Miss Renee Kelly in Sir J. M. Barrie's exquisite fantasy, "A Kiss For Cinderella," once again shows that she is an actress able to win the hearts of her audiences. Just as all Barrie's plays which we have seen out here have that delightful charm, so has the present production and, as the heroine Miss Kelly is all that the author could wish her to be. Supporting her is Mr. Leon M. Lion's capable company, with Mr. Frank Freeman as "The Policeman", whilst Mr. Hylton Allen gives a very finished rendition of the parts of Mr. Bodie, the artist, and also the penguin-bishop. The piece is staged admirably and, no better evening's entertainment for the young or old could be desired.

The Empire.

"Sally," the new musical production at the Empire Theatre is likely to have a record run. The plot of the piece centres round the arrival of Sally at the Alley Inn and from being a mere washer of dishes she becomes a famous dancer. Miss Cecile Maule-Cole is a dainty little actress, admirably suited to the title role, whilst Mr. Thomas Paunceforte as the Grand Duke, and incidentally he is the producer of the piece, rouses roars of laughter by his able enactment of the chief comedy part. Mr. Billy Holland as Otis Hooper gives him excellent support and others who contribute to the success of the piece are Mr. Eric Greatbatch, as the hero, Mr. Arthur Warren, Guy Saunders, Miss Rita Reuas, and the Rodney Hudson Octette of Empire Girls.

The Orpheum.

The principal picture at the Orpheum this week has been the film version of that excellent comedy which was staged out here some few months ago by Mr. Thurston Hall, "Bluebeard's Eighth Wife." Naturally, the producer of this film has had much more scope than an ordinary play affords and, the result is that we are given some magnificent scenes in which there is an amazing array of dresses. The leading part in the film version is played by Gloria Swanson and,

throughout there is the comedy touch. Another interesting film included in the programme was the second issue of the pictorial account of the Prince of Wales' tour in the Cape Province. Coming to the vaudeville items, Van Cello and Mary gave a remarkably wonderful foot juggling entertainment, whilst Trent and Sadie presented their Laughable Repertoire of Comedy Acts.

The New Bijou.

In addition to the usual news budgets and the extremely fine film of the Prince of Wales' Tour at the Bijou, there has been shown this week a picture which should stir the hearts of all those who are interested in the history of any nation, namely "The Covered Wagon," which tells of the story of America's great trek.
