SOUTH AFRICAN JEWISH BOARD OF DEPUTIES.

Monthly Meeting.

Over 30 deputies representing different Jewish institutions were present at the monthly meeting of the S.A. Jewish Board of Deputies held on Sunday morning at the Jewish Guild Building, Johannesburg, and presided over by Mr. S. Raphaely, the Acting President.

Advocate M. de Saxe was elected a member of the Executive Committe in place of Mr. B. S. Hersch, resigned.

In accordance with the recommendation made at last year's Congress held in Durban to convene congresses annually instead of biennially as heretofor, it was decided to summon a Congress of the Board for August 1st, to be held in Johannesburg. The date was fixed provisionally provided that the President, Mr. B. Alexander, who is at present in Europe, returned by then.

The report of the Executive Committee dealt with the proceedings at no less than four meetings of the Executive that had been held during the month. Matters of importance to South African Jews in particular and Jewry in general, were dealt with.
