penalties of war." ...

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS.

Legislative Council.

WEDNESDAY, AUG. 2.—A petition was presented by Mr. Wood, from certain inhabitants of Port Elizabeth, against the Railway Bill. The Eastern Districts Court bill was read a second time. The Divisional Councils bill was considered in committee and reported with amendments. ...

Mr. Goddard thought the Bill so drafted, that it might be best to throw it overboard altogether. He was how ever willing to amend it, so as to adapt it to the requirements of the colony. ...

House of Assembly.

WEDNESDAY, AUG. 2.—The Malmesbury Board of Executors bill was ordered to be read a second time on the 10th Aug. The consideration of the Estimates was, after considerable discussion, again put off till the 9th August.

THURSDAY, AUG. 3.—A petition was presented by Mr. van de Ven, from the inhabitants of Worcester, against the Railway bill, but being informal, was withdrawn.

In answer to the question of Mr. G. Wood, the Colonial Secretary said that it was not customary to publish the correspondence before the despatches had been replied to, but in this instance the Governor would depart from this rule; and he consequently now laid upon the table copy of a letter addressed by the Governor to the Secretary of State, on the subject of the Annexation bill.

On the motion of Mr. Gird, the house resolved that it is both just and equitable that all wheat and flour imported into this colony should be liable to a customs duty in proportion to the market value thereof in this colony at the time of such importation.

On the motion of Mr. J. Ayliff, the House agreed to go into committee on the 7th August, to consider the Governor's message relative to the negotiations and correspondence with the Diamond Company, and to report upon the return of postage upon letters transmitted by the steamers of said company.

The motion of Mr. Rutherford, to request the Governor to cause to be laid upon the table copies of correspondence on the subject of postal communication between Port Elizabeth and Graaff-Reinet, was agreed to.

On the motion of Mr. Murray, a select committee was appointed to inquire into and report upon the financial relationships now existing between the government and the railway company. A discussion took place upon the motion of Mr. Thomson to postpone the consideration of the Annexation bill till the 10th August, and whilst this was going on the House was counted out.

FRIDAY, AUG. 5.—Before proceeding to the Order of the day, the consideration of the Land Beacons bill in committee, Mr. Rutherford rose to propose that the Annexation bill take precedence. He did so because a number of Eastern members were about to leave, and others were soon to follow, and they were desirous now that their opposition had failed, to come to an immediate vote upon the disputed clause, without any obstruction, and merely to record their votes in favour of the views held by them.

Mr. Solomon opposed. Western benches were there, and a discussion would ensue by surprise. Eastern members had either very suddenly changed their opinion or were intent upon misleading. Having done every thing to oppose the discussion of the bill and to bring disgrace upon the House and upon representative institutions, having contemptuously rejected all offers of a compromise on the part of Western members, they could not expect now they had played out their game that they would be treated with any leniency. ...

After some explanatory remarks from Messrs Murray and Miller, Mr. G. Wood followed, concluding his speech with the observations that Eastern members had only sworn to protect their interests. The result proved that their efforts had failed. Though they were not yet done, and might continue the fight, they had determined, since Mr. Solomon refused to go into committee, to allow the Bill to take its course, and leave Western members to deal with it as they pleased, reserving to themselves the right to take ulterior measures should they feel warranted so to do. ...

The Eastern members thereupon rose, and left the House in a body. Mr. Rutherford's motion having thereupon been put to the vote and unanimously rejected, the House proceeded to consider the Land Beacons Act in committee, and after disposing of several clauses, adjourned till Monday, when the Annexation Bill is to take precedence.

THE TRADE OF FRANCE.—France has exported during the first four months of 1865, says the 'Monitor des Soirs,' merchandise to the value of 822,266,000frs, being 71 millions less than for the corresponding period of 1864, but in augmentation of the same months in 1863, 1862, and 1861. The products representing the largest sums in the statement furnished by the customs are wheat, 165 millions; woolen goods, 106; and iron, 86. The foreign goods imported show a total amount of 782,124,000frs for the first four months of 1865. This is an increase on the corresponding periods in the four years last past. The most important items in the four years are: wheat, 167 millions; silk and wool, 92; and iron, 75. As the exports are 822,266,000frs, and the imports 782,124,000frs, there remains a balance of 130,442,000frs, paid by foreign nations for French products, to the augmentation of the capital of French commerce.

A trial has just been made at Toulon with an iron-plate, said to be the most useful yet invented. It is a thin, light, and may be removed from one place to another, by rail, or an ordinary wagon. This boat is said to be ballproof, draws but 3 feet water when fully laden, and carries a battery of rifled guns in a room where it can be raised or lowered at will. The trial was made in the outer roads of the harbour, and succeeded perfectly in regard to speed, precision in firing, and facility of evolution.

RUSSIA IN THE EAST.—A letter from Tiflis, dated the 3rd ult., states that an expedition was being prepared by Russia against Ali Khan, chief of the mountain districts of Russia, Persia, and Turkey, and his situation renders it of strategic importance. "If it falls into the hands of Russia," says the 'Levant Herald,' "it would give her a dangerous footing in the territory of these latter countries. The pretext for the proposed expedition is that the people belonging to Ali Khan make flourishing excursions into Russian Armenia. The Khan is nominally dependent on Persia, but by geographical position a subject of Turkey. Practically he is altogether independent, for he pays no tribute to any one; and this very independence will enable Russia to seize his territory, as she will pretend that thereby she violates no rights of either of the neighbouring powers."
