# The provincial Council Elections.

Next Wednesday will take place the election for the Transvaal Provincial Council and this is the last opportunity we shall have of offering a word of advice to our readers as to the manner in which they shall exercise their franchise We have already express ed the opinion that it is much to be regretted that these elections should be fought upon political lines, as we share the view with so many other thinking citizens that, in the Provincial Council at least, we might to advantage select our representatives in their individual capacities and without regard to their political beliefs. However, that is not the case as far as the general public is, concerned, but we do not intend to follow on these lines and any suggestions that we may make are based upon the candidate's personal worth rather than in consequence of his adherence to

any political party. We would again remind our readers that this is not an election for a synagogue council, nor for any other kind of Jewish organisation and the mere fact that a Jewish candidate has served the community well in other directions does not necessarily guarantee his usefulness in the Council Chamber at Pretoria. In this case we are to vote as citizens of a British province and not as Jews. We share with our non-Jewish citizens the rights and privileges of British citizenship and it is our duty to safe guard these rights and privileges by returning to the Pros vincial Council those particular candidates who will best be able to carry out the duties of the position which they are going to occupy, regardless of any particular religious belief.

Still this fact does not prevent our supporting a Jew where his candidature is in the best interests of the majority of the population and this is singularly the case of Hospital Hill where Mr. Alfred L Cohn stands for election. We feel sure that Mr Cohn will bring to bear upon a consideration of the matters occupying the attention of the Provincial Council a trained intellect which must make for the advantage of its legislation. We do not propose to labour the services which the candidate has rendered to the Jewish Guild and other Jewish communal bodies because—as we have already pointed out-this has nothing to do with the matter at issue. But we do think that the services which Mr. Cohn has rendered to the different Ratepayers' associations and to the different Municipal bodies with which he has been connected has given him an experience which must be all to the good.
