One of the most remarkable demonstrations of piano playing, and one which cannot fail to impress is the performance of Herschel Henlere, a real genius and a wonderful artist, whose playing and interpretations are such, that not only merit his receiving tremendous applause, but also necessitate his occupying the stage for close on an hour. Despite the length of time he is forced to appear, there is not one uninteresting moment, and I cannot do better than to advise my readers not to miss the opportunity of hearing so great a pianist. Then next in order of merit comes the greatest of dame comedians, Malcolm Scott, who gives a really fine burlesque act which is loudly applauded. In addition to these two new items, there are three others who make their debut this weak,— Lynda Bradford and Rosa Walton present a delightful musical act, singing duets and solos, and the accompanying by the latter is very fine indeed. The "Three Neslos" give a gymnastic novelty, in which the lady member of the trio proves to be amazingly strong, whilst the Shaws in a neat but rapid vaudeville act, give some excellently chosen musical selections, as well as ballad singing. Other turns remaing over are Jaap van Laren & Wilhelmina, now in their fourth week, and Eddie Morris & Billy Kuming. Altogether, one of the finest shows we have had for some time.
