The conditions which will govern the entry of immigrants into Palestine, are contained in dispatches from Jerusalem. Each immigrant must possess a passport vied by the British Consul of his city, showing he is not an undesirable. All ports of entry into Palestine will be supervised by immigration officials already appointed, and every immigrant will have to register with the local police within fifteen days from the date of landing.

It is curious how a very slight occurrence will start trouble which cannot easily be allayed. The recent temporary disappearance at Riga of a Christian girl, Zelma Wickman, gave rise to what may have been a repetition of Beilis affair. The girl was sent to a Jewish baker, Berastein, to buy bread. Having failed to return, the police were notified of the disappearance of the girl. The authorities searched the premises of the Jewish baker, and found traces of blood on a rag. The mob at once advanced the blood libel theory as a motive for the supposed murder, but fortunately for the Jews the girl returned home before the agitation had assumed serious proportions.
