Grundy, "Magic Casements" by Constance Harper, and "Corinna's Maying" by Rosalie M. Prince.

But for some unknown reason the painting has not been removed, although it was so ordered in 1922. So some persons apparently have become impatient, with the result that an attempt has been made to disfigure this mural decoration. Such vandalism should not be permitted, regardless of outraged feelings. But the remedy lies in more common sense and in the decent consideration of the sensibilities of others.
