

PROGRESS IN CHEDERA. - During the last few months, 400 dunan (100 acres) of land in Chedera have been planted with almond and olive trees, and 150 dunan with orange trees, the latter being planted mainly by the "Agudath Netaim." This year's winter seed promises a good harvest. The wheat plantations have suffered only in a few places owing to excessive rain, and the barley is developing very satisfactorily. A great deal of oats has also been cultivated in Chedera during recent years, and the yield this year should be particularly gratifying both in quality and quantity. The number of Jewish agriculturists in Chedera has greatly risen in the last few months. Six months ago there were merely 30 Jewish labourers, but now the various plantations employ about 70 Ashkenasic, A general dining hall for and 40 Yemenite labourers. workmen was opened recently, to which a small library has been added. The teacher of the local school organised a Hebrew evening course for the workmen last winter, and it was very well attended. It is proposed to build small dwellings for the newly arrived Yemenite families, who will thus become a permanent and valuable element in the population of Chedera. The Colony, on the whole, is making considerable progress, both in an economic and agricultural direction. The health conditions of this settlement, which was severely afflicted with malaria at first, are now quite satisfactory.



JOHN LAWSON AT THE BIJOU.

Those of our readers who remember Mr. John Lawson, the eminent actor, having given a short season in Johannesburg a few months ago will be glad to learn that this talented artiste has now opened another season at the above cozy Bioscope Theatre, where he is drawing nightly big crowds to admire him in his wonderful character studies and delineations. Mr. Lawson, supported by his full company, has staged "The Shield of David" during the first portion of this week, followed by "The Affinity" (or "The Open Door"), which will be played till the end of this week.
