Our next number is the music, "Eskimo", arranged from the score to the motion picture "Eskimo" by the composer William Axt. Since our associate conductor; Henry Svedrovsky, has collaborated with Mr. Axt in the preparation of this arrangement of the music for the Standard Symphony Hour, Mr. Coates has kindly suggested that Mr. Svedrovsky conduct the performance.

The thematic material used in the score to "Eskimo" was collected by the Canadian Arctic Expedition during the years 1913 to 1918.

It is the music of the Copper Eskimos and consists predominantly of dance songs and incantations. The dance songs reflect the things uppermost in the minds of the Eskimos, mainly manly strength and courage, prowess in hunting and fishing, and so on.

The incantations are sung to induce the spirits to bring fine weather.

One song only carries a note of pathos, the Widow's Complaint; for the Eskimos are by nature exceedingly cheerful and not given to brooding over the privations that often fall to their lot. Now the music from the film "Eskimo".
