"Remnant."

If our contemporaries in Durban and Cape Town are anything to go by, then, we must predict an immense success for Leonard Rayne's new enterprise with his new Company, that opens at the Standard Theatre on Monday next in one of the big successes of the last London season, "Remnant." It is a play teeming with romance and charm, pleasing all and bids fair to outrival "Peg o' My Heart." The new Company which interpret this delightful piece, is said to be one of the strongest that has been under the Rayne banner for some years. Freda Godfrey who plays the title role is too well known here to need any booming. She is a great artiste. Frank Cellier, Leonard Rayne's new leading man, is a first class actor, and certainly one of the best that has ever been seen in this country. Florence Glossop-Harris, a new-comer, who will be seen for the first time in "Remnant," comes here with a very big reputation from England. She is said to be an actress of exceptional power and strength. She has a long list of successes to her name and belongs to the community to which this journal caters, her father being the late Sir Augustus Harris of Drury Lane fame. The rest of the Company are in keeping with the leads and altogether playgoers may look forward to some delightful productions during their season at the Standard Theatre.

His Majesty's.

After a very successful run, "Daddy Long-Legs" gave way to another typically American comedy "Turn to the Right" by Winchell Smith and John E. Hazzard. This play, which is well thought out and well worked out, could be divided into three sections, the pathetic, the comic, and the human and there is no doubt that the playwrights have

done full justice to all three. Winchell Smith is the author of "The Fortune Hunter," of which one is reminded in the last act of the play under review. The idea, which underlies "Turn to the Right" is that three men from prison make up their minds to reform or, in criminal phraseology, to "run straight" and are carrying out their decision. There are some really dramatic scenes contained in this comedy, which are cleverly and kaleidoscopically interwoven with the comic portions and, taken as a whole the play is pleasing, entertaining and amusing, thus appealing to every section of the public. In the hands of the present American company the production easily scored another success. The ensemble is excellent, the artists play to each other naturally and unostentatiously, and the most searching critic would have difficulty in finding fault. Miss Roberts' characterization of the unsophisticated Mrs. Bascom made a strong appeal to the public, Mr. Chas. White's Muggs was a fine performance and proved the resourcefulness of this actor, when compared with his previous performance of Jervis while Mr. Jack Pendleton has a sympathetic part in the role of Joe Bascom to which he did full justice, and Mr. Donnelly gave a fine character study of the crook Gilly. Mr. Berman played the part of the Jewish pawnbroker in a brilliant manner, painting it, metaphorically speaking, in just the right colours. In the thankless role of Deacon Tillinger, Mr. Richard Scott displayed commendable discretion and Mr. Ray Browne acted the grocer's boy (?) with freshness. The parts of the three ladies in the play other than that of Mrs Bascom were not large but were successfully filled by Miss Eileen Errol, Miss Naomi Rutherford and Miss Hilda Attenboro. Mr. Geo. Montford is again the successful producer of this fine comedy which will, no doubt, receive that satisfactory patronage at the hands of the local public that it richly deserves.

Johannesburg Musical Society.

This Society held its 175th concert at the Selborne Hall on Wednesday night, when there was a good attendance of members and their friends who thoroughly enjoyed the pro-

gramme, consisting of the usual vocal and instrumental items. No doubt the outstanding feature of the evening was the cello playing by Mr. Hermann Becker, who, up till recently, was a member of the municipal orchestra at Capetown. He contributed four items and in every instance did full justice to the difficult pieces which he rendered and proved himself a great acquisition to the musical world of this town. Full praise must also be given to Miss Phyllis Wall who played the pianoforte part of the Grieg sonata opus 36 and accompanied Mr. Becker throughout the evening. Miss Nella Rainier was delightful in her piano solos and her technique, especially in the Scriabine Nocturne for the left hand only, was a wonderful performance. Unfortunately Mrs. Harold Fraser was indisposed, but Miss Kate Barnes kindly came forward at very short notice. Mrs. S.H. Pearce also sang some pretty songs by Montague Phillips and altogether a very enjoyable evening was spent.

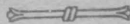
