Cape Town, 23rd June, 1918.

My dear Cousin,

We had a pretty wedding celebrated in the Synagogue this week, and one that will interest you inasmuch as the bridegroom hails from Johannesburg and the bride lived there some months. The bride was Gertie, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wolf Cohen of Ontario, Orangezicht, (formerly of Colesberg) and the happy man was Mr. George Chadwick of the firm of Jonas and Company, Johannesburg. The Rev. A. P. Bender conducted the wedding ceremony and gave an eloquent address to the young couple. The *unterfuhrers* were Mr. and Mrs. Cohen, and Mr. and Mrs. Nussbaum, Mr. Sam Bing acting as best man. Messrs. Forman, Ludwig Cohen, Fritz Raphaely and Joey Wolf performed the duties of pole bearers, while the bride's two sisters, Stella and Nellie, one in a charming frock of coral pink and the other in maize coloured crepe de chine, acted as bridesmaids. The bride herself made a pretty picture in a frock made in the mediaeval Italian style and a beautiful brussels lace veil lent by an old Colesberg friend whose bridal veil it had been 60 years ago. After the ceremony a reception was held at "Ontario" and here assembled a host of friends and well wishers. Among the guests one noticed many of the teaching profession in particular of the Girl's High School, Sea Point, on the staff of which the bride had herself served. Mr. and Mrs. Chad-

wick are taking up their residence in Johannesburg at the close of the honeymoon.

A number of Jewish successes are also in the Pass list.

In the Synagogue yesterday the Rev. Bender made reference to the loss to the community of one of its oldest members, Mr. Samuel Ginsberg. Mr. Bender recalled his piety and charity and his many services of officiating in the Synagogue.

Lieutenant Cyril H. Lazarus, of the Leicester Regiment, has been missing since May 29. He is a B.A. of the South African College. He left in the early stages of the war and was seriously wounded in the Somme push of July, 1916. He was unfit for active service for some considerable time, not having the use of his right arm, but he recently returned to Flanders. He is the only son of Mr. and Mrs. William Lazarus, of Muizenberg, and was born in Johannesburg.

A private cable has been received announcing the death from wounds received in action of Private Sol Littmann, M.M., son of Mr. J. Littmann (of Littmann and Brown), and brother of Mrs. Harry Brown and Mr. A. Littmann. Private Littmann was in Australia at the outbreak of the war, and immediately enlisted. He had seen fighting at Gallipoli, in Egypt and in France, was wounded 4 times and mentioned in despatches and received the Military Medal last January for conspicuous gallantry in the field.
